### NORWEGIAN SKI MEN LEAD FIELD

SEATTLE, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Three Norwegian riders of the hickory staves, the class of the field, hold most of the honors today from the Seattle Ski club's annual tourney, held over the week-end in rugged Snoqualmie pass, with Tom Mobraaten, of Vancouver, B. C., the all-around champion. Henry Stenrud, also of Vancouver, the youngest of the trio, was the class A jumping champion, with leaps of 163 and 167 feet. Nardal Kladhahl, of Seattle, was close behind the other two, with jumps of 161 and 160 feet, but his form was not as good, the judges ruled.

Mobraaten, although jumping only 160 and 163 feet and finishing third in that event yesterday, with 218.7 points, had won the 10-mile cross country race the day before, compiling 240 points. His total of 449.7 points for the two events was the best of the field.

### BEARS TOO GOOD FOR COAST GRIDS

SAN DIEGO, Feb. 5.—(AP)—The Chicago Bears, professional football champions, have yet to find a team on the Pacific coast that can take their measure. The Bears played the All-Stars of Ernie Pinckert, former half-back star of the University of Southern California, here Sunday, and won, 7-0. Though the All-Stars lost, they had the satisfaction of holding the Bears to the smallest score rolled up by the professional champions in the coast tour.

As a matter of fact, the game came very nearly being a tie. It was only in the last ten minutes of play that the Bears scored and the touchdown came on a pass. Cliff Battles, left half, started one of those intricate aerial formations for which the Bears are famous, firing the ball from the All-Star 25-yard line to Bill Karr right end. Karr heaved the ball laterally for Bill Hewitt, the other end, and he rambled 15 yards to the goal line. Jack Manders, fullback, place-kicked the extra point.

The list includes the invitation "masters" tournament at Augusta, Ga., March 22-25 in which Bob Jones will make his return to competition after being out since 1930.

### 16 INDICTED WILL BE GIVEN HEARING COMING SATURDAY

Arraignment of 16 persons, indicted by the grand jury on charges ranging from minor forgery to assault with a deadly weapon, has been set by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, for next Saturday. A number of those indicted, personally, and through counsel, have advised the district attorney's office they will enter pleas of guilty.

Judge Norton expects to complete the present term of court for Josephine county this week. He will then prepare the civil and criminal calendar for the local term of court, which starts Monday, February 27. A new grand jury will be drawn at that time, and a petit jury called from the 1934 jury list, recently completed by the county court.

The present grand jury of which T. N. Bell Jr., of Talent is foreman, was advised by the court that they would not be called again, unless an emergency arises. The grand jury has been operative since last February.

No action was taken by the grand jury in the case of C. H. Brown, secretary of the self-styled "good government congress." Brown was indicted on a charge of slandering a bank, and referred to the present grand jury on a technicality.

John Weidmann, indicted for burglary, also faces a federal charge of illicit liquor rectification. He will be tried in the local court first.

Others indicted include Alfred Poston of Pinehurst, charged with attempted assault with a deadly weapon; James L. Garrett of Butte Falls, assault with a deadly weapon; Mangle Eldon, this city, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and James L. Coleman, indicted for non-support and forgery.
