AGED DOCTOR WHEELED TO TRIAL



As her trial for murder opened in Chicago, Dr. Alice Wynkoop was taken from her (all bed and) in a wheelchair to the courtroom where the state planned to demand the death penalty against her for the slaying of her daughter-in-law.

CHICAGO, Jan. 13-(AP)-Dr. James Whitney Hall, noted psychiatrist retained by the defense, made public today an outline of his analysis of Dr. Alice Wynkoop, on trial for the murder of her daughter-in-law, Rheta.

The picture of the 62-year-old woman physician sketched by Dr. Hall—who has figured as a mental expert in 34 murder cases including the Leon-Leopold trial—was that of a mentally sound, emotionally well-balanced, normal mother, deeply religious, kindly, cultured, affectionate but not demonstrative and highly intellectual.

For two days Dr. Wynkoop, who was exempt out of the practice of medicine into the central character role of a real life story as mysterious as any detective fiction, has sat in court and heard twelve men qualified to inflict the death penalty upon her.

She has taken it seemingly in a matter of fact manner, almost wearily detached, outwardly emotionless—save for the tapping of her restless feet.

"But she is not emotionless," said Dr. Hall.

She is not the type of person who shows her emotions on the surface to the public at large, he continued. Furthermore she has schooled herself well in emotional control.

Farm administration officials declared today they would include in the agreements only a fixed price for producers, arrived at by calculations based on economic facts, and would allow retail prices to work themselves out in competition between individual distributors and retailers.

They will, however, reserve the right to set maximum retail prices if an effort is made to overcharge consumers.

Also, in markets where many producers operate their own milk routes, a low minimum price may be fixed to prevent price wars and destructive competition.

The enforcement section of the administration will supervise these prices and enforce the regulations, particularly those concerning regular and full payment of producers' prices by distributors.

Old milk marketing agreements of the administration guaranteed prices to distributors also, but officials explained that experience in enforcing them proved that such enforcement was both unwise and difficult.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13-(AP)-The national recovery administration took a vigorous verbal slap at a spokesman for Secretary Ickes today in an official denunciation of its right to enter new codes for the power industry and other privately-owned public utilities.

Donald Ritchberg, general counsel of the recovery unit, interrupted a public hearing on the power code to expound the basis on which the recovery administration contended that President Roosevelt had all the power needed to approve a code for utilities.

Ritchberg charged Henry B. Hunt, spokesman for the Interior department with improperly in the seizing attack he made yesterday on the conduct of the Edison Electric Institute, the code proponent, and the electric utility world generally.

He called Hunt's presentation a "stump speech" which he could not permit to receive any sanction by our silence. It is clearly necessary to require that the remainder of the hearing be devoted to an orderly taking of evidence.

Ritchberg said "tittle denunciation of alleged iniquities" had no place in a code hearing, and that the administration was not to be confused with a ceasing establishment, whether or "the moral garments of those sponsoring or opposing a code be as black as midnight or as white as snow."

Hunt had questioned the right of the recovery administration to have a code for natural monopolies such as public utilities, and had been joined in that stand by Frank H. McIninch, power commission chairman.

Ritchberg specifically exempted the latter from his criticism, saying that though he disagreed with the chairman's views, "his presentation was in proper form and good taste."

NEW YORK, Jan. 13-(AP)-Stellar Lewis has "Gone Broadway" in the literal sense.

The red-haired creator of "Babbitt" and other symbolical American figures is spending his days in the late Charles Frohman's office, supervising the casting of his first play to reach the Broadway stage.

It is called "The Jayhawker" at present, though this may not be its final title.

"It's about the civil war from the guerilla anti-slavery clashes in Kansas to the battle of the Wilderness," Lewis said today.

"But Lincoln isn't in it, there ain't no love scenes between a northern spy and a southern beauty, no plantation scenes dripping with honeycucles and magnolia blossoms, no cucumbers in the accepted movie sense."

Despite his Nobel prize, "Rey" Lewis isn't sure how he will make out as a playwright.

PRESIDENT EYES NEW LAWS AIDING CURRENCY POLICY

Hopes To Secure Dollar That Will Not Fluctuate In Value—Seeks Greater Power From Congress.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13-(AP)-President Roosevelt has set his aides to studying the need for legislation covering important phases of his managed currency program, convinced meanwhile that he is fully empowered to take the next step—that of pre-empting the gold stocks of the federal reserve system.

Action to transfer \$3,500,000,000 in coin and bullion from the vaults of the reserve banks to those of the treasury is regarded now as inevitable. The only uncertainty attached is that of how soon it will come and that is a question which neither the president nor his advisors will answer.

Nevertheless, Washington's general expectancy that it will be done soon was sharpened today by another in the series of White House monetary conferences attended by Attorney General Cummings and by Secretary Morgenthau and his assistants.

The need for legislation is connected with one of the most important characteristics of the currency which is President Roosevelt's goal—flexibility. He is seeking to establish a dollar whose purchasing and debt paying power will not be susceptible to violent fluctuations throughout the years. The method of accomplishing this is by adjusting from time to time the amount of gold for which the dollar is exchangeable as the general price level may advance or recede.

The Thomas amendment gives him authority to reduce the gold content of the dollar by as much as 50 per cent. Commanding the reserve system's gold is one step in this direction. Whether the amendment gives the chief executive authority to revalue the dollar more than once is a question just now surrounded by controversy, with most of the chief executive's advisors answering in the negative.

The result was authoritatively forecast today as a request to congress for greater permissive authority which would allow more latitude in compensating price fluctuations with changes in the dollar's gold value.

FRENCH SHOCKED BY BOND TABOO

PARIS, France, Jan. 13-(AP)-The United States senate's vote to prohibit Americans from buying bonds of debt-defaulting nations made "a painful impression" on French government circles today.

Officials were represented as hopeful that the house of representatives would vote against the bill as it did against the liquor-tax retaliation bill which the senate first passed and then reconsidered.

Government circles insisted that the breakdown of the Anglo-American debt negotiations made it impossible for the French government to raise the debt issue again in parliament pending some new development.
