RURAL DRAMATICS WINNERS TO MEET IN CITY SATURDAY

The winners of the rural dramatics contest, who will contend in this city next Saturday for the county title, were announced today following the opening of the judges' decisions at the office of Mrs. Mabel Mack. They are: Eagle Point in the first district; Belview in district No. 2, and Jacksonville in district No. 3.

The three teams will present their plays for the entertainment of the public at the Junior high school here Saturday night, beginning at 8 o'clock. The winners in the final competition will be sent to Corvallis to compete with other casts of the state on February 29.

The Eagle Point and Belview plays were presented last night. The first team put on "Maria," a drama, directed by Mrs. Floyd Barnett. The Belview team presented "The Dear Departed," a comedy, directed by Mrs. George Andrews. "Ambition" was the title of the play presented by Jacksonville, under the direction of Joe New. It is also a drama.

The judges' decisions were opened this morning by the rural dramatics contest committee, composed of Miss Clair Hanley, chairman; Victor Bursell, Mrs. Charley Hoover, Mrs. O. C. Meiser and Mrs. Mabel O. Mack.

The plays as a whole this year have been much better than those produced in previous contests and interest in the events has been much keener in all communities, the leaders announced today.

The annual presentation of plays in the rural communities is sponsored by the extension service of Oregon State college.

MORE EGGS GO TO COLD STORAGE

Increasing movement of eggs into coolers has followed the recent setting of sale of cold storage pack egg price by the Pacific Egg Producers in convention in Portland.

Not only has there been an increased demand for eggs to go into storage, but the market has acted much better, although receipts continue to show seasonable increase.

The action of the P. E. P. in boosting the price about 2 1/2 cents a dozen over the opening a year ago, suggested the general improvement in trade.

First outdoor grown tomatoes of the season from this country were also received from Imperial Valley. They sold at \$4 per four-basket crate and were of excellent quality. Mexicans were also very good.
