OREGON TURKEY CROP FAR SHORT

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 22.—(AP)—The Oregon turkey crop for the current season is almost 50 per cent below normal, according to McKinley Huntington, president and manager of the Oregon Turkey Growers, who has just completed a survey of the birds remaining for market.

The association, he reports, has marketed 28,596 birds, and growers report that they have approximately 3000 turkeys left for shipment, so that the total for the season will be between 31,500 and 32,000 birds. The pools handled by the association for the past few years have totalled 60,000 or more turkeys.
