

### MEDFORD JUNIORS AND PARRISH PLAY FRIDAY, SATURDAY

#### Old Rivalry Will Be Renewed With Salem Basketeers—Tigers and St. Mary's Play Preliminary Games

Medford Junior high school will come into its own in athletics tomorrow night, when they meet the Parrish Junior high school basketball quintet of Salem, on the high school floor in the first of a two-game series, in the local principal encounter of the season.

Parrish has always been Medford's most formidable opponent, but the local boys look forward to playing them, for in addition to being real opposition, the Salem youngsters are the best of sports, and relations established between the school several years ago have been most pleasant.

Two years ago, on the local floor, Medford tied Parrish for state honors, winning the first game by two points, and losing the second in an overtime period by a similar score.

Last year at Salem, the Parrish boys won both games, but it took an overtime period to take the second game, and then the lead was only one point at the end of playing time. In this game, Medford was leading by one point, with only five seconds to play, when a foul allowed the Salem boys to tie up the score.

Jack Henderson, grandson of the late George Prescott, and a letterman of Medford Junior high school last year, is a regular on the Parrish team this year.

Preliminaries to both games will be played by the local high school team and St. Mary's All-Stars. The St. Mary's boys are a fast outfit, and say they are after some Tiger skins in the games this week.

A radio rally will be held tonight at 8:15, so tune in and hear the Junior pep club put on a real pep broadcast.

MOSCOW, Ida., Jan. 25.—(AP)—Oregon State's Beavers, with a 32-23 victory over Idaho here last night, were in a tie with Oregon for second place in the northern division Pacific Coast conference hoop race today.

The Vandals and Washington State kept each other company in the cellar.

After dropping Tuesday night's tussle, 31-25, the Beavers got revenge last night by putting on the pressure for a last period win. George Hibbard, forward, dropping in five shots from the floor and a trio of free tosses for 18 of his team's counters. The Vandals led at the half, 12-12.

After a week's idleness, the league-leading Washington Huskies will go into action again tomorrow night, meeting Oregon in the first of a two-game series, while the Beavers will shift across the state line to Pullman for a pair of contests with Washington State.

### WOLFE PINS TAR BY SPECTACULAR ROLLING SCISSORS

### NO SALES TAX FOR SMUDGE OIL, SPRAY

The Oregon tax commission has delivered an opinion holding that under the provisions of the proposed sales tax there will be no sales tax on smudge oil and sprays used in cultivation of fruit. This has been a moot question among fruitgrowers of the valley.

The tax commission holds that the tax would be "pyramiding," which is not allowed in the act. The same rule applies to other materials used in farm production and in the sale of farm produce.

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### PETROLLE, BEATEN BY ROSS, DECIDES TO HANG UP MITTS

\* NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Once more Will Petrolle a sturdy up-standing citizen, was back in the ranks of the unemployed today, a former prize fighter, with nothing to worry about except a bit of bond clipping now and then and that cigar store he owns in Duluth.

The old fellow folded his dun-colored Indian blanket and packed it away for the last time, ready to accept as final the 10-round beating Barney Ross, of Chicago, lightweight champion, gave him in the Bronx Coliseum last night.

"Tell them I'm through," he said as he shuffled down the ring steps in the big barn in the Bronx last night, thoroughly beaten by the brilliant little Ross. "I can't fight any more, so I'm not going to try."

In only one round, the ninth, when Barney obviously was coasting was Petrolle able to work his way laboriously to close quarters and gain the upper hand. Barney beat him once before in Chicago.

Every other round, and the unanimous decision of the judges, the referee and the 12,043 of the faithful who journeyed far into the fastness of the Bronx for the battle, went to Ross.

Ross shook the veteran badly at times, but never could floor him or bring him close to the knockout stage. The betters had made Barney a 3 to 1 favorite, despite Petrolle's weight advantage. Billy weighed 141½, Ross 136½.
