25 CARS FRUIT OUT THIS WEEK

Fear shipments from Medford district for the week ending last night totalled 16 cars of pears and nine of apples, bringing the total for the season to 1742 pears and 112 apples. There remains in storage close to 450 cars of pears. Shippers report good prices for D'Anjous, in one or two instances selling for above the 1929 figure in the eastern markets, and maintaining a strong price in the foreign markets.

NON-SUPPORT IS KNOTTY PROBLEM FOR GRAND JURY

The grand jury is now scheduled to start its investigation of the "Dahack case" next Monday, in accordance with the instructions of the court, "to make a final clean-up of a matter that has become more or less of a political football." The inquisitorial body was delayed in getting to the matter, by the large number of unlisted matters coming before them, including a number of non-support cases, in which wives alleged their mates were not doing right by them. Such cases are a problem. If indicted and cast into jail, they can't support their families, and after such a happening, the wives in many instances plead for their release, after they have been instrumental in securing their incarceration, officials say. The district attorney's office said there were not as many non-support complaints as at other sessions, however, and attributed this to CWA work and other job projects.

In the case of Manette Biden, 29, local resident, bound over for alleged contributing to the delinquency of a 17-year-old girl, was before the grand jury. The girl, in testimony in justice court and juvenile court, defended Biden and claimed "there was nothing wrong." She asserted that Biden befriended her and invited her to "stay at his house," as an act of friendship, and to help her meet an economic situation. Sisters of the girl were instrumental in securing the arrest of Biden.

Other criminal cases heard by the grand jury include a Butte Falls shooting of a birthday celebrant in the leg, a Pinehurst assault with a

deadly weapon case, a Rogue River district trap-gun and still case, on Old Stage road district still case, three Medford forgery and obtaining money under false pretenses cases, and cases alleging violation of the Oregon medical law and the Oregon mining law.

The grand jury is not expected to make a report until the end of next week when Circuit Judge H. D. Norton is scheduled to return from holding the court in Grants Pass.

OPINIONS VARY ON SWINE POPULATION FOR AAA RECORDS

There seems to be considerable difference of opinion, official and private, as to the hog population of Jackson county which will come under the hog-corn production adjustment campaign launched here last week.

Records of the assessor's office show 2633 hogs, of a value of \$8,830, and these are the figures that appear on the tax rolls.

The federal hog census, taken in 1930 by various farmers, places the number at 5300.

H. A. Lindgren of the animal husbandry bureau of the Oregon State college, who addressed the hog-corn meeting last Tuesday, and C. C. Hoover, a hog raiser, said the above figures were too low, and that there were between 15,000 and 20,000 hogs in the county.

County Agent Robert G. Fowler said this morning that the federal figures "were about right," and that hog production in this section "has decreased about 40 per cent in the past ten years." The county agent said the number of hogs varied during different seasons.

Emmett Nealon said he was a hog census taker in the Sams Valley district and that "the count was correct and thorough, and 5300 is about the right number of hogs, as at the

time there was no reason for not telling the hog population." Mr. Nealon further stated, "Hog raising around here is not very hot as we ship in most of our bacon."

When the hog-corn production contracts are signed, it is expected that the approximate number of hogs in these parts will be determined. Under federal rules it will have to be accurate as the government is not prone to pay a bonus on too few or too many hogs.

County Agent Fowler expects to have the schedule of community meetings on the hog-corn production adjustment program ready by next week and will start holding them.

Meier, who has not yet announced whether or not he would be a candidate for re-election.

Brown, a member of the state legislature for many years, is present state senator from Marion county.
