

MILL OPERATOR BUYS CHRYSLER AIRFLOW MODEL

Medford will be on the nation's automotive map next month, if plans now being worked out by H. F. Lange of Armstrong Motors, Inc., materialize. Mr. Lange's publicity plan centers around the introduction of the much discussed Chrysler "Airflow," which was accorded a sensational reception at the San Francisco automobile show ten days ago. Here is how it all started.

A. D. Lewis, one of the owners of the Lewis mill at Prospect, became interested in advance announcements of the radically different new Chrysler airflow and visited San Francisco so that he might see the advance showing at the automobile show. It was a clear case of "love at first sight" and H. F. Lange immediately sold a Chrysler "Airflow" to Mr. Lewis for delivery next month at the Chrysler factory in Detroit.

Mr. Lewis will leave for the east soon to accept delivery of one of the very first Chrysler "Airflows" "off the line," and H. F. Lange is arranging for widespread publicity to be given this event in Detroit throughout Oregon. It is also planned for the proud owner of one of the initial "Airflow" Chryslers to display his car at points along the southern route on his return trip to Oregon. Banners, giving publicity to Medford and Southern Oregon, will be conspicuously displayed on the smart new car, which is attracting a remarkable amount of attention wherever the few cars, prepared for show purposes, have been shown.

In commenting upon the new car, which he has purchased to drive back from the east, A. D. Lewis said: "Three outstandingly different features appealed to me in seeing the Chrysler 'Airflow' in San Francisco. It has a startling streamline body that more nearly approaches the ideal aerodynamic form than any car I have yet seen. Through a redistribution of weight, the new Chrysler has made an amazing improvement in riding qualities and, through completely changed body arrangement, a wealth of room is provided. I am anticipating with considerable pleasure my return from Detroit in the new 'Airflow' which I have purchased from Armstrong Motors, Inc."

Four distinct lines of cars are offered in the Chrysler's 1934 contribution to the motoring world. These include the Chrysler six, the Royal 8 Airflow, the Imperial 8 Airflow, and the custom built Imperial 8 Airflow. Many mechanical improvements and innovations are featured in the new models in addition to the sensational "Airflow" bodies, according to H. F. Lange.

A housewife once—only once—discovered one Sunday she was without butter. The neighborhood grocer lived behind his store, however, and was routed out without much difficulty.

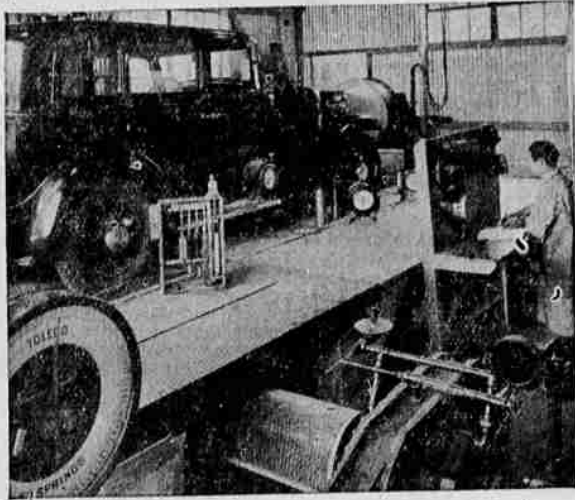
"Just a quarter of a pound of butter, to last until tomorrow," she announced.

CULINARY CRAFT....

"Dinner-Dishes."

We have been frivolous for some several weeks past, between the festive meals of BIG DAYS and the left-overs provided by them. Honestly, don't you long for the simple, satisfying meals of the ordinary days? And, while we are at it, why not make the preparation and service a simple, too? Our friend the so-called "dinner-dish" comes to the rescue with its wholesome combinations and delicious flavors. The following offer a wide variety suitable for many tastes.

Bacon Casserole.
8 slices of bacon
2 c. cooked potatoes
3 T. drippings
1/4 t. salt
1 lb. prepared mustard
2 T. flour
1 minced green pepper (onion, celery, or what you like)
1 c. milk
Make a sauce, using the drippings, flour, pepper, milk and seasonings. Pour over the sliced potatoes (or diced), place bacon on top and bake in casserole 25 minutes. Remove top and brown slightly before serving.

Ham and Sweet Potatoes.
1 slice of ham
3 sweet potatoes
1 c. hot water
2 T. brown sugar
2 apples
Brown the ham lightly on both sides and place in baking dish. Spread with sliced sweet potatoes and quartered apples. Sprinkle with sugar and the ham drippings. Add hot water, cover and bake at 350 degrees one hour. Remove the cover the last 10 minutes for browning.

Fisherman's Pie.
1 can salmon
2 c. cream sauce
1 T. lemon juice
2 c. diced potatoes
2 hard cooked eggs
1 T. butter
Place layer of salmon in well-buttered casserole, cover with a layer of the cooked eggs, chopped coarsely, then add more salmon, if any is left, and top with a layer of diced cooked potatoes. Pour cream sauce over all and bake 20 minutes at 425 degrees.

Smothered Beef Rolls.
1 flank steak
1 T. flour
4 t. mustard
1 c. tomato sauce
Salt and pepper
2 onions
3 celery stalks
3 carrots
4 potatoes
Cut steak into four pieces (or more if large steak). Coat with prepared mustard. Cut the carrots into strips and roll with cut celery inside of the meat. Fasten with string or skewers. Brown the sliced onions in hot drippings and brown the rolls in this fat. Transfer all to a casserole, add tomato sauce and any other seasoning desired. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes then add the peeled potatoes (according to amount of meat), cover and bake another 45 minutes.

Egg and Tuna Fish Pie.
5 hard cooked eggs
2 c. flaked tuna fish
1 c. mushrooms
2 c. milk
4 T. butter
1 t. salt and pepper mixed
Biscuit—or pastry.
Slice the eggs. Pour boiling water over the tuna and drain. Place layer of eggs in bottom of buttered dish, then a layer of tuna and a layer of mushrooms. Repeat. Melt the butter, add flour and seasoning. Add the milk and bring to boiling point, stirring constantly. Pour over contents of dish and cover all with baking powder biscuits or pastry. Bake 20 minutes in hot oven (400 degrees).

Chartreuse of Meat and Rice.
2 c. chopped cooked meat
1 t. salt and pepper
1 t. onion juice
1 T. chopped parsley
4 c. cooked rice
1 egg
3/4 c. soft bread crumbs
Season meat and mix with crumbs and beaten egg, add enough stock to make it pack easily. Line a well-buttered dish with three cups of rice, fill with the meat mixture and cover with remaining rice. Cover tightly and steam 45 minutes. Serve with tomato sauce.

Trains wrecked by Manchukuo bandits.

HARBIN, Manchukuo, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Bandits struck again at the Trans-Siberian express on the Chinese Eastern railway.

Removing rails, an outlaw band wrecked the westbound express, derailling five cars. Four passengers were burned to death in the flaming wreckage. Twenty-nine were injured. There were no Americans aboard.

Eight passengers were killed when bandits wrecked and pillaged the eastbound international train near Taitshar on December 5, and three weeks before that a train was derailed and two Japanese soldiers slain before they could beat off the bandits.

FAVOR VOLUNTEER STERILIZATION IN GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—A British government committee tonight recommended the legalization of voluntary sterilization for mentally defective and some physically defective persons.

The recommendation was made in a report of the committee appointed early last year by the ministry of health for a study of the problem.

The recommendation itself is in the form of a bill for a law which would recommend sterilization of such physical defectives as are shown to be carriers of a grave physical disability which is transmissible.

The bill provides that an operation for sterilization would be performed only under a written authorization by the minister of health.

Application for the authorization would have to be supported by a recommendation signed by two medical practitioners, one of whom should, if possible, be the patient's family doctor and the other a practitioner on a list approved by the ministers.

Sterilized mental defectives would receive such supervision as required after the operation.

In all cases where a patient is capable of giving his consent, the bill provides he should sign a declaration of his willingness to be sterilized.

MIDGET 'COW-DOG' IS PUZZLE TO EXPERTS

RHINELANDER, Wis.—(UP)—Veterinarians here have been puzzled by a midget "cow-dog" recently purchased by a Chicago concern for exhibition at the world's fair next year.

The creature is 18 months old, has the head and tail of a bulldog and the hide of a cow. It is 22 inches high, and weighs little more than a good-sized dog.

Its parents were a normal bull and cow.

9 BODIES ON BEACH TELL SEA TRAGEDY

AMSTERDAM, Holland, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Nine sailors' bodies were washed ashore today at Vlissingen to tell the fate of the crew of the British steamer Oakford, stranded on the pounding surf near the island of Texel.

The Oakford carried a crew of 10 and it was feared the tenth man also was lost.

The steamer itself was reached by a Dutch lifeboat but the life savers found it deserted, and presumed the

SING SONG GIRLS OF OLD SHANGHAI LIKE RADIO SETS

SHANGHAI.—(UP)—All the ancient glory of the Flowery Kingdom had nothing to compete with the latest wrinkle in modern comfort seen frequently on the streets of Shanghai these days.

It is a small radio receiving set installed on a ricksha with power furnished the generator through the vehicle's wheels.

This form of entertainment is extremely popular with the litesome sing-song girls, who may be seen riding in their private rickshas up Nan-king road, relaxed and slumber-lidded, listening to the melodies of Ted Lewis, Paul Whiteman or Bing Crosby as played over the radio.

The sets are built by a German company. The wheels of the ricksha generate sufficient power for a radio with eight small tubes.

Occidentals seeing the East for the first time are always amused at the sight of venerable Chinese gentlemen taking their birds out for a walk in the early morning.

Thibet road, the "canary row" of Shanghai, presents to passerby a genuine symphony of bird music in the morning while the air is still fragrant and fresh. It is a belief that the birds will sing better if given a morning walk. Employees of the bird shops are seen every day carrying from three to 20 birds in their cages around the block.

A huge bearded Sikh wearing a scarlet turban on his head greets the visitor to the American consulate in Shanghai. A Chinese servant

with shaved head and long gown directs him to the department he seeks. Russian, British, Chinese, French and Portuguese lawyers practice before the court and some don't speak English. A Filipino stenographer takes dictation. The consulting itself, housing the U. S. court for China, American consul-general and the American officials and their families, is owned by the Japanese. This is internationalism in Shanghai.

English as practiced by Orientals sometimes attains surprising results. An example is a sign at Kiaochoo Beach: "We rent swimming suits guaranteed free from louses, fleas and bugs." Foreigners chuckled over a story that recently appeared in a Chinese vernacular newspaper. The story read: "Lo Wei-Chi, a student from Teintsin who recently arrived in Shanghai, was captured by police yesterday on charges of plotting against the government. "He will be tried tomorrow and shot Friday."
