

# Fast Grappling Scheduled for Armory Tonight

## FRANZ, CLEMENS WILL TANGLE IN FEATURE MATCH

Promoter Mack Lillard has cooked up a fine dish of wrestling for Medford fans at the Armory tonight with Sailor Franz, tattooed star of San Diego and Frank Clemens, Oklahoma "Indian paralyzer" exponent as the main course. Clemens, a lanky and fast muscle mangle has appeared here twice and given a good account of himself in both appearances. Franz is a chunky, tough and experienced matman who asks no quarter and gives none. They will wrestle one hour or two out of three falls.

Fireman Ray Frieble, of Medford who has been having things all his own way of late, will face a man as big as himself and plenty tough when he steps into the ring for a 45-minute semi-windup match with Al Schnell, 209-pounder of Sydney, Australia. Frieble boasted recently that he was going out to win as quickly as possible hereafter, by orthodox means, if use of rough stuff is necessary. Schnell carries a reputation for absorbing punishment and squirming out of tight places to pin his opponent. This match should provide a lot of entertainment for the cash customers.

For a 30 minute curtain raiser, Lillard has matched Bunny Martin, Oklahoma flash, and Heinie Olson of Portland. Martin specializes in a bone-crushing flying mare which he executes with lightning speed. Olson is seen often in up-state rings where rough and ready grappling is common and he should give the Oklahoman a run for his money.

The show will open at 8:15 and one price will buy seats in any part of the house except in two sections reserved for late comers and those who prefer to buy their tickets early.

## VANDALS DESTROY OREGON'S HOPE BY 34 TO 22 VICTORY

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 14.—(AP)—A vandal is one who wilfully destroys. That's just what the University of Idaho Vandals did to Oregon State's basketball championship hopes in last night's decisive 34 to 22 upset here. The night before the Beavers almost tripled the score on the downtrodden Vandals.

Nothing but the weirdest of upsets can now keep University of Washington from returning to the coast conference north division pedestal. The Huskies have lost but two games and have only four left to play. The second place Beavers have lost five and have four of their toughest games ahead.

Big Howard Grenier led the Vandals in the first half and Sophomore Norman Iverson caged four rapid-fire goals at the outset of the second half to put Oregon State in a hopeless maze. Idaho led, 15 to 12, at half-time.

It was Idaho's first victory of a four-game schedule in Oregon the past five days. It dropped the first two games to University of Oregon.

Oregon State, the one conference team, which has defeated Washington this season, will meet the Huskies in Seattle Friday and Saturday nights of this week.

## CENTRAL POINT QUINT TRIMS PHOENIX 38-23 IN FAST CAGE BATTLE

Central Point's basketball team again scored highly when they defeated the Phoenix high school squad 38-23, at the Central Point gym last night.

Central Point started with a terrific pace in the first half but were unable to stand it. As a result, the Phoenix players kept the tide in their favor, 9-6, at the end of the first quarter, and 16-14 at the end of the second.

In the third quarter, the game was nip and tuck. Whenever the Pointers would chuck a mark, the lads from Phoenix were right behind them. However, during the last of that period and for the remainder of the game, Central Point forged ahead, never letting up on their hold.

At times the game was ragged, then it would swing back into the fine arts of basket throwing. The powerful offense of Central Point, built around Virtue and Cassa, seemed to water now and then as the "stars" passed swiftly to and from. Turpin, Phoenix's flashy center, added much to the excitement and thrills, chalking up 12 points for his team.

"I couldn't get started," he explained today. "I layed out too long. In the late rounds I couldn't see any more because of the blood in my eyes. I need more fights. I'm as good as I ever was. I will yet win my championship back."

## HAMAS GIVEN NOD OVER SCHEMLING TO UPSET 'DOPE'

Comeback Trail Proves Rocky Road for Former Champion — Couldn't Get Started—Gate Is \$38,000

By EDWARD J. NEIL, (Associated Press Sports Writer) PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The Black Ulan of the prize ring, Max Schmeling, was the forgotten man of boxing today. He has forgotten how to fight.

He started last night on his comeback trail, a former heavyweight champion of the world, and he stumbled down to the end of 12 rounds, still trying, still grinning, still brave as any man who ever pulled on leather—but beaten and torn by the gloved fists of Steve Hamas.

Hamas is the 26-year-old youngster from Passaic, N. J., who made his first athletic name half a dozen years ago as a fullback at Penn State. He came out of college, took up boxing. He once knocked out Tommy Loughran in two rounds. He has lost two decisions to the former lightweight champion.

A crowd of 15,000, the largest to see a fight in Philadelphia since Gene Tunney won the heavyweight title from Jack Dempsey in the sequent-centennial stadium in 1926, saw Schmeling hesitate, fumble, try and fall against the rugged, clean-cut youngster. That crowd paid \$38,000 to see Schmeling fall as completely as he did last summer, when Max Baer knocked him out in 10 rounds in the Yankee stadium in New York.

Hamas' Nose Broken.

With the last punch of the eleventh round, a right hand smash, he broke Hamas' nose and the blood from the two of them crimsoned them to the waist.

At the end, Schmeling, only 28, was the stronger of the two, but the decision of Referee Spud Murphy and two judges was unanimous. Schmeling won only three rounds.
