

Belcastro and Wolfe Wrestle to Finish on Tonight's Armory Card

PAIR TO SETTLE BATTLE STARTED LAST WEDNESDAY

A wrestling feud which began last Wednesday and was halted by the fall at the expiration of an hour without either muscle mauler having secured a fall will be renewed at the armory tonight when Leo Wolfe, Texas, and Pete Belcastro, Sacramento, meet in a finish match. There is no love lost between the pair and both are determined to settle the dispute tonight as to who is the best wrestler. The Texas will depend on his rolling scissors, while the scrappy Belcastro will utilize his speed and rough-house methods in an effort to win. Pete claims he has been practicing on a stopper for the scissors and declared he will wrap up the lad from Texas and end him back home like a sack of puds. He hasn't anything but that cisors hold, and I've got that stopper," said Belcastro.

Leo Milo, young and shifty mat-man of Pasadena, will meet Fireman Ray Frisbie in a one-hour match on tonight's card, and the fracas should prove a severe test for Frisbie. SONS WIN, 45-40, OVER WHISKERED BASKET WIZARDS

Led by Ward Howell and Len Yandle, the "White Elephants" of SONS defeated the artistic cagers of the House of David, 45 to 40 last night in the high school gym. The Tigers' second team defeated the St. Mary's All-Stars, 30 to 22, in a fast preliminary.

During the first few minutes and in spots throughout the game, the whiskered boys flashed a clever brand of roughness that kept them in the favor of the large crowd. It seemed that the referee saw the minor fouls and didn't see the outstanding ones. Little Len Yandle played a very good game at guard with his quick and speedy dribbling. Ward Howell consistently took the shots off the backboard to help his teammates keep possession of the ball. Howell was high point man for the SONS with 16 points. He was closely followed by Yandle with 14 points.

The flashy passing of Buck Buchanan kept the SONS guessing where the ball was. By some manner he would curl his arm around the ball, making motions to throw in a certain direction, and by merely uncurling his arm flip the sphere in another direction. Coupled with Buchanan's clever passing was the blocking of Costa, Lintville and Adams. Their clever way of handling the ball and stepping in front of a would-be guard, causing him to fall, kept the crowd amused. To top the evening, Buck Buchanan would fall face downward on the floor when something unusual happened. Paired with Buchanan was "Red" Johnson, the ace basket shooter of the evening, who when given a chance to take aim never missed the basket. Johnson made 26 points during the game. The bearded men gave SONS a scare in the fourth quarter when they nonchalantly scored repeatedly to put themselves within five points of the lead.

The Tigers, after a slow start, gradually wore down the boys from the All-Star quintet. The score at half-time was 14 to 10 in favor of the high school. High point man for Medford was Smith, with 9 points. High point man for the All-Stars was Hammack with 10 points.
