

16 INDICTED BY GRAND JURY, ONE RETURN SECRET

Sixteen true bills, one secret indictment, and two not true bills were returned by the grand jury, T. H. Bell Jr., Talent, foreman, which filed its final report Saturday morning.

In the secret indictment, which the district attorney described as "an aggravated case," the court fixed the bonds at \$2500. The party named in the indictment is not in custody.

True bills were returned as follows:

James L. Garrett, Butte Falls, charged with assault with intent to kill, bonds fixed at \$5000. It is alleged that Garrett shot a woman in the leg, as the climax of a birthday party, and during a dispute over the ownership of a jug of whiskey.

Alfred Poston, Pinesburg, assault while armed with a dangerous weapon. Poston is alleged to have attempted to hit a state policeman on the head with a gun, during an argument over game law violation. Present bail of \$1500 was continued.

James L. Coleman, two counts, one charging non-support, the other forgery. Bail was fixed at \$500 on each count.

Maudie Biden, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl, present bonds of \$1000 continued.

Robert Minor, charged with attempted burglary, bonds fixed at \$500.

John M. Price and William R. Price, charged with unlawful practice of mining engineering, liberty on own recognizance continued.

Roy Wright and Philip Hale, two counts charging possession of hash, and still operation, present bail \$1000 continued.

John Weidman, charged with burglary, also facing federal charge of liquor violation, bonds fixed at \$1000.

J. Stealt, charged with forgery, bail fixed at \$500. Harold Berry, two counts, obtaining money under false pretenses, and forgery, bonds fixed at \$500 each; James La Vergis, forgery, bonds fixed at \$250.

Next Saturday morning was set as the time for arraignment and hearing of pleas in the above cases.

The grand jury also reported that it had investigated the deaths of Sam Chisholm, in an auto accident on the Pacific highway near Gold Hill, and the death of A. J. White, in an auto accident on Kings highway last summer, without taking any action.

The grand jury reported no action in the case of C. H. Brown, former secretary of the self-styled "Good Government Congress." Brown was indicted by a previous grand jury, charged with "slandering a bank."

The indictment was ordered rejected to the grand jury, on a technicality.

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Complete Report Of Grand Jury

The special report of the grand jury, as filed Saturday with the court in full, is as follows:

"We, the grand jury of the county of Jackson, state of Oregon, to whom was referred the indictment returned by the previous grand jury of this county charging Joe Cave with involuntary manslaughter in connection with the death of one Everett Dahack on November 14, 1930, report as follows:

"That we have made a thorough and searching investigation of the charge, have examined 21 witnesses, made two separate trips to the scene of the tragedy, once with one of the officers who participated in the moonshine still raid, and once with two of the parties who were apprehended by the officers when the raid was made. We have examined all of the records available in connection with the coroner's inquest and the three other grand juries which have inquired into this charge. Also we have had before us during the investigation maps made immediately following the tragedy, as well as all of the other exhibits heretofore used. We have tried to comply strictly with the instructions of the court in our investigation of this much talked-of episode.

"We feel that the first two grand jury investigations of this matter should have been final, and the matter should have been closed at that time. We feel that no further prosecution is advisable nor is it justified under the evidence in the case.

"It is our opinion that there is insufficient evidence upon which to base an indictment, and if an indictment is returned it would be impossible to convict before a trial jury.

"From a consideration of the entire case we find there is a possibility that a shot from the rifle used by Joe Cave caused the tragedy, but it was an unavoidable accident. The officer was attempting, within his rights, to apprehend a person fleeing from the commission of a felony, and from where the shot was fired he could not see the deceased.

"The court in his instructions, informed us that if there was any question in our minds as to whether or not the local district attorney could give us a full, fair and complete service in the investigation we should so report to the court and he would obtain outside counsel for that purpose. Before we began our investigation the district attorney requested us to determine whether or not we desired an outside attorney, to assist in conducting the investigation. This we did and promptly informed Mr. Coddington that we desired his services. The district attorney, during all the days of this investigation, has done everything in his power to assist us and has rendered fair and efficient service.

"We believe that this matter should now be finally closed. The county has been put to hundreds of dollars of expense in these various investigations and we are therefore returning to you herewith a not true bill."

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MOTIVE LACKING IN CRUEL MURDER FRED RYAN'S KIN

News was brought here yesterday of the mysterious murder in Ukiah, Cal., of George Ryan, brother of Fred Ryan of this city, who returned from his funeral in the south.

"Complete mystery still surrounds the motive for the murder of George Ryan, well known business man, by Francis Scholl, associated with his father, Fred Scholl," the Ukiah press report of the case reads. "Mr. Ryan was shot down, apparently in cold blood about midnight as he entered his home. No one knows the facts leading up to the shooting, except that when Ryan came out of the Zimmerman poolhall about midnight, it is said, he found the young man seated in his car. It is thought the murdered man must have noticed his uninvited passenger was intoxicated and it is possible he drove toward his home in order to persuade Francis Scholl to get out of the machine or invite him in to have a cup of coffee with the intention of helping his condition. Just as Mr. Ryan stepped on his porch the rifle was fired at very close range, the bullet entering his side to tear a ghastly wound."

The story states that the prisoner, Scholl, confessed the shooting, but stated he had no grudge against the murdered man and was at a loss to account for his action.
