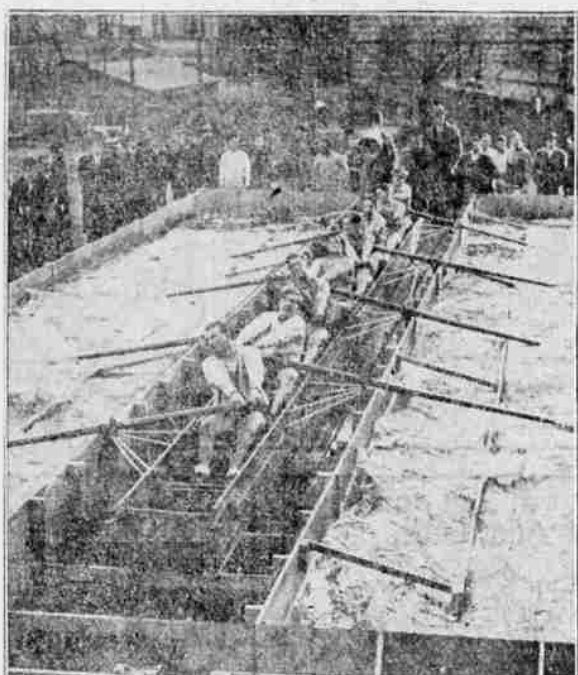


JAIL NEW ORLEANS VOTE REGISTRAR ROWING HARD—GETTING NOWHERE!

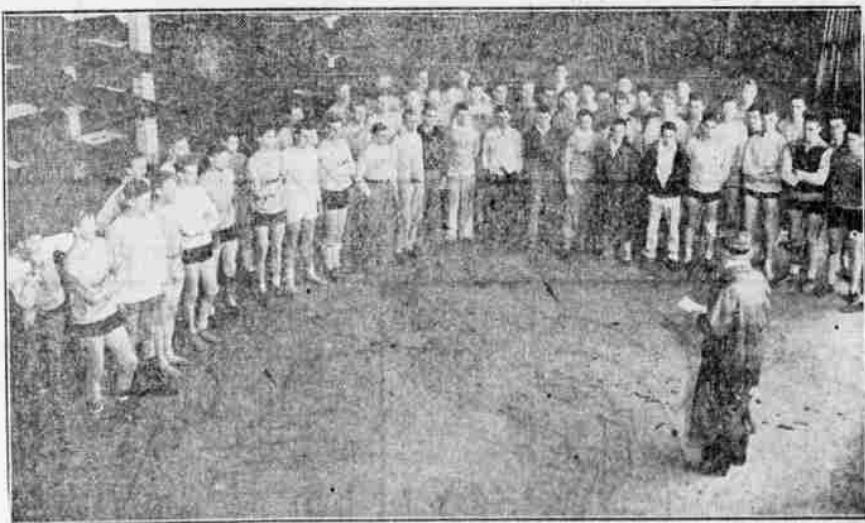

U. S. SPURS HUNT IN BREMER KIDNAPING

TREASURY TESTS WHISKEY BLENDS



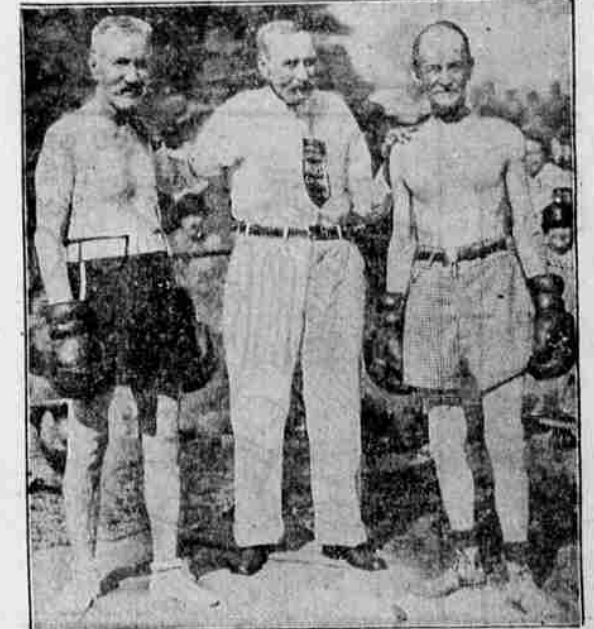
