

Klamath Cagers Invade Medford Tonight

LOCALS VOW TO WIPE OUT STAIN OF FORMER DEFEAT

With final preparations well laid, the Tigers of Medford and the Pelicans of Klamath will meet in the high school gym tonight at 8 o'clock, to finish their two-game series which started in Klamath Falls with a defeat for the Tigers.

From this contest a definite idea will be gained by Medford as to its strength relative to that of Ashland high school.

Cocher French of Klamath high school has been drilling his boys on the Medford formation for the past week and is confident that they will make a showing equal to that attained when the Tigers invaded Klamath and lost, 13 to 23.

From the standpoint of experience, the teams are about equal. Every man on the Klamath team has had at least one year's experience, and the same is true of the Medford quintet.

A large crowd of Klamathites will be in Medford tonight to support their team. Medford high last year defeated Klamath high when they played here but suffered a defeat when they played in the Pelican city.

Some of that "old-fashioned" type of rivalry is in the air and Medford boys are "hopped" to wipe out the stain of the early season defeat.

The Tiger Cubs are "rarin'" to go in their preliminary game scheduled for 7 o'clock.

WARNER SYSTEM GAINS FAVOR OF MAJOR COACHES

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—(AP)—The front ranks of eastern college football staffs, after a notable series of shake-ups, now have been substantially filled for 1934, making it possible to judge some of the salient effects.

Perhaps the most noteworthy trend among the major universities is the switch away from the Notre Dame offense and toward the Warner type of game. In other words, the backfield hop seems to be yielding to the charge of the wingbacks.

Yale and Navy have discarded the elements of Notre Dame football upon which their play has been based for the past few years. Both will rebuild around the cornerstone of the old punt formation, plus some features of the Warner system, with "Ducky" Pond taking charge at New Haven and Lieut. Tom Hamilton assuming control at Annapolis this spring.

Warner football also will be taught at Dartmouth by the new staff, headed by Earl (Red) Blaik, with Harry Ellinger, and Andy Gustafson as chief assistants.

Army, Pittsburgh and Colgate already are well established among the eastern strongholds of Warner system football, in addition to which "Pop" Warner himself has moved his gridiron work shop back east. "Pop" soon will prepare for his second season at Temple university, Philadelphia.

Big Ten League Influences
The influence of the Big Ten type of play, which has been gaining popularity, will be felt as Glen Harmons of Purdue becomes head coach at Michigan and Benny Friedman, ex-Michigan all-America quarterback, takes over the job at City college of New York.

Notre Dame football, however, remains the big influence at Duquesne, where Joe Bach replaces Elmer Layden as head coach this year. Pupils of the late Knute Rockne also hold sway at Villanova, Holy Cross, and Fordham.

New York university, Bucknell and West Virginia, which sent Earle (Greasy) Neale and Denny Myers to Yale as Pond's chief assistants, have yet to complete their 1934 staffs. Carl Snavely left Bucknell to take the head coaching job at North Carolina university while Howard (Jake) Cann has resigned at N. Y. S., where the emphasis or de-emphasis of football still is the main question.

Army Staff Filled
Army's youthful head coach, Lieut. Gar Davidson, yesterday announced completion of his staff, two vacancies which were created by the departure of Blaik and Ellinger to Dartmouth. The newcomers, both former West Point players and coaches are Lieut. Blackbear (Babe) Bryan and Lieut. Edward Doyle.

Bryan will be Davidson's first assistant this year and Doyle will coach the ends. Lieut. Bill Wood has been elevated to chief backfield coach, replacing Blaik, while Lieut. Maurice (Mor) Daly will be chief line coach, succeeding Ellinger. The other aides on a staff of six are Lieut. Laverne (Blondy) Saunders, assistant line coach, and Lieut. Edward (Red) Reeder, assistant backfield coach.

TENNIS STARS TURN PRO AFTER LOSING DAVIS CUP

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—(AP)—The new slogan in tennis seems to be: "Lose the Davis Cup and turn professional." Big Bill Tilden, Ellsworth Vines and Henri Cochet all forsook amateurism after setbacks in the blue ribbon event of international tennis, and their business manager, Bill O'Brien, went on record today with the statement that Fred Perry, British ace, will turn professional this year, if England loses the Davis Cup.

No offer has yet been made to Perry, according to O'Brien, but it is known that the British star, who holds the United States amateur singles title, has already given some consideration to professionalism, pending developments in his amateur career. If and when he should decide to forsake the almon-pures, he will be welcomed with open arms by the current professional clan.

O'Brien's statement was made in connection with a dinner given last night in honor of Cochet and his French partner, Martin Plas, who meet Tilden and Vines in the first of a series of team matches next week at Madison Square Garden.

Cochet shrugged in response to a question on his opinion of this year's Davis Cup prospects, but then added, with the help of Col. John Reed Kilpatrick as interpreter: "It should be between America and England in the challenge round."

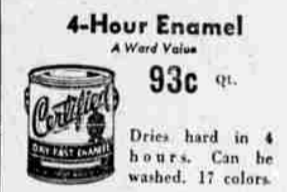

Mother Knows How To Make the Family Happy

HERE IS HER RECIPE FOR DELICIOUS BUTTER COOKIES

1½ cups flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
2-3 cup butter
Sift flour, measure and resift with the baking powder and salt. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, stirring until a fluffy creamy mass is obtained. Add well beaten egg and vanilla, then the milk and flour alternately, stirring only until flour is dampened. Roll dough and roll to about 1-8 inch thickness. Cut cookies and place on lightly buttered baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 8 to 10 minutes. Yield: About 4 dozen cookies.
