

DESCENDANT OF 'LOST DAUPHIN' FOUND IN AZORES

Pretender to Throne of France More Interested in Crops — Relationship to Royalty Brings No Thrill

PARIS. —(UP)— Another claimant to the Bourbon throne—about the fortieth in existence, though one of the most plausible—has been discovered in the Azores.

Hearing that a descendant of the lost Dauphin of France, the little son of Louis XVI, was living on the island of San Miguel, the principal and the prettiest island of the Azores group, L'Illustration of Paris sent a special correspondent, Paul Bariel, from the mainland to investigate his claims. Interest in the fate of the young Dauphin, who was left in the care of the home too scrupulous Simon, has never flagged in France, and any tip, however remote, is considered worth the trouble to investigate, because there are many parti-

sans to the belief that the Dauphin was carried off and hidden, after an easy bargain with his keeper, Simon.

Last Pretender Portuguese
The last pretender to be thus found is a Portuguese subject, Joachim Capeto, born 1856, a farmer in the little village of San Antonio, near Britania, where the mysterious "French Prince" is supposed to have landed "after a revolt in France."

The name of this French prince was Louis Capet (the name of the royal family) and his daughter, Maria, born in 1804, bore Antonio Francisco Capet Vasconcellos, who was the father of the present Joachim Capeto, the family name becoming more Latinized. Joachim Capeto, or Capet, has eight children by his wife, Isabella, of whom one is named Louis, and if the legend is true, would be the Dauphin of France, on the Bourbon side.

There is one actual legitimist Dauphin living in Belgium, who is the little son of Prince Henry de Guise, Comte de Paris, the son of the Duc de Guise, the legitimist Orleanist pretender.

The Portuguese "pretender" is hardly a pretender. He admits that he is descended from an austere French prince, who lived as an exile on San Miguel at Britania, and who received strange but regular visits from a distinguished person living in Ponta Delgada.

Pretender Joachim, however, is more interested in his crops. When asked by the French representative of L'Illustration what he thought about being related to royalty, he said: "That does not seem to be

worth much to me. I would much rather see a good crop this season." But "Prince" Joachim has much to commend him to serious attention of sympathizers. He and his family are blond and blue-eyed, like many of the late Bourbons and certainly like the young Dauphin was said to be. He has the Bourbon physiognomy, except the nose, which is more Roman, but distinguished. He speaks with an air of gravity uncommon in these spontaneous people, and the French writer declares he has certainly an unmistakable air of inherent authority.

Ancestry Easily Traced
To trace the ancestry of "Prince" Joachim on the island was quite easy, as the father and grandmother lived to great age and there are ample records of his grandmother, Maria Capet, the natural daughter of this strange exiled prince, called Louis Capet. That appears certain.

The investigation developed that there was an austere prince, who walked somewhat like Napoleon about the heights of San Miguel, and that his visitor was a certain J. V. Schenol, who constructed the clock in the church of Provacao, in San Miguel, and who was supposed to have been the clock maker to Louis XVI.

There are ample traces of Schenol, as a gentleman, but no traces of Schenol as clockmaker to Louis XVI, although as the protector of the Dauphin, Louis Capet, he would have changed his name. French readers, however, give much credence to this discovery and its plausibility.

OIL BOOM MADE KILGORE, TEXAS, IN THREE YEARS

Held to Five Per Cent of Oil Production, Town Gains 15,000 People — Within Few Years in Great Field

KILGORE, Tex. (UP)—There may have been a depression, but if so it apparently missed Kilgore and other towns in the East Texas oil field area.

Three years ago Kilgore was a struggling village with a population of 500. Today it is an enterprising, lively town of 15,000.

Rambling, mushroom-like in appearance, Kilgore is typical of other towns made by development of the great oil field, an area five miles wide and 40 miles long.

On a week day afternoon sidewalks are crowded with pedestrians, stores

are busy and doing a rush business. In the downtown section curbs are lined with automobiles. A double line of machines is parked in the center of the streets. Traffic is heavy, with minor snarls at practically every intersection.

The writer learned that the distributor of a popular automobile had made four sales up to two o'clock in the afternoon, and hoped to sell three more machines before sunset.

Since discovery of the East Texas field in 1929, 12,000 wells have been completed as producers. A weekly oil report by the Texas railroad commission shows a daily average of crude oil produced of 408,000 barrels. Since discovery of the field 460,320,580 barrels of crude oil have been produced at a value of \$1 per barrel. During the month of December, 1933, 488 producers were brought in.

Tax assessors place a value of \$15,000 on each producing well in the field. This, multiplied by the number of wells gives a figure of \$180,000,000—only a part of the well's real worth and taking no consideration of royalty and lease values.

Total number of refineries in the field is 60, of which 59 are independently owned.

Sixty-six pipe lines and gathering systems transport crude oil in the field—16 of them being main lines leaving the field for refinery centers elsewhere. There are 19 treating and reclaiming plants, and 13 casing head gasoline plants with a daily capacity of 50,000,000 cubic feet of gas. There are 1,800 operating companies or cor-

porations in the field, including both independents and majors.

Every well in the field has come in a "gusher." Total daily production is held near the 400,000 barrel mark due to federal and state regulations, allowing individual wells only 4.5 per cent of their potential yield.

Should restrictions be withdrawn the daily production would run into millions of barrels.

Approximately 40,000 heads of families are employed in the field.

Kilgore was named in honor of Congressman C. B. "Buck" Kilgore, who served in the house of representatives from 1887-92.

DINNER SERVING TWO
Broiled Chopped Beef Cakes
Hashed Browned Potatoes
Escalloped Onions

THE RECIPES
Hashed Browned Potatoes
3 tablespoons bacon fat.
2 cups diced cooked potatoes.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
Heat fat in frying pan. Add and quickly brown potatoes. Stir frequently. Add remaining ingredients. Cover and cook one minute.

Fruit Gelatin Salad
1/2 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture.
1 cup boiling water.
1/2 cup seeded grapes.
1/2 cup diced canned pineapple.
1/2 cup diced peaches.
1 tablespoon lemon juice.
Four water over gelatin mixture, stir until dissolved. Cool. Add rest of ingredients, pour into glass mold, chill until stiff. Unmold on lettuce. Top with salad dressing.

Date Spice Cookies
(Two dozen)
2-3 cup fat.
1 1/2 cups sugar.
1 teaspoon cinnamon.
1/2 teaspoon cloves.
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
2 eggs.
2 tablespoons cream.

2-3 cup chopped dates.
1/2 cup nuts.
3 1-3 cups flour.
1 teaspoon soda.
Cream fat and sugar. Add spices, eggs and cream. Beat 2 minutes. Add rest of ingredients. Chill dough, break off bits and flatten down 3 inches apart on greased baking sheets. Bake 12 minutes in moderate oven.

The jars used to hold commercial salad dressing, when emptied, make excellent containers for staples for the pantry shelves. Those jars having screw tops can be used for the salad and sandwich mixtures for pickles.
