

Double Main Event Wrestling Card Scheduled at Armory Tonight

FRISBIE TO FACE PARALYZER HOLD IN HOUR MATCH

Frank Clemens, elongated Oklahoma grappler with the educated toes, likes his opponents big. So tonight, Promoter Mack Lillard has given him Fireman Ray Frisbie of Medford as a playmate in a one-hour match at the armory which will be the opening half of a double-barreled card. Lee Wolfe, Texas, rolling scissors expert, and Pete Belcastro, Sacramento, will trade grips and grunts in the top half of the show.

In taking on Frisbie, Clemens is giving away a lot of weight he may wish he had should the fireman decide to use his devastating flying scissors. It takes a big and durable opponent to stay on his feet when Ray's 208 pounds comes flying feet first through the air with an impact sufficient to jar the breath from a moose. In his "Indian paralyzer," however, the Oklahoma athlete has a dangerous hold, demonstrated with Pete Belcastro in last week's matches. Clamping an opponent's head between his feet, Clemens puts pressure on the cords of the neck which makes the best of them say "Uncle!"

If Wolfe can get the belligerent Belcastro softened up to the point where he can get in position for the rolling scissors the result in that entanglement should be a foregone conclusion. Once Wolfe gains this hold, the hapless opponent is banged to and fro on the mat until he is completely "out."

Belcastro will be a tough proposition for the scissors artist, however, as the Sacramento is rarely on the defense and prefers to carry the battle to his adversary. It's a hard matter to throw a man when he is doing most of the leading. Belcastro not only carries the fight into the enemy camp but invariably puts on a good show while he's doing it.

Seats for tonight's show will again be open on a first-come first-served basis with exception of two sections reserved for late comers and early ticket buyers. All space will go at a uniform price.

FIRST DEFEAT FOR FLASHY BLACK BOY

SEATTLE, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Championship aspirations of Henry Woods, 19-year-old Yakima, Wash., Negro lightweight, stood punctured today following his first beating in 56 starts, from the flying flats of Cecil Payne, dynamite loser of Louisville, Ky., in a 10-round boxing bout here last night.

Payne proved too good a "trial horse" for the young speedball, who had something like 28 knockouts, 23 decisions and seven draws to his credit before he caught the blasting fight smashes of the southerner and bounced on the canvas six times.

Three times the negro went down in the fourth, and twice again in the fifth. The negro was only saved from a knockout by the sound of the gong in the tenth as the referee was counting him out. Payne's arm was raised while seconds were working on Woods.

The negro weighed 136½ and Payne 138.

VINES TRIMS TILDEN IN HOMECOMING MATCH

PASADENA, Jan. 31.—(AP)—In a home-coming match that went according to the best traditions—the local hero won — Elsworth Vines marked up his eighth victory over William Tilden last night in their current tennis tour, defeating the veteran 6-2, 4-6, 7-5.

A capacity crowd of 2,000 fans turned out to cheer Vines, former national amateur champion, on to victory. Tilden won but four of the 12 matches played.

PORTLAND SIGNS COLLEGE PITCHER

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 31.—(AP)—Hal Turpin and Andy Peterson, both pitchers, were among the first players to sign 1934 contracts with the Portland Cubs of the Pacific Coast League.

President Thomas L. Turner announced signing Peterson, former Willamette University speedball pitcher, who was with New York Yankees affiliates last season. His home town is McMinnville.

Hal Turpin of Yoncalla, who allowed only 2.93 runs for each nine innings after signing with Portland in the middle of the season, was the first to have his contract inked.

Eldon Brees, catcher and outfielder with Kansas City in the Western League, mailed in his signed contract.

Contracts have also been signed by Chuck Hoag, catcher and infielder of Hillsboro and University of Oregon, and Bob Garretson, Portland first baseman.

Indian Jack Crim, 158, was able to dodge knockout punches, but Paul Karch, 154, Portsmouth, took a decided four-round decision from him.

Sleepy Blount, 139, Spokane, broke both hands in hammering a decision from Young Birky, 137, Clatskanie. A strong finish brought Joe Calder, 123, Seattle, a four-round decision over Frankie Gallucci, 123, Portland.

A double-knockdown draw resulted in a four-round bout between Jackie Webster, 130, and Ikey Boswick, 128, both of Portland.
