

# SONS WILL FACE HUMBOLDT QUINT IN 2-GAME TEST

### Tonight and Saturday to See Fast Teams in Action at Ashland — Visitors Never Defeated by Normal Team

Cocher Fred Telonicker, veteran Humboldt mentor, is bringing two fast teams to Ashland this week for the opening college series in southern Oregon for Howard Hobson's fast coming SONS. The games are to be played at the Ashland Junior high tonight and Saturday night.

Advance reports on the California team are that they are confident of taking both games. They have lost but one game all season, and never in their history have they lost a series to Southern Oregon Normal in basketball.

Leading their team this year is Captain Wayne Simpson, said to be one of the best guards in California basketball circles. Simpson is fast and experienced, a heavy scorer and very aggressive. The other guard position is being handled by Bill Henderson, one of those rugged native sons that love personal combat.

At the center position the giant Charlie Timmons, considered the best backboard artist to represent Humboldt in recent years will be teamed against Ashland's Ward Howell. These two young huskies should furnish an exciting battle.

At the forwards, the flashy Earl Hemenway, freshman, will face Frankie Moore, veteran and the fastest man on the squad. Hemenway is the leading scorer and has promised to match "Lefty" Yandle, SONS favorite, in the series. The invading forward has outscored every opponent so far this season.

The teachers of Ashland, wearing brand new white elephants around their necks as luck tokens, are out to break the seven-year jinx of having never won a basketball series from Humboldt. Hobson's teams have never lost a single football or basketball game to a California team, but they did not play Humboldt last year.

Both teams use a fast passing, aggressive type of ball and the games will show plenty of action.

Reserves of the two schools, playing preliminaries each night will, so far as the SONS are concerned, also furnish the last word in action. The SONS will trot out a group of last year's footballers that have learned enough about the court game to take care of themselves — possibly even more than that.

Cecil Fugitt, star quarterback, Bill Rasmussen, speedy end, Elmer Brown, the one and only Elmer the Great, and several other well known athletes will be thrown against the opposition. Doors will be open at 7 o'clock Friday with the curtain raiser at 7:15 and at 8 o'clock Saturday. The main game Saturday will be at 9:15 to allow merchants to attend.

## LEVINSKY GAINS GARDEN'S FAVOR FOR TITLE BOUT

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—(AP)—If Madison Square Garden promotes a heavyweight championship bout in June, the chances are just about 10 to 1 the challenger won't be Max Baer. But it might be King Levinsky.

Finding it impossible to tie Baer up to a contract to fight for the Garden in the event he won the championship, Col. John R. Kilpatrick, president of the big arena, and his matchmaker, Jimmy Johnston, have dropped all negotiations with Baer, his manager, Anell Hoffman, and promoter Jack Dempsey, and turned to Levinsky instead.

In their first move to build the talkative ex-fish peddler into the status of a title contender, the Garden's directors have booked him for two matches, one against Charley Massera, young Pittsburgher, the other against Walter Neusel, blonde puncher from Germany on February 9 and March 2, respectively.

If the Kingfish can get by those two hurdles, he may be asked to agree to one more tune-up before getting a shot at Primo Carnera in June, always assuming the mammoth Italian succeeds in beating Tommy Loughran in their 15-round bout in Miami February 22.

Proximity may have a good bit to do with this big shift in plans. If Levinsky, his sister-manager, Lena, and a delegation from the Chicago stadium hadn't been in town in an effort to arrange a Levinsky-Max Schmeling battle, the garden might never even have thought of the Kingfish.

## VINES AND TILDEN COUNT IS EVENED

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Young Ellsworth Vines has evened the rapid tour tennis series with Big Bill Tilden at three matches all in a short power show which included a spray of baffling drives and a breath-taking service good for 17 aces.

Tilden utilized his contract privilege to shorten the match to three sets last night when he saw the crowd of 2300 at the coliseum virtually spilling over the edges of the court. Vines' victory was on scores of 6-3, 3-6, 6-3.

Vines appeared to be at top form, but for Tilden the crowded space, the lights and some of the linesman's decisions added nothing to his poise.

## CROW KILLERS TO BE GIVEN PRIZES BY LOCAL STORES

The purpose of the contest is to preserve the wild life of the county and to be definitely known that crows are extremely destructive in this regard. Contests of this nature have been conducted in many communities throughout the United States where there is considerable hunting, and it is believed that a similar one here will produce a great deal of good.

Statistics show that 55 per cent of all quail eggs are destroyed by crows and a vast number of young quail are also exterminated. Figures also show that only three out of every 100 pheasant eggs are hatched, due to crows.

Those who enter the contest are requested to take the crows to the following stores, where a record will be kept in order to determine the winners of the merchandise prizes which will be offered: Hubbard Bros., Al Piche Hardware, Medford Furniture and Hardware company, Fick's Hardware, Montgomery Ward company, Lampport's Sporting Goods store.
