pulling and hauling which has wrecked many cabinets began. He found that supporters of former Premier Edouard Herriot were keenly anxious that their leader might be given a place in the Doumergue cabinet.

Other factions had similarly controversial views on every other possibility mentioned. The strong veterans of French politics have gained as many enemies as friends in their careers.

Doumergue's insistence on a political truce was based on the controversy he encountered. Calm prevailed throughout the day concurrent with Doumergue's return to the capital, but toward nightfall minor rioting was renewed on the boulevards.

Hoodlums Gather Police charged demonstrators who gathered around the Madeleine church and several crowds of hoodlums gathered in the Place de la Concorde, but clashes did not immediately occur.

Of the more than 1000 rioters arrested in the two days of disorders in Paris, 88 were tried today. Nine were sent to jail for terms of eight days to three months—the charge: "Window breaking and hitting rival demonstrators."

The other 49 were released, as well as the rest of those arrested. In the eight days' rioting which preceded that of Tuesday and Wednesday, 2000 persons were arrested, held overnight and discharged.

CUBE BUTTER UP ONE-HALF CENT

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8.—(AP)—All cube butter prices were up a half cent for the day, following a belated session of the produce exchange, where prices are following other markets fully a day late on account of the late hour of the session. Butterfat was firm to higher in spots.

Trading in the egg market was holding up quite well and at generally sustained values for better quality offerings. Storage operations were getting under way in the Pacific northwest.

In spots higher prices were being offered and paid for live chickens as a result of the short supply in sight.

Sky Map of Entire Country Planned By New U. S. Weather Bureau Chief

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—A daily map of America's weather three or four miles up in the sky, showing conditions prevailing in the upper air over the entire nation at once, will be the basis for a plan of increased accuracy in forecasting now in preparation. Actually there will be a series of sky weather maps prepared daily, perhaps several times a day, showing temperature, amount of moisture in the air and wind direction at different levels up to three or four miles. They will be part of the forecasting system known as "air mass analysis" which the new chief of the weather bureau, Willis Jay Gregg, plans to introduce on a large scale.

Daily, under this plan, airplanes of the weather bureau, army and navy will zoom up from airports at 20 to 25 strategic points over the United States. They will climb to 17,000 feet or higher, carrying instruments that make an automatic record of temperature and moisture of the air from the ground up and back. At the same time small pilot balloons will be released and their drift at different levels watched to learn how the air is moving.

The maps made from these data will fit one above another like the floors of a building, and will give an accurate picture of behavior of the warm and cold masses of air whose movements are the cause of weather changes which government scientists seek to predict.

The meetings of these masses are at the root of all weather, Gregg explains. The warm air, full of moisture, moves up from the south, rides over an advancing mass of heavy, cold polar air along what is known as a "warm front." The rising warm air is cooled, its moisture condenses and falls as rain or snow.

Meanwhile the cold air is pushing under the warm air mass on another so-called "cold front." This causes another kind of weather, short, gusty squalls of rain or snow, over small areas. Sharp changes of temperature and wind direction go with both types of weather. Duration and severity of such storms depend upon the wind direction, amount of moisture in the air and the angle and speed at which the warm air rises. Much of this, says Gregg, can be predicted by the method of air mass analysis.

Gregg served 16 years as head of the weather bureau's aerological division before being appointed the new bureau chief by President Roosevelt. His job was exploration of upper air secrets and organization of the weather reporting system that now serves the 25,000 miles of government-supervised airways over the United States.

Jail Fifty ASTORIA, Ore., Feb. 8.—(AP)—The city jail at Warrenton was described by the Clatsop county grand jury today as unsanitary and as no fit place to confine prisoners. Conditions at the jail were characterized as "intolerable," and the report said the bedding and furnishings were "filthy."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—A notice of a hearing on the proposed code for marketing branches of the egg and poultry industry of the Pacific coast was issued today by Secretary Wallace.
