

# Staters Rout Washington 28 to 18 to Stay in Coast Title Race

## BEAVERS OUTWIT HUSKIES TO GRAB SECOND VICTORY

Take Early Lead And Never Headed In Close Checking Game—Play Oregon Next

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 3.—(AP)—Oregon State college remained definitely in the championship running by routing the University of Washington basketball team 28 to 18 here tonight. Oregon State won from the Huskies 25 to 21 here last night.

As in last night's game, the Beavers led all the way. The first half playing of Coach "State" Gill's men was reminiscent of last season when they braced in midweek and swept to a north division and then a coast championship.

Oregon State dropped in two baskets at the start of the game and the snarling Huskies came back with a goal and foul conversion. However, Cook missed a free throw and Folen of Oregon State made it 5 to 3. The Huskies soon fell behind and were on the short end of an 18 to 7 half-time score.

Galer was again kept in leash during the first part of the game, but did score just before half-time. Once started, he went ahead to score 10 points and boost his season's total to 105.

Despite last night's hard-fought game, play did not slow down in the second half tonight. The Huskies continued their close-checking game, but the Beavers had learned they were a unit instead of five individual players. Their scoring was well divided, with Hibbard ahead with nine points.

The Huskies, who won eight in a row before coming to Oregon, meet the University of Oregon at Eugene Monday and Tuesday.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 3.—(AP)—Oregon State won 25 to 21 over the University of Washington here Friday night.

The thrilling defensive battle produced the first defeat of the season for the Huskies, who had won eight conference games.

Oregon State's defense limited Washington to five points in the first half. The Beavers' 18 to 7 half-time lead was boosted to 17 to 5 before the Huskies found themselves. Then the score was 17 to 13 before the Staters could catch their breath and bring to their lead.

Past breaks with floor-length passes to Captain Skeet O'Connell brought the Beavers' victory margin. Close checking any place on the floor and taking the ball from opponents featured the Huskies' play and speeded the game. The Orange state defense limited the Huskies to only a few set shots.

Galer, held scoreless the first half, led the Washington rally and tied O'Connell for scoring honors with nine points.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Another milestone set up by the blue eagle of NRA:

From now on noted athletes whose names are cited in advertising athletic goods must actually use them or must have designed the equipment in question. Otherwise the advertiser is a "chiseler" liable to have his blue eagle taken away, and be fined in the bargain.

A code requiring this was approved today by Hugh S. Johnson and will be good as law to the manufacturers on and after February 12.

Furthermore, the code provides that any time they hire a golf player to use a set of clubs or ball or pair of shoes of their manufacture they must pay him no less than \$1,500 a year. Tennis players can draw no less than \$1,000 for the same purpose.

## WIFFY COX WINS CALIENTE 'OPEN' SETS SCORE MARK

AGUA CALIENTE, Mex., Feb. 3.—(AP)—W. H. (Wiffy) Cox, won the fifth annual Agua Caliente open golf championship with a 72 hole score of 282 today, to establish a new scoring record for the event. The Brooklyn pro led the field at the end of the second round, held his position through a grueling third round and was still out in front by a stroke over Willie Hunter, Culver City, Calif., pro, when the firing was over on the Mexican front.

Cox ran the scale in winning the \$1500 first money. His four rounds moved up a stroke a day, 69-70-71-72, when more than a stroke advance would have been embarrassing. Hunter, 41 years old, lost Monday, day given a handsome birthday present of \$1000 for finishing second.
