

STONE FOULS OUT TO WOLFE; POLICE TAKE FINAL HAND

A grand finale of flying fists, falling policemen, prostrate wrestlers and knocked-down referees ended last night's wrestling card at the Army, amid the confusion of startled spectators who had been witnessing an exhibition filled with more roughness than displayed here all season. Bob Stone, bad-tempered matman of Chicago, brought on the climax of the show when he maintained such a determined strangle hold on Lea Wolfe of Texas for the second fall that Referee Jack Kogut awarded the match to the Texas boy on a foul.

Stone lost the first fall in 16 minutes, due to a rolling leg scissors around his middle. Stone sometimes forgets there is still some wrestling etiquette and persisted in roughing up the usually mild-mannered Texan, who gave it back just as hard and drove Stone through the ropes several times.

Stone came back strong for the second fall, and lost no time in resuming rough tactics, and at once worried Wolfe with an old-fashioned strangle hold, barred for years from wrestling rings. Referee Kogut had some trouble in making Stone break the "choke," but Stone broke away only to clasp it on again. This time with even more determination.

Kogut worked hard to pull the two men apart, and at once awarded the fall to the gasping Wolfe. The blonde-haired bad man of Chicago was angered. He turned loose a fist which caught Kogut in the face and sent him to the mat. Up in an instant, the French-Canadian referee went for Stone, but City Policeman Walter Reinking came flying into the ring as a peacemaker, only to stumble over the now prostrate Stone. In a few moments, however, the rough-house party was quieted, a state policeman arriving to reinforce Reinking in keeping the athletes apart.

The crowd was yelling and standing on chairs during the heat of the excitement, and was almost reluctant to leave when the law put an end to attempted mayhem.

Kogut was considerably rolled, and immediately upon leaving the ring, declared Stone's hot-headed methods didn't mean much to him. Kogut resented the sock in the jaw, and wants a chance to wrestle Stone.

"He couldn't throw me in two hours, and if I'd ever get a match with him, I could throw him twice in one hour. I don't care how rough he gets," Kogut said.

It is possible the two may be matched sometime in the future, but no reports of a match between them in the next week or two were heard today. Stone weighs around 200 pounds and Kogut tips the beam at about the same.

At (Man Mountain) Schnell, 203 pound Australian matman, lost two out of three falls to Lea Grimes, 185, a fellow countryman. Schnell pinned Grimes for the first fall in 11 minutes, but lost the second in four minutes when Grimes clamped on a hammerlock. At the beginning of the third canto, Schnell introduced the towel hold. Grabbing Grimes before he was entirely ready, "Man Mountain" came out with his towel hidden behind his back to do a little expert strangling. Kogut stopped this.

Schnell had a weakness for crawling through the ropes whenever danger threatened, and was often booed. His big size made "Man Mountain" appear a bit deliberate in his wrestling, but he had the lighter Grimes in a numerous tough position. On one of his rope touring excursions, Schnell was pulled back by the referee. Schnell fell to the mat on his back and Grimes used a body press for the third fall in eight minutes.

Harry Hall, South Dakota, 150, and Roland W. Lee, 151, Klamath Falls, wrestled a half hour to a draw. The usually quiet Warren, who has been in Medford rings before, threw his opponent out of the ring several times and inflicted numerous punishing holds, and took as much punishment from Hall, including biting and ear pulling. Ear pulling, a perfectly legitimate hold, was used in every match of last night's card, which seemed to have the hearty approval of the good sized crowd present. Next week's matches will be announced soon.

PIPES WINS \$500 VERDICT IN CASE

A circuit court jury, of which Walter G. Grant was foreman, last night returned a verdict for \$500 in favor of A. W. Pipes against R. L. Wyant and wife, for money allegedly due for dairy rentals. The verdict was reached about 10 p. m. and was opened at the start of court this morning. Nine jurors concurred in the verdict.

The suit was filed by Pipes as administrator of the business partnership between him and the late Bert Anderson.

The property involved in the action lies near Central Point and is known as the Hilton dairy. Pipes and Anderson purchased the property and leased it to the Wyants. The court Monday, in a ruling, held that a partnership existed between Anderson and Pipes. It was from this point that the litigation arose. Pipes in his complaint sought \$2,037.37.

REAMES TO GIVE MAIN ADDRESS AT BOURBONS FEAST

Following close upon the announcement from Portland that the main speaker for the "mammoth" banquet to be held at the Multnomah hotel tomorrow night in celebration of the first anniversary of the "New Deal" would be designated by President Roosevelt, information was received today revealing that Attorney A. E. Reames of this city had been named to deliver the address.

Mr. and Mrs. Reames will leave tonight for the northern city, where a luncheon honoring Mr. Reames will also be an event in Democratic circles of the state tomorrow noon.

The first report from Portland, released to the press, stated that the speaker would be "some outstanding Oregon Democrat and an enthusiastic supporter of the Roosevelt New Deal, the speaker to be designated by the president."

The banquet has been arranged under auspices of the Oregon Society of Democratic Engineers, and is expected to draw representatives from every county of the state who are anxious to express their approval of the national program which followed the inauguration of President Roosevelt just one year ago.

Some prominent Democrats from out of state are also expected as guests at the banquet, which will be quite the largest affair of the year in political circles. The guest list will not be confined to Bourbons alone, as an invitation is extended members of all political parties who are in sympathy with the Roosevelt "New Deal."
