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GRAZING FEE FOR NATIONAL FOREST ANNOUNCED TODAY

Grazing fees for the Rogue River National forest, for the year 1934, were announced by the forestry service today. For cattle, the fee will be 52 per cent of the 1931 fees, and for sheep, 53 per cent of the 1931 fees.

The fee, according to forest officials is based on the selling price of stock in 1933, as compared with the selling price for 1931.

The average weighted price received by the producers in 11 western states, in 1933, for accepted livestock products, were \$3.48 per one hundred pounds for beef cattle, and \$4.85 per 100 for lambs. These prices were used to determine the grazing fees for this year.

During 1933, there were 5400 head of cattle grazing in the Rogue River National forest, 117 head of horses, and 10,100 sheep. Forestry records show that there were 142 owners of the horses and cattle, and 12 owners of sheep.

ILLEGAL OPERATION HELD DEATH CAUSE

ASTORIA, Ore., Feb. 9. — (AP) — Held on \$2000 bond, C. C. C. Rosenberg, 70, of Astoria, was in jail today on a warrant based on a grand jury indictment returned Wednesday charging him with manslaughter in connection with the death in a hospital here Sunday of Mrs. Sally Juniper, 22, of Astoria. The complaint alleges that Mrs. Juniper died from blood poisoning resulting from an illegal operation. Rosenberg was acquitted last fall of a similar charge growing out of the death of a Hammond woman.

COLUMBIA TRUCK-BOAT SERVICE IS PROTESTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 9. — (AP) — Establishment of a combination truck and boat freight service up the Columbia river to central and eastern Oregon, planned by the Shaver Forwarding company of Portland, was protested in a public utilities commission hearing here Wednesday by 15 trucking companies, which declared such an organization would result in a monopoly that would ruin other common carriers operating in that area.

A meeting will be held at the Valley View school house Thursday evening to meet with some of the county officials to consider the postponed change in the county road from here to Ashland. Everyone in the neighborhood is welcome.
