## Brilliant Fetes Throughout Land Honor Roosevelt

Still holding a place of first significance on the January calendar here, the birthday ball to honor President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, continues to be the leading topic of talk, wherever society gathers in the Rogue River valley these days.

Colorful decorations will make the Oriental Gardens inviting place for the affair, combined with unusual lighting effects; and music will be played by several orchestras offering dancers variety even in synopses. All lodges, clubs and organizations are represented on the committees, arranging what is expected to be a really brilliant affair.

In line with the plans for the Medford ball, nearing completion here, particular interest is found in the following dispatch, describing the Washington party:

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 20.—Washington society has joined the movement to honor the president on his birthday on January 30 by raising an endowment for the Warm Springs Foundation for Infantile Paralysis at 5000 balls in every community in the nation and plans a ball that will rival the famous Inaugural ball in brilliance. It will be held in the ballrooms of the Hotel Shoreham and undoubtedly will be the outstanding event of the capital's social season.

The Washington Birthday ball for the president is under the chairmanship of Mrs. Allan Daugherty, who was chairman of the Inaugural ball last March, and her committee of sponsors includes the leaders of Washington social and official life, including the cabinet, the supreme court and the diplomatic corps.
