Unemployment insurance would be fine, if we could afford it, but we shouldn't lose sight of the fact that nobody who is employed needs to wait for a constitutional amendment to secure unemployment insurance.

A savings account at the bank will take care of that very nicely.

NEITHER should we forget that no young person needs to wait for the LAW to provide old-age pensions. An endowment insurance policy will provide an old age pension without waiting for the processes of law.

THE treasury department announces that it has accepted \$847,022,400 in subscriptions for two bond issues dated February 19, placed on the market as a part of the ten billion dollar winter-spring financing project. This is \$47,022,400 above the amount originally planned.

THE issue was over-subscribed FOUR AND A HALF times, subscriptions received amounting to \$3,618,164,400.

THAT indicates that, in spite of tremendous expenditures, the people of the United States haven't lost confidence in the ability of their government to repay what it borrows.

THE reason people with money are afraid to loan it is that for nearly three years business in general has operated with very little profit—and profits are necessary for the repayment of loans.

Just as soon as industry gets back on a profitable basis again, those who have money will be willing to LEND it again.

When that happens, credit will again be abundant.

FIND NEW METHOD TO RECORD SOUND

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Feb. 22.—(AP)—A new method of sound recording, in which it is possible to record an orchestra of 102 pieces, will be used for the first time in motion pictures when Grace Moore's first film is made.

The new method is dubbed the "hill and dale" process, for the sound recording groove, instead of varying literally, as in the usual disc record, as used on the phonograph, varies in depth.

The spiral line of the groove is the same, but the recording through the "hill and dale" method allows for much more variation in volume of sound. The new method requires a wax disc over an inch thick, which allows plenty of depth for any possible volume of sound.
