BUTTER, CHEESE OUTLOOK BETTER

PORTLAND, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Higher prices for butter in Portland recently were attracting considerable supply from out-state points, with local manufacturing also gaining as a result of spring-like weather conditions in contributing territory.

Further advance in the price on butter during the late season of the produce exchange, as well as a boost in the too-low price on cheese, comes as a result of general betterment in the demand with a chief factor the urgent desire of storage speculators to boost so they can secure more money for their storage goods.

The advance of 1c in butterfat buying prices follows the rise in butter, but not the previous advance in the butter market was absorbed by creamery interests.

Trading in the egg market was active here with most operators maintaining prices, although outsiders were still reported as underselling all comers.

AGENCY VALLEY DAM BIDS ARE ANNOUNCED

VALE, Ore., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Hinman Brothers Construction company of Denver submitted the low bid of \$496,288 for construction of the Agency Valley dam for supplemental storage for the Vale reclamation project, and announced that work can be started within two weeks after the contract has been awarded.

About 150 men will be employed and the work will take about two years. The reservoir will store 60,000 acre feet of water.

LAMBS READY IN PORTLAND MARKET

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Lamb offered another sensation in the Portland livestock alleys today as dealers bid eagerly for a run of 800 head and the price went to \$7.50, the highest quotation since May 26, 1931. Yesterday's top was \$7.25 and this was an outside quotation.

Old mutton and yearlings also went higher in today's trading.

Export Wheat

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17.—(AP)—The North Pacific Emergency Export corporation today bid 77 cents a bushel for soft white wheat for foreign shipment. The last previous quotation was 75 cents, posted January 5. The federal corporation is buying wheat to relieve the Pacific northwest of a large surplus.

MEDFORD BRIDGE FANS TO PLAY IN TOURNEY

Medfordites will play again this year in the Olympic bridge tournament, it was announced today by Mrs. Gus Newbury, who will sponsor the local tournament.

It will be held at the Hotel Medford February 1, with playing to begin at 8 o'clock. The winning hands will be sent to New York for entry in world competition. The tournament last year was much enjoyed here and a similarly large attendance is anticipated this year.
