Supplied Old Pictures—A collection of 14 old-time views of Medford and surrounding country were left yesterday at the Chamber of Commerce by E. C. Stillman, in response to a recent request for old pictures to be used in connection with publicity for Oregon's Diamond Jubilee celebration next June 3 to 9. Other valley residents having such pictures are also urged to get in touch with the Chamber of Commerce, as they are planned to be used to good advantage in furthering the jubilee celebration cause.

Here from Crater Lake—Ranger Charles Simpson arrived today from Crater Lake National park on a short business trip. Ranger Simpson reported the natural ski jump now under construction near Government Camp promises to be one of the best in the northwest, making championship leaps possible. He said snow was still in excess of five feet, assuring the success of the winter sports carnival to be held at the lake March 8, when professional jumpers from widely scattered sections of the coast are expected to be present.

Vacancies Reported—There are at present a limited number of vacancies in the local Oregon National Guard unit which are to be filled soon. Captain Carl Tengwald reported today. He said applications are receivable now and will be acted upon in a short time to bring the company up to full strength before the annual encampment at Camp Clatsop this spring.

Houses Are Scarce—Prospective house renters in Medford of late have been meeting with difficulty to rent suitable homes. Carl Y. Tengwald, realtor, said today. He declared a number of such renters found it necessary to search for places several days before they could find the property desired. He said, however, improvements, repairing and remodeling of some places would greatly relieve the situation.

Wild Flowers in Profusion—Guy Crosby returned to his home in Medford last evening from several days spent in the hill country near Medford, attending to duties at his mine. Despite the lack of the usual supply of water, miners are still finding gold in fairly good quantities, he said. He also reported mild weather of the past season has encouraged the early appearance of wild flowers in great profusion.

Leads in Tourney—"Doc" Winkle is leading the three-cushion billiard tournament, which has been in progress for the past two weeks at the Elks club. He has four wins to his credit and no losses. The tourney has eight entrants and is being played on a handicap basis, making the majority of the games played so far very close contests. The club had planned a tournament for 182 ball-line players, but was postponed for this season.

Arrived from Salem—J. M. The school will have a capacity of 25 students and of this number over one-half have already applied for enrollment. The courses offered will cover a period of three months.

Local police again repeat the necessity of taking keys out of ignition switches to forestall operation of auto thieves. The police also advise motorists against leaving bundles in cars with doors unlocked.

On Inspection Trip—W. L. Jones of the Rogue River national forest, and Max Rand, road construction inspector of the regional forest service office of Portland, are spending today on an inspection trip in the Ashland watershed area.

Boat Club Active—Preliminary plans are to be underway for spring activities of the Southern Oregon Boat club, according to Joe Marshall, secretary, today. Mr. Marshall said interest in boating has shown a marked increase during the past two years until at the present over 50 boats are owned by club members.

Early Opening Seen—As a result of a mild winter, which left a minimum amount of snowfall in the higher altitudes, the Diamond Lake area will be open to visitors much earlier than for the past several years. At the present time, motorists can drive quite a distance up the Diamond Lake road and walk to the lake. Last year the resort was not opened until the middle of June.

Show Pictures at Sams Valley—Moving pictures of Crater Lake national park and of forest service topics will be shown to the Sams Valley Grange tomorrow evening at the regular meeting. The program will consist of several reels, including winter scenes in the park, snow removal and forest scenes. Similar pictures were shown last week at the Applegate Grange.

Recruits Wanted—Jennings D. Lowman, sub-station commander of the United States recruiting office, announces that he will be in Medford again in the interests of recruiting for the regular army on March 3, 5 and 7, and that there will be a few choice assignments for local men. These are all for service in the Philippine Islands. Signal corps, coast artillery and air corps assignments are available.

Was to Buck Rock—John E. Grubb, senior ranger of the Rogue River national forest staff, returned last evening from the Buck Rock section, where he had been making panoramic photographs to be used in connection with fire lookout station. Mr. Grubb brought back an interesting specimen of redwood which, as a result of year-long battles with the elements, resembles an ancient scrubbing brush. The weather had caused a portion of the wood to disintegrate, making fibers resemble bristles of a scrubbing brush. The specimen is to be placed on display in the city tomorrow.
