### PILSNER BEER FROM MEDFORD WATER WILL BE ON TAP SATURDAY

T. P. Risteigen, manager of the Southern Oregon Brewing company, located in the Gold Seal Creamery building on North Fir street, announces that tomorrow the new Pilsener beer, made of Medford's million dollar water, will be placed on sale in this city.

The beer, placed in kegs today, has been brewing since December 4. Both 2 1/2 and strong beer will be distributed by the Southern Oregon Brewing company in northern California as well as Klamath Falls and other southern Oregon points.

According to Ted Gebauer, the plant will now operate two shifts, which will provide employment for about twenty men.

In two shifts, it was pointed out, the brewery here can run through two batches, or 2400 gallons of beer. It takes about 18 hours to put the first batch through and seven hours for the second, those in charge stated.

## GILL, BROCKWAY TO DEBATE SALES TAX WEDNESDAY NIGHT

A committee has been appointed by the Roxy Ann Grange to make arrangements for the sales tax debate to be staged here next Wednesday night at the Medford armory by Ray Gill, master of the Oregon State Grange, and A. E. Brockway, Jackson county representative in the legislature. On the committee are J. G. Cameron, Chas. E. Rose and C. C. Hoover. They will name the chairman for the evening and decide upon the other arrangements.

The program will be conducted under debate rules with Representative Brockway, the affirmative speaker, opening the debate with a 45-

minute talk. Grange Master Gill will follow, presenting the negative arguments. He will be given one hour in which to do this. Brockway will then finish up the debate with the customary 15-minute rebuttal. A free will offering will probably be taken to defray the expense of opening the armory for the occasion. The southern Oregon public is invited to come to the open meeting and hear both sides of the sales tax question presented by two of the strongest supporters in the state of the affirmative and negative arguments.
