

COP'S KISSES AIRED IN COURT AS WIFE WINS SUIT



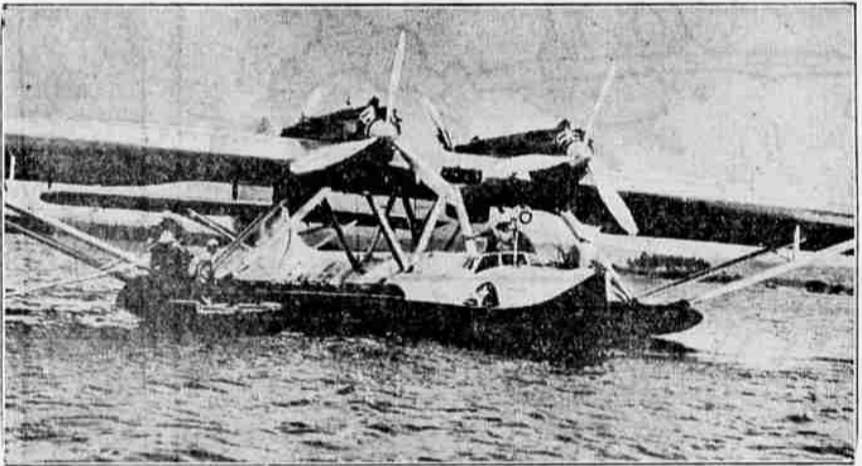

SCREEN ACTRESS WEDS BEFORE THROUG AT STATION



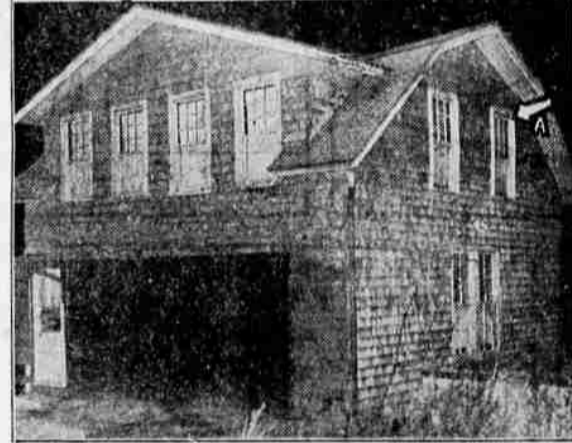

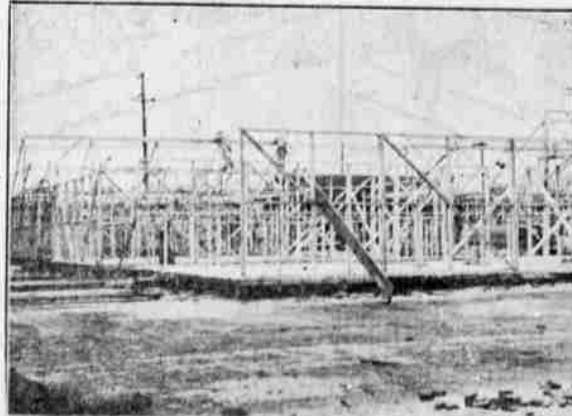


GRACE ROOSEVELT AND FIANCE
