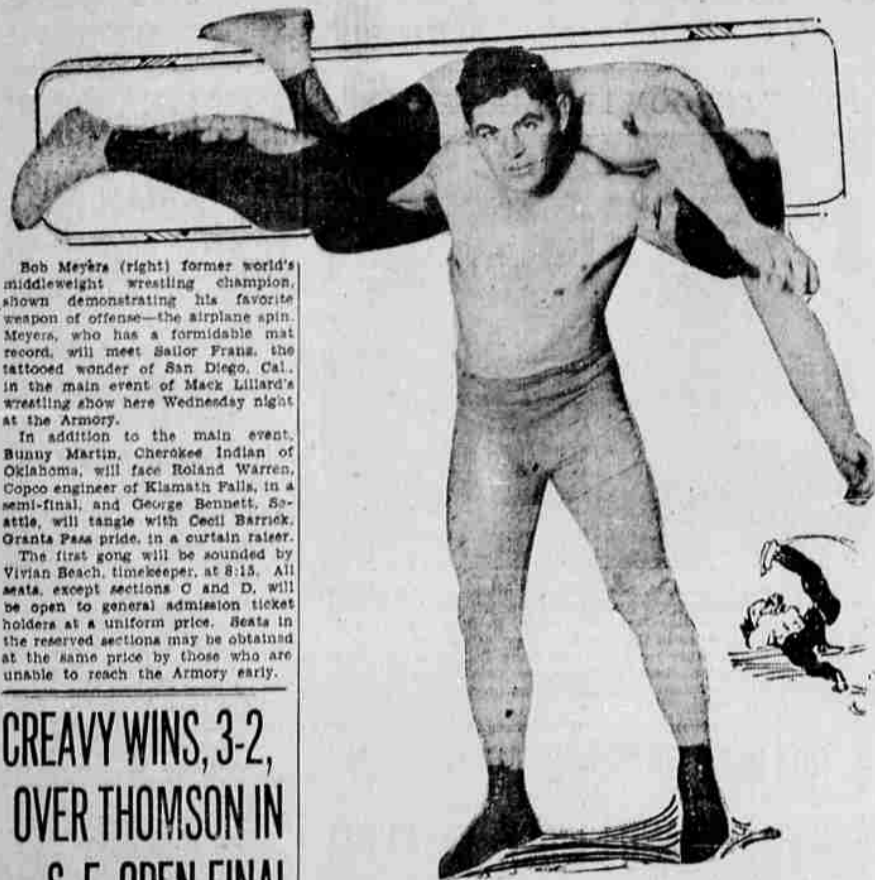


Airplane Spin Meyers' Favorite Hold

Meyers, who has a formidable mat record, will meet Sailor Franks, the tattooed wonder of San Diego, Cal., in the main event of Mack Lillard's wrestling show here Wednesday night at the Armory.

CREAVY WINS, 3-2, OVER THOMSON IN S. F. OPEN FINAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Thomas Daniel Creavy, 22-year-old trapper of golf winter "gold trail," is the 1934 San Francisco national match play open champion.

The youthful Albany, N. Y., star won the title and top money yesterday when he defeated Jim Thomson of Long Beach, 3 and 2, in the 36-hole finale of this section's annual links classic.

Creavy claimed the winner's share of the \$400 purse—it amounted to \$311—Creavy outdistanced a brilliant field of 200 starters who teed off in the qualifying round last week.

He learned the game as a caddy at Tuckahoe, N. Y., under one of the old masters, Willie MacParland. Three years ago, while still in his teens, he first attained national prominence by winning the professional golfers' championship.

Since that time he has been recognized as a formidable contender, but his victory yesterday was his most important in the yearly campaign that sends the pros on a coast to coast trek.

The final divot duel of the most interesting tournament ever put on here saw Creavy conquer Thomson with a flawless iron game. His approach, in the main, were mechanically perfect and his putting was highly accurate.

Thomson outdistanced Creavy from the tee by 20 yards or more, but Creavy was the master on the greens.

On the morning round of the match the young man from Albany used exactly 29 putts. Thomson only had to putt 38 times, which would be satisfactory most any other time.

REED PINS HEINZ THRICE IN MATCH

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 15.—(AP)—A five-fall wrestling match between Robin Reed, 157, Reedsport, and Tommy Heinz, 165, Burns, packed 1800 into the labor temple here last night, while hundreds more were turned from the doors.

Reed took three falls straight after Heinz captured the first two with reverse chin locks. Reed used a body press after a head-to-head collision and two more body presses to take his falls.

BRIDGE FINALISTS EVENLY MATCHED

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—(AP)—The first "grand national" tournament of the United States Bridge association is on its final lap today, with little to choose between the two teams left after three days of elimination matches.

David Burnatine, Oswald Jacoby, Howard Schenker and Michael Gottlieb had a plus of 2050 points when the first half of the match—60 boards—was concluded at 1:30 a. m. The rubber of their opponents—Sidney Ruelnow, Walter Malowan, Lee Langdon and L. Bachner—left the result still in doubt, however.

Jacoby was in the limelight early in the afternoon when a long standing feud between himself and Mrs. Madeline Kerwin, a woman expert, flared. Mrs. Kerwin had been scheduled to broadcast the play, apparently without Jacoby's knowledge.
