

DUNN URGED TO RUN AGAIN FOR STATE SENATOR

George Dunn of Ashland, senator from Jackson county, is being urged by friends to again make the race for the legislative post, where he is recognized as a conservative leader, and constructive worker.

Senator Dunn said this morning, "I have reached no definite decision as yet, but expect to make up my mind one way or the other within the next two or three days." Senator Dunn said a number of citizens of the county had asked him recently about his plans. He has served four terms in the legislature.

William N. (Farber Bill) Carle, Applegate farmer and dairyman, waited in town yesterday and stated the "state senatorial bee is still buzzing in my bonnet."

"If Senator Dunn runs, it will be a pleasure to be beaten by such a good man," Carle stated. He also said "the time has come for the farmer to start thinking." Carle said he would not run for the lower house, and "it will be senator or nothing."

The local campaign has been marked so far by death of "self-starters." There also are signs that the people, profiting by experience, will be more careful in their primary selections. The voters are "weighing" the prospective candidates more than in 1932.

A "secret" meeting is reported as being held Monday night in a house on South Central avenue, when candidates were discussed. There were 15 people at the meeting. A candidate for sheriff, heretofore mentioned, was "pronounced all right, but he has no chance." There was one slightly "fiery speech," and a pleasant time was had by all, according to information.

The final date for filing is April 3. To date Robert E. Bell has filed for sheriff and Jesse L. Neil has filed for precinct committeeman from the Bellevue precinct. Both are Democrats.

MANY INDICTED TO PLEAD GUILTY IN COURT SATURDAY

Seven or eight of the 16 men indicted by the last grand jury for crimes ranging from assault with a deadly weapon to non-support, are scheduled to enter pleas of guilty when arraigned before Circuit Judge H. D. Norton Saturday morning. Judge Norton will return from Josephine county tomorrow night.

Trial has been asked by James L. Garrett, charged with assault with a deadly weapon. Garrett allegedly shot a woman guest in the leg, at a birthday party at Butte Falls, when she is said to have attempted to depart with a jug of moonshine, providing refreshments for the party.

Alfred Poston of Pinehurst, indicted for threatening to hit a state trooper over the head with a deadly weapon last fall, during a dispute over a game law violation, will also ask a jury trial. Poston is at liberty on \$1500 bonds.

Mattie Biden, local resident, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, will also ask a jury hearing. Abbie Gilbride, the girl in the case, is now an inmate of a Portland correction home. Biden waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury. He is at liberty on \$1,000 bonds. Notice of appeal of the girl's case to the circuit court from the juvenile court has been filed. The girl, in her testimony before the justice court and the juvenile court, stoutly defended Biden, claiming he had only befriended her.

James L. Coleman, indicted for alleged non-support and forgery, the latter an old charge, also desires a trial. His wife and three children have been on the latter list. Coleman now offers to take his family back to their former home in Arkansas, the district attorney's office says.

John Weidman, indicted for burglary, and facing a federal charge of rectification of liquor without a license; Harold Berry, indicted on two counts of forgery; Harold Bailey, indicted for forgery; J. Skell, indicted for forgery; and James LaVergie, indicted for forgery, will also enter pleas.

The criminal docket for the term of court starting February 27, will be prepared next week.
