

# Oregon Scores 30 to 26 Win Over Stater Quint

## ABILITY TO SINK FREE THROWS IS VICTORY MARGIN

Willie Jones, Former Sons Star, High Point Man—Ducks Outclass Beavers in First Half.

EUGENE, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Ability to sink free throws gave Oregon a 30 to 26 victory over Oregon State, coast champions, here tonight in the first game of their annual series. Oregon converted 10 out of 17 free throws while the Beavers made good but six of their 14 attempts.

Oregon outclassed the visitors in the first half, leading 16 to 7 at half time. In the last canto the Beavers began going to town and though they never tied the Ducks they came close on several occasions. Twenty-four fouls were called on the two teams and the play was rough all the way. Although Willie Jones was high point man for the Webfoots, most of his points came as a result of beautifully executed pass plays, with the entire team clicking. Jones got 16 points while Hibbard led the Beavers with nine markers.

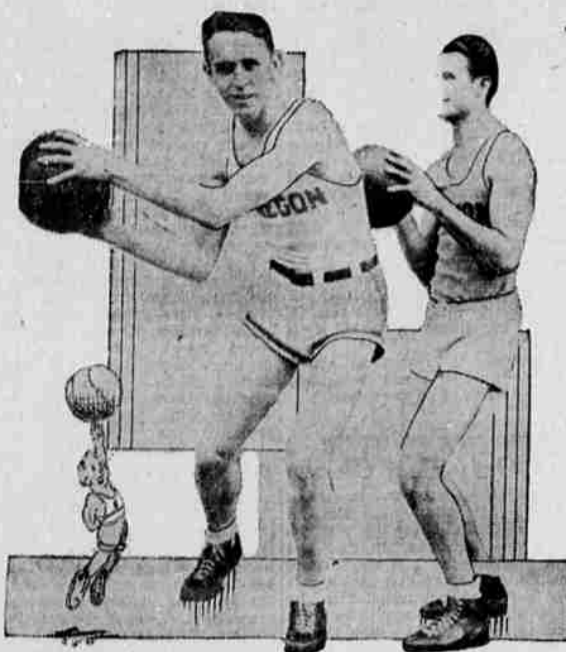
CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 13.—(AP)—The Oregon State college basketball team, 27 to 21, here tonight.

## MEDFORD FLASHES 2 'POINT' SQUADS FORM TO DEFEAT TRIM GOLD HILL ROSEBURG 32 TO 17 AND BUTTE FALLS

(By Harold Grove) Before the largest crowd seen in the Medford high school gym in many a moon, the Medford Tigers trounced the Roseburg Indians 32 to 17, Friday night. The Medford Juniors were defeated 24 to 20 in a hard fought battle.

The Tigers were slow in getting started but soon woke up and broke into the lead which was never relinquished. Both teams battled on even terms during the first half. The Medford team for some reason or other missed the set-ups. The score at the half-time period was 14 to 10 in Medford's favor.

Captain Burgher inserted a new combination of Curtiss and Stewart, forwards, and Brown and Gillsky, guards, with Harris at center. This combination worked smoothly to pile up 18 points in the second half to their opponents' seven.

The Roseburg team started a third quarter drive that gave Medford fans a scare. At the end of the first three minutes of play Medford had gained a 20 to 12 lead on the Indians. In quick succession Campbell and Sherner, Roseburg guards, cut loose from out around the foul circle and sunk a few fingers plus a free throw that brought them within three points of the Tigers' lead.

A time out was called and things were talked over. A different Medford team came out of the huddle, for they started a rally that lasted till the end of the game.

## PROSPECT BRIGHT FOR BAER-CARNERA BOUT NEXT JUNE

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—(AP)—One snappy interview between Jack Dempsey and Col. John Reed Kilpatrick seemed to have changed the entire heavyweight situation today and left a strong probability of a title meeting between Primo Carnera and Max Baer in June.

After Col. Kilpatrick, president of Madison Square Garden, had chatted with Dempsey and Ancil Hoffman, Baer's manager, it was indicated that the prospects of a Baer-Carnera bout were not so dismal after all.

Colonel Kilpatrick seemed satisfied that an arrangement could be made even though Carnera now is tied up with the Garden and Baer with Dempsey.

It was regarded as extremely improbable that Dempsey would be taken into a Garden partnership in order to "make" the bout. Garden officials regard that as a bad precedent to set.

Carnera already is signed to defend his title against Tommy Loughran at Miami February 22 and Baer may return to the ring shortly for one winter appearance, perhaps against Steve Hamas. The June battle, of course, would hinge upon the outcome of these two matches.

## PICK CANZONERI AS SHORT ENDER

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Cleto Locatelli, who was supposed to meet Tony Canzoneri in a return bout last night, today had established himself as a favorite to beat the former lightweight champion when they finally do get together two weeks from now.

Canzoneri, injured in training, was unable to fill the engagement so Cleto filled in the time by administering a thorough beating to Jackie Kid Berg before a scanty crowd of 5,000 at Madison Square garden.

Locatelli pasted him about almost as well but failed to land the finishing punch and was booed occasionally for his failure.
