

# 84 WOMEN PASS STATE BAR EXAM SINCE APRIL 1886

Mrs. Mary A. Leonard First to Be Admitted — Many Became Prominent in Profession, Elected to Office

SALEM, Ore. (UP)—Eighty-four women have been admitted to the Oregon bar since April 13, 1886, records of the supreme court showed today.

In 1885 a special session of the state legislature passed a law providing, "Hereafter woman shall be admitted to the practice of law as attorneys in the courts of this state upon the same terms and conditions as men."

Mrs. Leonard First  
Records of Arthur Benson, clerk of the supreme court, reveal that Mrs. Mary A. Leonard was the first woman admitted to the bar in Oregon, April 13, 1886. The following year Miss E. M. Howard gained membership in the legal profession. The earliest record of any woman practicing law in the United States shows Myra Bradwell was admitted to the Illinois bar in 1869.

Many of Oregon's women attorneys have become prominent leaders in their profession. Some of them have been elected or appointed prosecuting city attorneys. Others have been elected to state legislative seats.

Four Pass in 1933  
Four women, Lorraine Morrow Conlee, Melvina Halstrom, Mercla Leton and Anne Christine Moe, all of Portland, passed the bar examinations held last July 11 and 12.

Supreme court justices have become accustomed to hearing cases argued by women. Dorothy McCullough Lee, state senator; Mrs. Wilmette McKelroy, deputy city attorney of Portland; Manche Irene Langley, Portland; Mabel Weiborn McInturff, Marshfield; and Cella Gerwin, city attorney of The Dalles, have conducted a number of cases before the high court.

Many in Practice

# DINOSAUR GIZZARD SOURCE OF GEMS FOUND MONTANA

NEW YORK (UP)—Valuable, not only to the dinosaurs whose gastronomic efforts they once aided, but also to the modern paleontologist, are the gastroliths, or "gizzard stones," of the prehistoric monsters unearthed by Dr. Barnum Brown. These gastroliths were polished in the corps of dinosaurs over 120,000,000 years ago.

Eminent in paleontological work and conspicuous for his productive excavations in the United States, Dr. Brown brought to light large collections of these curious and enlightening "gizzard stones," during his latest Montana expedition.

To describe the gastroliths as gems would not be an exaggeration, for, while many are ordinary members of the lithological (stone) world, hundreds of them are carnelian—a gem stone. The gastroliths shown to the United Press correspondent by Dr. Brown in his office at the American Museum of Natural History, ranged in size from that of walnut to that of an average ink bottle. The carnelian variety were polished to a gleam. Dr. Brown called attention to the fact that, in contrast to this high polish—the stones (some consisting of glass, about as hard as carnelian) found in the crops of chickens, are etched and dull. The explanation for the finding of the gastroliths in groups is that, as they were disgorged by the dinosaurs, they sifted through the soft silt down the harder slanting bedrock underneath; accordingly numbers of them amassed in separate deposits. Not all the stones found were disgorged, however, as is illustrated by a group which was found near the location of the dinosaurs' crop with the skeleton.

In addition to their general interest, these "gizzard stones" have provided a means of reconstructing the topography of Montana as it was when dinosaurs roamed through primeval swamps and across arid plains. What the general character of the terrain was, may be quite accurately hypothesized. Knowing through geological evidences the particular quality of each successive stratum of rocks and clays, the paleontologist by calculating the particular bed where the gastroliths are found, may restore and retrace the approximate height, character, etc., of the ground as it existed over one million centuries ago.

When questioned as to the authenticity of the gastroliths, Dr. Brown recalled the skeleton aggregation and cited as further proof the fact that they were not transported to their ultimate destination through any natural agency, such as water streams, etc. The mode of conveyance, explained Dr. Brown, was purely mechanical.
