HEALTH OFFICIAL MUCH IMPRESSED BY HOSPITAL SITE

While positively no assurance that Medford would be chosen as site of the psycho-neurotic hospital for Indians was given here yesterday by W. L. Treadway, assistant surgeon general of the United States public health service and chairman of the board, Medford officials were much encouraged following his inspection of the proposed site on the Westlund property near Roxy Ann.

Mr. Treadway, accompanied by Dr. Ernst, also of Washington, D. C., arrived here yesterday from Grants Pass and, accompanied by City Superintendent Fred Scheffel and A. H. Banwell, manager of the Medford chamber of commerce, made the inspection of the site.

He was very favorably impressed with the scenic view offered in that region of the valley and did not hesitate to say so. He refused to make any statements, however, regarding Medford's possibilities of obtaining the hospital.

He asked for much information regarding building costs and asked that Medford prepare a brief, setting forth extensive information regarding building materials and labor costs and forward same within the next week.

The brief will be prepared at once, Mr. Banwell stated today.

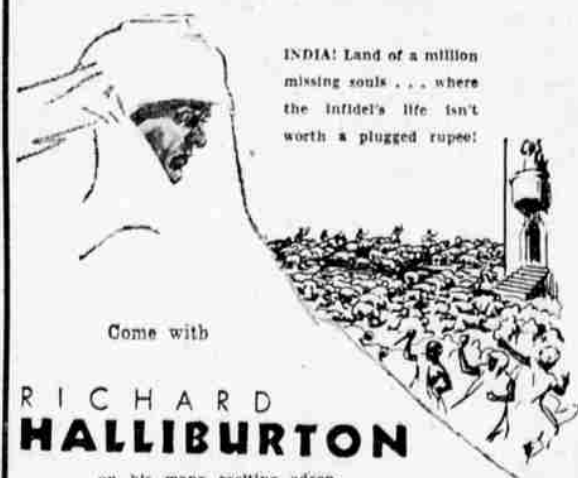
