WAGE SCALE SET FOR STATE GROC SHOP EMPLOYEES

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 27.—(AP)—Salaries for state liquor store managers, district supervisors and clerical help in the state stores were announced here late today by State Liquor Administrator George L. Sammis.

All the salaries are subject to temporary reductions imposed by the 1933 state legislature.

Basic salaries of the three district supervisors will be \$300 a month with actual salaries now of \$248. Store managers will receive \$150 a month, reduced to \$132; store clerks \$110 a month, reduced to \$102.35; and cashiers and stenographers, \$80 a month, reduced to \$72.80.

Store personnel for Salem and Eugene has not yet been definitely decided and probably won't be announced until late next week, Sammis said. Sites for the stores in those towns will be announced some time next week.

Two representatives of the liquor administration are now in southern Oregon viewing store sites at Medford and Klamath Falls and interviewing prospective store employees. No report has been received from them yet, Sammis said.

LEGAL HITCH FOR STATE BORROWING

PORTLAND, Jan. 27.—(AP)—The circumstance that the Oregon PWA headquarters is not convinced that the state of Oregon may legally borrow \$1,500,000 for eight state projects, is delaying approval of the application for this amount of money.
