

BONDED HIGHWAY DEBT BEING CUT FAST IN OREGON

SALEM, Ore. (UP)—Retirement of Oregon highway bonds will leave a larger per cent of the department income each year for maintenance and construction, Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said today.

The highway debt at present amounts to about \$27,000,000 and is being retired at \$2,000,000 a year. No new bonds have been issued for several years.

Of 1933 highway income, from license fees and gasoline taxes, 41.08 per cent went for interest and principal on bonds. This year 37.8 per cent will go for that purpose. Other shares of the 1933 income included maintenance of primary highways, 19.64 per cent; preliminary financing of federal aid projects 10.06 per cent; construction and betterment, 6.18; maintenance of secondary highways, 4.89; ferries and drawbridges, 1.27; administration, 2.78; construction secondary highways, 5.11; surveys, 2.05; rights of way, 2.98; minor betterments, 1.54; cooperation forest work, 1.10.

Other expenditures this year will include: maintenance primary highways 22.36, reserve for additional cooperation with federal projects 6.09; maintenance secondary highways 4.38; construction secondary highways 1.64; rights of way 4.38; surveys 2.10.
