

PORTLAND STORES SELL EGGS BELOW WHOLESALE PRICE

PORTLAND, Jan. 18.—(AP)—While the federal law in regard to the selling of products at less than cost was reported in effect, sales of eggs were being openly made one to two cents in retail shops below the reported wholesale costs.

The quotation on fresh extras was generally placed 18c dozen here but some retailers were actually selling such supplies at 17c or even a fraction less.

Wholesalers in the trade suggested that retailers were shading values one to two cents dozen, with sales of extra down to 16c, but this was generally denied by those reported as participating in the price cutting holday.

Trading in the butter market was good here and at recently advanced prices. Consumption continued to gain with the chief call for the standard and prime first offerings. Butter-fair was held firm.

Further gain in strength was suggested by another fractional boost in the price for cheese on the produce exchange here, which has been one of the chief bear factors in the market for an extended period.

Considerable strength was showing in the market for country-killed meats and in spots higher prices were reported. Hogs were generally up to 8c for top blockers here with heavy sorts up to 6c lb.

Local demand for turkeys was reported as rather limited. The demand was chiefly for large birds. Buying price was as high as 18c lb.
