## VETERAN QUINTET PROMISES LOCALS REAL OPPOSITION

### Old Feud Will Be Renewed—Burgher's Boys in Fine Fettle, Except for Few Colds—Prelims Slated

Chemawa Indian school's colorful hoopers, always in the past known through friendly rivalry of the Medford high Tigers, will invade the camp of the sturdy paleface red and black Friday night at 8 p. m. and Saturday night at 9 p. m., following a preliminary in which the Tiger Cubs will tangle with the Junior high Bulldogs.

The Indians, strong contenders for the Marion county and district 12 championships in past years, are considered just as formidable this season, although the curtailment of enrollment at the government school eliminated some of the veteran players who might have returned.

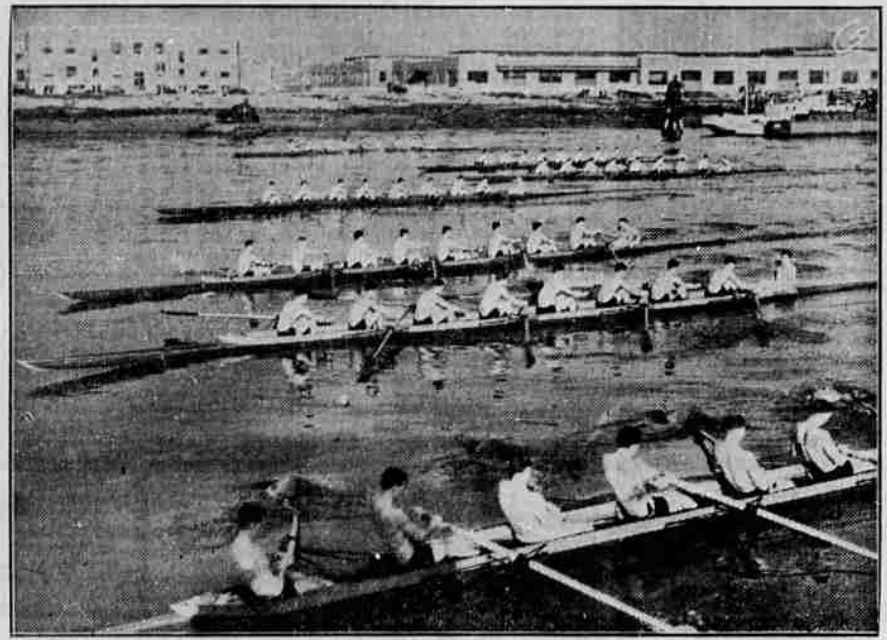
Veterans of the team which invaded Medford last year are the Shoulderblade brothers and Zundel and Keyote. The team is coached by "Rube" Sanders and "Buck" Larnard, the latter formerly prominent as a Willamette university athlete.

Coach D. K. Burgher reports his players in excellent condition except for the bad colds that are still hovering within a few of the first stringers.

Starting lineup for the game is not settled as yet, but it is rumored that Captain "Bill" Harris and Tom White will start at forwards. Max "Squirt" Ollitsky and Russ Brown at guards and Bob Hillman at center. Three of these boys played against the Indians last year, making the number of vets on both teams even. The Tigers split a two-game series with the Indians last year.

The Tiger Cubs will have their hands full when they meet Ray Henderson's Bulldogs in the curial raiser, scheduled to open at 7 o'clock Friday night and Saturday night at 8 o'clock. The youngsters from the Junior high always consider the Cubs as bitter a rival as Ashland Junior high teams, and that is "something."

## CRAIG WOOD HITS GOLFING STRIDE IN CALIENTE OPEN

AGUA CALIENTE, Mex., Feb. 1.—(AP)—Craig Wood, big blonde pro from Deal, N. J., who hit a detour on the golden golfing trail of the California this year after clearing most of the cash last season, was back on the road today.

A record-breaking 67 over this rolling course yesterday, four strokes under par, which cent him into the lead at the end of the first round of the Agua Caliente championship, brought him out of the wilderness.

A year ago Wood wound up with \$3,922.39 and three titles. This season he collected no laurels and only \$320.78 in cash.

But the leader of the 1933 parade has his work cut out for him if he is to reap the \$1,500 first place here Saturday. Only one stride behind him trailed Wee Bobby Cruickshank of Richmond, Va., who pushed in a 68-putt on the 28th for a 68.

Wiffy Cox, Brooklyn, and Paul Runyan, White Plains, N. Y., the defending champion, were in a strategic position as play started on the second round, shooting up 89's. Ralph Gulda, Los Angeles, runner-up to the 1933 national open champion, was fourth with a 70, still a stroke to the good over the par 71 for the 6,820-yard layout.

Wolfe was unable to get Belcastro into position for his dangerous rolling scissors and the Sacramento was too big and fast for any of the other holds which Les elected to use. The match kept the fans in an uproar even during the final minutes, when both muscle mangers were so exhausted they could not have thrown their own shadow.

Wolfe wants another shot at the Californian, and Promoter Mack Lillard has agreed to pit the pair for a finish match on next Wednesday's card.

Clemens, who before his match with Frabick had boasted he liked his opponents big, has lowered his sights a bit and now declares he don't like 'em quite so big. The Oklahoman clamped on his "Indian paralyzer" in hold for the first fall last night in 16 minutes. The indignity seemed to rouse the local fireman, who came back and roughed Clemens up a bit before pinning him twice with flying scissors in seven minutes and one minute, respectively.

Lillard is angling for a return of the popular Bunny Martin as a playmate for Clemens on the next card, and this should prove popular, as both Martin and Clemens have made good impressions here.

## WELLMAN, NOTED EXPLORER, DIES

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Walter Wellman, 76, explorer and first man to attempt a flight across the Atlantic ocean, died here today. He had been ill for three months when death came yesterday.

Although Wellman made four attempts to reach the North Pole, twice afoot and twice by air, he was best known for the attempted flight to London. It was made in 1910 and ended after 70 hours about 875 miles off Cape Hatteras. Wellman and his crew of five were rescued from the driftable America by the steamship Trent.

The first feat which brought Wellman into the public eye was finding and marking the exact spot where Columbus landed on Watling Island, or San Salvador.

## MIKULAK'S QUINT PLAYS SONS HERE FRIDAY EVENING

The "White Elephants" of the Southern Oregon Normal will offer two of the most outstanding basketball attractions in the history of the school within the next few days. On Friday, February 2, the famous Mike Mikulak All-Stars will appear in Ashland. This team, composed entirely of nationally famous football stars who have been outstanding basketball players during their athletic careers, has defeated the best teams in the state, including Union Oil of Portland, winners from both Oregon and Oregon States. On Tuesday, February 6, the whiskered House of David basketball team, without a doubt the most colorful and spectacular traveling basketball club in the world, will appear against the SONS at Medford. The game will be played on the high school court. Two days later, on Thursday, February 8, the same teams will play at Ashland, on the Junior high court.

The Mikulak Stars, led by "Iron Mike," all-American fullback this year at Oregon, are a powerful aggregation. Mike was an all-city forward at Minneapolis and is not a novice at basketball. Included in the lineup are such stars as Bernie Hughes, all-coast center and co-captain of this year's Oregon champions. Hughes was an all-state guard in basketball at Medford high.

Mark Temple, all-coast halfback and co-captain with Hughes at Oregon this year, is another star on the team. Temple played a star role at Pendleton high in basketball and later played with the Oregon freshmen. Chuck Wishard, veteran end, is the center. Wishard played one year of varsity basketball at Oregon and is a finished player. Bree Cuppetelli, all-coast guard this year and formerly an all-state basketball star in Minnesota, is a guard on the team.

That famous all-around athlete that is now backfield coach at Oregon, Johnny Kitzmiller, completes the roster. What a gathering of stars for a team of any kind. They have been playing to packed houses all over the state, and so far have escaped defeat. It will be a chance to see the boys who brought fame to Oregon from all over the country this year on an exceptional, championship football team coached by Prink Callison, ex-Medford high school mentor.

The House of David, led by Buck Buchanan, world's greatest ball passer, are the most clever basketball artists in the business. They give individual and team demonstrations that keep the fans on edge the entire evening. Red Johnston, star forward, and Brad Lair, six foot 11 inch center, are other stars. They are all bearded and promise action and color. They also promise to win the ball games. They seldom lose.

Incidentally, Southern Oregon Normal has something in the way of a basketball team to throw against these highly touted invaders. The SONS have won most of their games this year and right now seem to have the best team in history. They will let both of these teams have plenty of trouble and Coach Hobson is going after all three games.

Because of the several threats, contained in notes pushed under doors of the armory, attendance at public functions held in the building has been scant.

## ANIMAL CONTROL ON NORMAL BASIS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 1.—(AP)—Instead of reducing the budget of the federal control of predatory animals and rodents, to \$21,343, the federal biological survey service will continue its work in Oregon and the 10 other western states on a normal basis, according to a telegram from the Portland chamber of commerce from Washington, D. C.

The Oregon game commission, and cattle, sheep and horse raisers' associations had protested the threatened abandonment of the predatory animal control service.
