

# "Rolling Scissors" Expert Will Exhibit Spectacular Hold Tonight

## LES WOLFE, WHO BANGS 'EM SILLY, TO WRESTLE TONIGHT

### Double Main Event Mat Card Will Pit Pete Belcastro and Frank Clemens in Other Half of Show

Les Wolfe, Texas wrestler, who specializes in a complicated hold known as the "rolling scissors," arrived in Medford yesterday in the pink of condition for his match tonight with Sailor Franz, tattooed wonder of San Diego. Wolfe was unawed by a recital of the toughness of the tar and declared that once he clamped on his pet grip the sailor lad would have to be extra durable to prevent a fall.

The Texan, in executing his favorite weapon of offense, winds his legs about an opponent's body from the rear and rolls from side to side, banging the helpless foe on the calves at each roll. A little of this sort of thing goes a long way with the average enemy, and like Jim Browning, the heavyweight sensation, who uses a similar hold, Wolfe has an almost unbroken string of victories to his credit.

Wolfe and Franz will meet in a one-hour match, with Pete Belcastro of Sacramento and Frank Clemens, Oklahoma matman, in the other half of the double-barreled bill.

Belcastro is a fast, aggressive, rough and reckless grappler, who has appeared here several times and always gives the fans plenty of action. In meeting Clemens, Belcastro will have to deal with an opponent whose favorite dish is roughhouse wrestling. According to Mack Lillard, promoter, the Oklahoma expects to spend several weeks in the northwest and will head every effort toward starting his invasion with a clean slate.

Tonight's mat show will open at 8:15 at the armory and all seats, except two sections, will be open—first come first served—at a uniform price. Reservations in the prescribed sections may be made by those who are unable to get to the armory on time or wish to be assured of ringside seats without taking a chance in the crowd.

## JAP CUE WIZARD 3-CUSHION KING

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Kinrey Matsuyama, Japanese billiards ace from New York, won the national three-cushion championship in the last scheduled match of the professional tournament, but a playoff today is necessary to decide the runner-up.

Winners of first and second places qualify for the world's title play in New York next month.

Charles McCourt of Cleveland and Len Kenney of Chicago compete for the opportunity. Each won five matches and lost two during the round robin play, as compared with Matsuyama's six victories and one defeat.

The new champion clinched his title last night by a brilliant game in which he prevented a four-cornered tie for first by beating Alfredo De Oro, 71-year-old Cuban, and a fellow New Yorker, Matsuyama won, 50 to 31, in 42 innings.

## VANDALS' DEFEAT BEAVERS, 31-25

MOSCOW, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Idaho's Vandals were out of the cellar today after handing the Oregon State Beavers a 31-25 thrashing in a northern division Pacific coast conference basketball encounter here last night.

The win pulled Oregon State down into third position and brought the Vandals up to fourth, while Washington State was shoved to the bottom of the heap.

It was a last session victory for Coach Rich Fox' men. Five points to the lead at the half-time intermission, the Vandals came back in the final period to take the lead, lose it by a single point, grab it again, and hold it until the final gun.

The two outfits meet in the second game of the series here tonight.

## BUNDY DECISIONS CLEVER FILIPINO

SEATTLE, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Andy Bundy, Portland negro, boxer, had proof today that he still is one of the leading featherweights of the northwest although he has been on the slier with a bad hand since last summer.

## LAKEVIEW SPORTS OPPOSE CHANGE IN SEASON ON DUCKS

Expressing the indignation of sportsmen in the Lakeview country for the proposed changes in the game law, concerning the duck season, advanced by the Oregon State Game commission, E. J. Boyle of Lakeview, an officer of the Game Protective association in Lake county, arrived in Medford yesterday to confer with local game conservationists.

The letter, addressed to the Oregonian by the local Game Protective association, inspired Mr. Boyle's visit, and he announced the wishes of his section to join Jackson county in opposing recommendation of a season opening November 1 and closing December 31.

In Lake county, he pointed out, the season is already late, for the lakes freeze up early and if any shooting is to be done it must be done before the big freeze. The proposal of the game commission, he stated, would upset Lake county's entire sports program. It is seldom that the thaw arrives in time to provide winter shooting during the season advanced by the game commission. The best hunting usually is found about the middle of October.

In Lake county, so far as the local citizens are concerned, Mr. Boyle stated, there is not so much objection to the bag limit of eight ducks, for the people live near the marshes and can visit them often. He added, however, that for the sake of visiting hunters, the section is much opposed to the suggested limit, realizing that hunters can not afford to come into the country for such a small reward.

Mr. Boyle was going from Medford to Klamath Falls today to consult conservationists and sportsmen there and will be returning later for a meeting of southwestern Oregon representatives, anticipated here.

## NEW DEAL URGED FOR DUCK FAMILY

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Dr. W. B. Bell of the division of biological investigations, United States bureau of biological survey, pleaded for a "new deal for ducks" before the American Game association today.

"We've got to get down to hard-headed business methods," he said. "We must provide sufficient breeding grounds and refuges and also evolve a simple plan for harvesting the surplus of the duck crop."

William Lovell Finley of Portland, Ore., member of the migratory bird advisory board, urged the return of reclaimed marsh and other submarginal lands to the public domain, for use as wild life sanctuaries.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Ernesto Cavelli's knockout solar plexus blow finished Sleepy Blount of Spokane in the main event of a fight card etched in crimson here last night.

Cavelli 144, Walls Walls, weathered a number of rights to the chin before dropping Blount, 140, in the second round.

Fighting hard from the start, Frankie Monroe, 137, Klamath Falls, plied up an edge on Harry Walls, 139, Longview, could not batter down in the third and fourth rounds. The decision was close.

In a preliminary to the Tilden-Vines match, Vincent Richards defeated Bruce Barnes, 6-4, 2-6, 8-3. In a one-set doubles match, Tilden and Barnes won from Vines and Richards.
