

Colorful Indian Woman Wife of Montana Solon Is Spokesman of Tribe

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 24.—(Special Correspondence)—To the 500 survivors of the Blackfoot tribe, she is known as Ah-Kah-in-le (Many Victories). To others she is Mrs. John Coburn, wife of Montana state senator.

But the tribesman who sent Mrs. Coburn, speaking and attractive brunette, to Washington as their first official woman spokesman, believe her native name describes her best. They expect her, as well as the male representatives of her tribe in the delegation, to return to them with the smile of "many victories" on her face.

Appearing at an Indian Affairs news conference, Mrs. Coburn outlined the aims of her delegation. The Blackfoot, like other Americans want a square deal, as part of the new deal.

Their reservation has recently produced oil, possibly the largest field in the United States. They want to know what their benefits will be. They want to know too, about their timber, and their livestock. The reservation needs a new hospital. Will it get one?

They want to know all about the Wheeler-Howard bill, which promises economic rehabilitation and self-government for the Indians. It sounds good to "Many Victories." Is it?

In addition to her routine program in Washington, Mrs. Coburn is the special representative of the Blackfoot women. They have their

own problems to be ironed out. These, she would like to take to the White House—to Mrs. Roosevelt. She says:

"It would be the most thrilling moment of my life if I could but meet her. I'd love to tell her about our Blackfoot women, and to take a message from her back to them." Mrs. Coburn has a French-Indian mother and an English father. But she says:

"On the reservation we are all Indians. If I had a child he would be treated as an Indian too. Since I have none of my own, I shall adopt an Indian baby—a full-blood—very soon."

About Indian women she says: "They are the best politicians in the world. They do most of the campaigning on the reservation. They know all the tricks and they play them cleverly. They have found that the quickest way to a voter's heart is through his stomach. So they give campaign dinners, serving plenty of the Indian's favorite food—meat."

Mrs. Coburn says she has done all of her own husband's campaigning. He has held a place in the state legislature for 14 years. He is a white man in a country where the population is two-thirds Indians. Last campaign he ran for the state senate against a popular full-blooded Indian, and won by 300 votes.

"That," concluded Many Victories, "took campaigning. It was the case of my husband, like the Indian of old, sitting at home with his hands folded, while his wife went out and did the work."

Chocolate Brownies
1-3 cup fat.
1 cup sugar.
2 squares chocolate, melted.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
2 eggs.
1/2 cup flour.
1/2 teaspoon baking powder.
1/2 cup nuts.
Cream fat and sugar. Add remaining ingredients and beat 2 minutes. Spread on greased paper in shallow pan. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Cut in bars, cool and store in cake box.

Baked Pork Chops
4 loin chops.
3 tablespoons flour.
2 tablespoons chopped onions.
2 tablespoons chopped green peppers.
2 tablespoons chopped celery.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/4 teaspoon paprika.

2-3 cup water.
Sprinkle chops with flour. Fit into shallow baking pan. Add rest of ingredients. Cover, bake one hour in moderate oven. Turn chops to allow even cooking.

Neapolitan Salad
2 cups shredded cabbage.
1 cup sliced pineapple.
2-3 cup diced marshallows.
1/2 cup salad dressing.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
Chill ingredients. Combine, serve on lettuce.

SMALLWOOD HELD IN GUAGE THEFT

Paul Smallwood, 19, of Butte Falls, was bound over to the federal grand jury on a grand larceny charge when he appeared before United States Commissioner Victor Tengwald this forenoon. Bail was set at \$1500.

Smallwood is charged with the theft of a Stephens Recorder, a water gauge, near Butte Falls. The apparatus was valued at \$175. The theft is alleged to have been committed sometime ago, but Smallwood was taken into custody only this week.

The boy is said to have appeared in court before on other charges of larceny for which he served a short time. He left today for Portland in custody of Deputy United States Marshal G. D. Watson, and will be held in the Multnomah county jail.

RESURRECTION OF CULTISTS LEADER CLAIMED IN COURT

SEATTLE, March 2.—(UP)—Mundane and spiritual beliefs clashed in superior court here today as trial continued against the Seventh Baptist Church of Israel brought by bewickered former member of the cult.

Testimony was also fraught with allusions to the late Daniel Salwt, who claimed to be God and clothed with immortality, and who, it was revealed, had two "queens" during his regime.

Mrs. Irene Jacobson, pretty blonde wife of a church member, told the court she was forced under threat of death to submit to Salwt's demands after Eva Paik, former "queen," escaped. She said the white-haired bearded leader finally gave her \$880 to "keep silent."

Where yesterday Ira Burnee, benign church trustee said he had seen the resurrected body of Salwt since 1929, when he died, Attorney George Vanderveer said he would prove "Salwt was not God," and called in an undertaker who testified he embalmed Salwt's body and that the cult leader could not live again.

"Members of the church were afflicted with a peculiar sort of insanity," Vanderveer told the court.

Plaintiffs hope to have a receiver appointed to handle funds variously estimated between \$130,000 and \$200,000 which now are under care of the trustees.

Tested Recipes

About the Preparation and Uses of Good Breakfasts.

Well, well, and now let's look breakfast in the face. A half-grapefruit and a cup of coffee may be all right as far as they go, but don't expect to arouse a lot of enthusiasm on the part of your husband by limiting the menu to just those items. Men need sustenance, and they need it especially at breakfast because they are inclined to go easy on the lunches.

Remember, there isn't a man in captivity who can live without eggs... and even if he could, he wouldn't want to. The wife who can make a good omelet needn't worry much about her husband straying from the fold. Here's an omelet which we can recommend as a first-class husband-bolter:

Fluffy Cheese Omelet
4 eggs
1/2 cup hot milk
8 Snow Flake Crackers, rolled fine
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup grated American cheese
2 tbsps. butter

Separate eggs and beat yolks until lemon colored. Four hot milk over finely rolled crackers and beat until creamy. Season and add 1/2 cup of cheese and combine with beaten egg yolks. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Heat butter in heavy frying pan. Pour in omelet and cook, covered, over very low flame until barely set. Fold, sprinkle with remaining cheese and slip on to a hot platter. Serve at once. Six portions.

And still another quick breakfast dish which always goes over big with the men is Apple Fritters. The following recipe will serve six people easily, yet it requires only two large apples or three small ones. It's the Snow Flake soda crackers, you see, which make the apples go further than nature intended:

Apple Fritters
1 cup hot milk

12 Snow Flake soda crackers
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder
2 eggs
1/2 cup finely chopped cooking apples

Powdered sugar or foamy sauce. Pour hot milk over finely rolled crackers and salt, and beat until smooth. Cool; add baking powder and beaten eggs. Stir in apples. Drop by spoonfuls in deep hot fat (350 or 370 degrees Fahrenheit) and fry for 2 to 3 minutes. Serve with powdered sugar or foamy sauce. Six portions.

**LINDBERGH'S BOOK
PROVES PROPHETIC**

PHILADELPHIA, March 2.—(AP)—The late Charles A. Lindbergh, Sr., Minnesota congressman and father of the famous flier, speaks today through a book which was suppressed by the government during the World War.

Entitled "Your Country at War," the elder Lindbergh's work is described by the publishers who brought it out today as prophetic in its attacks on wartime hysteria, profiteers, bankers and giant monopolies, the volume makes predictions and recommendations which have materialized in the years since the representative's death in 1924.

"The book even predicts use of a plan almost identical with the NRA," says an introduction by the author's former law partner.

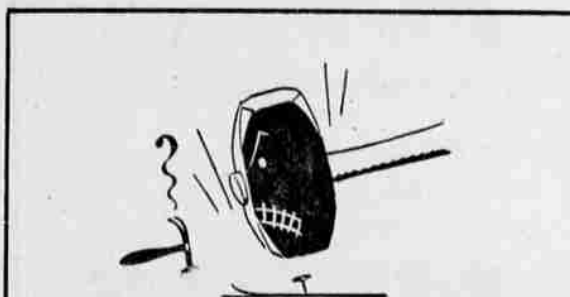
