

CONG. MOTT SEES EARLY RETURN OF AIR MAIL PLANES

More encouraging news regarding the prospects for early renewal of airmail service through Medford, scheduled to cease Monday at midnight, was received yesterday in a wire from Congressman James W. Mott.

The wire read: "Went over airmail situation with post office department in detail this morning. Am assured suspension through Medford will not last longer than three or four days from time army commences operation of airmail. The Medford-San Francisco line is designated in present plan as secondary in importance to transcontinental main line, but has been placed in the zone of first priority in its class. This means it will be among the first of secondary lines to resume service. Resumption will commence with one plane per day instead of two. Will do everything possible to secure complete resumption of service in as short time as possible."

A wire was received from Senator Chas. L. McNary Friday, giving Medford equally strong assurance that the discontinuance of service here would not be for long.

The United States army is scheduled to take over the airmail service immediately after midnight Monday.

TRANSIENT TRIO SUSPECTED SAFE ROBBERY EFFORT

Being held for investigation in connection with the attempted robbery of the safe between 11 and 12 o'clock Friday night of the Samson Feed store at 229 North Riverside, William Johnson, 30; Charles York, 19, and Arthur Hine, 18, transients, were arrested Saturday morning and turned over to the Medford city police.

Johnson, who arrived in Medford Thursday, was arrested at Ashland, while York and Hine were returned from the Klamath Junction where they were apprehended.

According to Chief of Police Clatus McClede, the feed store was entered by the glass being broken in the front door, and the lock unfastened. The large doors on the safe were unlocked, and an attempt was made to break the lock off the inside door, with an axe.

Investigation showed that the axe had been stolen from 401 East Fifth street.

Nothing was reported missing from the safe or store. The burglary was discovered at midnight by the city police patrol.

THIS CITY LAID OUT 50 YRS. AGO

Fifty years ago yesterday the new town site was laid out on the Oregon & California line for the location of the city of Medford, according to a note in the Fifty Years Ago column of The Oregonian.

The small item, plucked from that newspaper of February 17, 1884, reads:

A new town site has been laid out on the Oregon & California line, nearly completed to Phoenix, on which will be built the future great city of Medford.

TRAILS' END FOR JAMES P. DINKENS

James P. Dinkens, picturesque mountaineer of the Beagle district, one of southern Oregon's best known men, called "Jim" by friends throughout the state; died here yesterday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Roy Buckingham, 236 South Central at 10:45 a. m. He had been ill but a short time, having enjoyed unusually good health until the illness came, which marked the end of his journeys over mountain trails, glorified for many folk in the writings of Ben Hur Lammpan of The Oregonian and other newspaper men. He was about 70 years of age.

Death was caused by an acute heart attack. The body is at the Conger funeral parlors and a complete obituary with arrangements for services will be announced Monday.

Besides his daughter Mrs. Buckingham, Mr. Dinkens leaves one son, Wallace Dinkens of Medford, and hosts of friends in country and city, who will mourn his passing.

FARRELL RETURNS FROM TRIP EAST ON LOAN MATTERS

Having spent the past three weeks in Washington, D. C., representing the irrigation districts of the state, Attorney Frank P. Farrell returned to Medford Saturday morning, reporting favorably on his trip east.

While Mr. Farrell was in Washington, loans of approximately \$450,000 and \$68,000 were made to the Medford and Rogue River irrigation districts, respectively. Loans for the retirement of bonds had previously been made to the Talent and Gold Hill districts, giving southern Oregon four of the six grants in the state.

Mr. Farrell stated that the Eagle Point loan had been temporarily delayed. He added, however, that further appropriations are expected, and it is probable all will be made in the next year.

Time for refinancing has been extended a year, Mr. Farrell said. Twenty-six districts in Oregon have made applications for loans.

"A definite upturn in business is noticeable on the Atlantic coast and conditions are decidedly better, making a more cheerful attitude prevalent in that section," he declared.

BAUCOM MEMORIAL PLANS ARRANGED

Plans for the dedication of the monument on the Pacific highway north of Grants Pass, honoring Burt M. Baucum, are nearing completion, according to Major W. H. Ellensburg of this city, who is chairman for the program.

Major General George A. White of Salem, commanding the 41st division, National Guard, and General Thomas E. Rilea have written Major Ellensburg they plan to attend the service.

According to present arrangements, the program will open with a selection played by the Grants Pass high school band, after which Major Ellensburg will make introductory remarks, to be followed by prayer.

Tom Miller of Grants Pass, former Josephine county district attorney, will give an address, after which the band will again play and Major General White will speak.

All National Guardsmen of southern Oregon, with Major Walter Abney, 240th Coast Artillery, in command, will attend as a battalion. This will include the units from Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass.

Captain Lee M. Bown of the Oregon state police, will be in charge of all the state policemen of southwestern Oregon who will attend.

During the service the highway will be blocked, as the monument is located near the spot where Baucum was killed, on the highway.

WRESTLER-EDITOR BUYS FEHL PLANT

Robin Reed, wrestler-editor of Reedsport and former Olympic weight champion of the world, is here to enter the Medford newspaper field with a shopping guide, he announced last night at the Hotel Allen, where he and Mrs. Reed were guests. He stated that he had purchased from L. Niedermeyer the equipment of the former Pacific Record Herald, published by court judge Earl H. Fehl, now serving a term in state prison for vote stealing, and would start publication of the shopping guide as soon as arrangements can be completed.

The sum paid for the equipment was not revealed by Reed. The name under which the publication will appear, he stated, he had not determined. He said, however, that he was entering the shopping guide field here, feeling that it was one not covered to date. The publication will be given free distribution, he stated.

Office space, he also stated, had not yet been definitely leased.

Reed is now publisher of the Port Umpqua Courier at Reedsport.

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PRISON CELL TO FOUR OFFENDERS ON GUILTY PLEAS

Robert Minor, charged with the attempted burglary of Strang's drug store last January and who possesses a prison record, the authorities say, was sentenced to serve two and one-half years in state prison by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton Saturday morning. This is the maximum sentence for an attempted burglary.
