

### COUNTY GROCERS SELECT LEADERS TO UPHOLD CODE

One of the largest meetings of grocers held in Jackson county for a long time was conducted at the Chamber of Commerce last Monday for the purpose of organizing a local code authority, it was announced today by Chamber of Commerce officials.

Over 50 grocers were present from all over the county and the meeting was held under the chairmanship of W. A. Gates, who was asked by the state code authority to form the local organization.

The retail grocers' code and other matters pertinent to the NRA as it relates to the grocers were read, following which the election of the members of the local code authority took place. Those elected were: H. A. Gibbs, representing the wholesalers; George Witters, representing the chain stores; Ralph Burgess, representing the Medford retail grocers; M. E. Kaegi, representing the Ashland grocers; and A. Hearn of Phoenix, representing the voluntary chain group.

A discussion was entered into by those present regarding hours, following which it was regularly moved that a maximum of 60 hours of store opening be maintained throughout the county.

Following the meeting those elected to represent the local code authority went into session and the following officers were elected: Chairman, H. A. Gibbs; vice chairman, Kaegi; treasurer, George Witters; and secretary, A. E. Banwell.

Complete information regarding the meeting has been sent to the state code authority and the national code authority, and it is expected that within a reasonable time a certificate of authority will be forwarded so that the organization can function.

The purpose of the organization is to maintain the fair price code as it relates to grocers throughout the county and any complaints regarding this in the future must be submitted to the members of the local organization above mentioned.

This is the second group which has been organized during the past month, the previous one being that of other retail merchants not in the food business, of which E. E. Wilson is the chairman.

### BYRD FLAGSHIP DEPARTS BASE

ABOARD ADMIRAL BYRD'S FLAGSHIP, Antarctica, Feb. 6.—(Delayed.) (Via Mackay Radio.)—The flagship of the Byrd Antarctic expedition sailed from the Bay of Whales shortly before noon today, bound for New Zealand, where she will be laid up for a year.

The flagship will return in December or January to take on the winter party. The vessel will remain at Port Chalmers or Dunedin, N. Z., until that time.

Several of the members of the crew remained behind to aid in completing the job of moving stores from the unloading docks on the bay to the permanent camp. They will go north when the Bear of Oakland, supply ship, sails.

### SHIFT TAXES ON MIDDLE INCOMES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—(AP)—The house ways and means committee today revised the bracket and rates slightly in the new revenue bill to relieve somewhat the burden on incomes of between \$8,000 and \$25,000. Brackets affecting such incomes were shifted.

Also shifted were some of those on incomes higher than \$25,000, in order to keep the expected additional revenue at \$300,000,000.

Representative Samuel B. Hill (D., Wash.) said the committee probably would report the bill tomorrow, but that it would not be ready for house action until next week.

### DOLLAR DROPS IN LONDON EXCHANGE

LONDON, Eng. Feb. 7.—(AP)—The United States dollar depreciated today in relation to the pound to the lowest rate since President Roosevelt's devaluation move, closing at \$3.01.

It strengthened somewhat late, after touching at \$3.05 to the pound, compared to the overnight rate of \$4.96.
