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SLAYER DILLINGER ESCAPES JAIL

WASHINGTON, March 3.—The phantom gold dust twins (Profs. Warren and Rogers) secretly completed their silver report for the president more than a week ago.

They dug up all the data on two possible courses of action: (A) purchase of all silver stocks and (B) devaluation of the silver dollar.

For the past few days the silver agitators have been passing out sub-rosa the tip that Mr. Roosevelt will devalue the silver dollar equally with gold.

That would boost the price of silver to \$1.09. It is now 64¢ cents. They have handed out so many bad tips, however, that no one will believe them any more.

The real secret of the thing is in the Warren-Rogers report. It is just as easy to find out what is in that report as it is to find Profs. Warren and Rogers, who go around disguised as thin air.

However, you may risk a small wager that their recommendations are not exactly enthusiastically in favor of silver.

Indeed, those who have had a quick peek at the report, say it will be sadly disappointing to Father Coughlin, et al.

Holders.

Treasury Secretary Morgenthau's private investigation into the identity of holders of silver stocks is supposed to show that two large New York banks have about four million ounces. With two private investors, they are the four largest holders.

The total domestic stock is about 250,000,000 ounces.

The investigation was not entirely successful because many silver buyers apparently operated through third parties to conceal their identities.

Generally it showed the holdings are rather widely distributed.

If any of the silver agitators are on the list, their names are being carefully guarded.

Background.

Under the existing program Mr. Roosevelt is buying only about 22,000,000 ounces of silver a year. If he decided to buy all existing stocks, it would be acceleration of his silver program to ten times its existing inflationary rate.

The existing policy has failed to bring any appreciation of prices in China and the Orient. Reports indicate prices there have fallen. Chinese bankers protested to the state department against it, but the Chinese government shortly thereafter ratified the London agreement.

Speed.

You have to speak fast to keep up with the news.

Consider the case of Dean Donham of the Harvard business school. He is supposed to have received a letter from General Johnson offering him indirectly the job of directing the NRA planning and research division. He failed to answer it for a few days and then wrote Donham a letter saying he would drop down to Washington for the train en route.

After he boarded the train en route to Washington, the papers carried a story that Leon Henderson had been appointed to the job.

It seems that Johnson, not hearing from Dean Donham immediately, went ahead and gave the job to someone else.

Symptoms.

The way Congressman James Wadsworth has been going around to meetings in New York state, shaking hands with everyone and making speeches, has led to a rather general belief on the inside that he will make an important political announcement shortly.

His friends believe he will announce his candidacy for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

Influence.

The lobbying on the stock exchange bill is very heavy, but it seems to be about equally divided between Wall Streeters and the Young Anthony advocates.

At least four of the advocates who drew the bill have been going around visiting members of the house interstate commerce committee privately for heart-to-heart talks.

REPORT FUGITIVE WITH NEGRO PAL NEARING ST. LOUIS

Dummy Pistol Used to Cow Guards—Deputy Hostage in Stolen Automobile—Wide Hunt Is Underway

ST. LOUIS, March 3.—(AP)—Police tonight broadcast a report that John Dillinger, notorious robber and killer, and Herbert Youngblood, negro, who escaped with him from the Lake county jail at Crown Point, Ind., today, had been seen at Jacksonville, Ill., at 8:45 p. m.

Police at Alton, Ill., received a similar report.

The report to police here said an attendant at a Phillips oil station had identified Dillinger from a picture.

The report said Dillinger and Youngblood were headed toward St. Louis.

LIMA, Ohio, March 3.—(AP)—Sheriff Don Barber was ordered tonight to "shoot prisoners" if John Dillinger makes an attempt to liberate his henchmen in the Allen county jail and it looks as though the attempt might be successful.

CROWN POINT, Ind., March 3.—(AP)—John Dillinger, notorious killer and bank robber awaiting trial for murder, walked out of the "escape-proof" Lake county jail today with a negro prisoner each armed with a machine gun.

Dillinger's escape from the prison in charge of Sheriff Lillian Holley whose husband was slain by a mad man, apparently climaxed weeks of planning during which he whittled a dummy pistol out of wood in his cell.

He used the pistol to threaten a guard and force him to unlock the first floor cell in which Dillinger and four other prisoners were locked.

Once outside the cell, Dillinger and his companion went to the warden's office, seized two machine guns, and departed with Deputy Sheriff George Blunt as a hostage.

They took Blunt to a nearby garage, stole an automobile, and forced Edward Sager, an attendant, to accompany them. They headed north toward Gary and Chicago.

At Feeney, director of public safety in Indiana, said the entire force of the state police will be concentrated on a hunt for Dillinger.

Fear New Daring.

Feeney's first act was to telephone authorities at Lima, O., from Indianapolis to warn them against a possible effort by Dillinger to break thru the guards at the jail there to try to free three members of his gang.

"He's just got nerve enough to try to do it," Feeney said.

Harry Pierpont, Charles Makley and Russell Clark are awaiting trial in Lima for the murder of Sheriff Jesse Barber last fall. Barber was killed when he resisted unsuccessfully Dillinger's delivery from that jail.

Mrs. Holley, who had declared Dillinger never would escape, ordered all entrances of the jail locked and guards posted about the building. No one was allowed to enter.

Dillinger forced all four prisoners in the cell to accompany him but three of them willingly gave up to deputies after reaching the street.

The car in which the men escaped was a small black (Ford) sedan.

Pushing Blunt ahead of them with the machine guns at his back, the negro and Dillinger entered the Main street garage. Three attendants were there.

The outlaw sang out: "Don't move or I will fill you full of lead."

He singled out the black sedan and, at the point of his ready machine gun, forced Blunt into the seat with him.

The negro compelled Sager to enter the car.

Great Precautions.

The most elaborate precautions had been taken to guard Dillinger day and night since he was returned here several weeks ago from Tucson, Ariz., by what he termed "pick ups."

GOSS, COOS CHIEF, SEEKS MOTT POST IN LOWER HOUSE

Coast Democrat Urges This District 'To March in Triumphant Procession' and Elect Him to Office

COQUILLE, Ore., March 3.—(AP)—State Senator John D. Goss tonight formally announced his candidacy for the democratic nomination for U. S. representative from the first congressional district.

The announcement was made during the meeting of the Coos county central democratic committee at the Coquille hotel, attended by more than 80 party members from Coos and Curry counties.

Senator Goss declared he was 100 per cent for Roosevelt and the new deal and expressed the opinion "it was high time the first congressional district, in order to share in the legitimate fruits of victory presented a solid front to march with the rest of the nation in the triumphant democratic procession."

Dr. G. W. Leslie, chairman of the county democratic committee and presiding officer at tonight's program, declared Goss "has the 100 per cent endorsement of all 60 Coos precinct committeemen and of all major and minor officers in the county."

Senator Goss is city attorney of Marshfield and became widely known throughout the state for his work during the recent sessions of the state legislature.

CHAMBERLIN NOW VIES WITH LINDY

WASHINGTON, March 3.—(AP)—Postmaster General Parley today had commendation for his aerial course from Clarence D. Chamberlin to balance the criticism of another famous flier, Charles A. Lindbergh.

Chamberlin's telegram commended the efforts of the postmaster general, who recently cancelled all domestic airmail contracts on the grounds they were awarded by fraud to "change the nation's air transportation system from organized octopus racket to a business," and said commercial airlines were endeavoring to magnify army mishaps and minimize their own deficiencies.

The men, who later gave his name as George Dolan, frightened shoppers by his shouted threats of suicide as he ran down Market street, between curb and street car tracks.

When he slashed at Policeman Thomas Maloney the latter opened fire with his revolver. Shoppers ducked and women screamed. One shot struck Dolan's wrist.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 3.—(AP)—Saturday shopping crowds were thrown into confusion on Market street near Third today when an apparently crazed man, brandishing a large knife, led a chase of policemen down the street, slashing one in the wrist before he was captured.

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PORTLAND GERMAN CHURCH ACTS TO END ITS STRIFE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 3.—(AP)—Members of the strife-ridden German Evangelical church today voted to arbitrate internal strife which recently led to fistful melees and court actions.

The Rev. Dr. Raymond B. Walker of Portland headed a committee of the congregational conference of Oregon which met with church members.

An eloquent plea for amicable settlement of differences between factions was made by Dr. Walker. Disension dated to last fall when a former pastor was ousted.

Rev. Walker beseeched the audience to heed the gospel of St. John, who counseled the followers to love one another. Then he begged his listeners to cease strife for the sake of their children, if not themselves.

Many refused when he asked for a showing of hands of those who promised to forgive each other. It was then that the board of arbitration was proposed and after some hesitation on the part of the congregation was almost unanimously accepted.

Three members from the state committee and six members from the church congregation will comprise the board.

DEFRAUDERS GET 2 YEAR AND 840 YEAR JAIL TERMS

TOPEKA, Kas., March 3.—(AP)—Leland C. Caldwell was sentenced today to serve 40 to 840 years in the state penitentiary after conviction of a part in the state's million dollar bogus bond scandal.

Caldwell was the fourth person to be sentenced as the result of criminal charges growing out of the municipal bond scandal, manipulated that state contended, by Ronald Finney, bond broker, and former employee of Caldwell.

OAKLAND, Calif., March 3.—(AP)—Harry Kramer, head of a "health insurance" business said by the Alameda county district attorney's office to have defrauded the public of hundreds of thousands of dollars was sentenced today to two years in prison and a fine of \$5,000 for his share of the enterprise.

E. L. Knott, another of those against whom 19 indictments were returned, was given a 10 months' sentence in the Alameda county jail and a \$700 fine.

ROOSEVELT'S KIN WEDS IN STORM

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., March 3.—(AP)—In a village almost as snowy as a Christmas postcard, Miss Grace Green Roosevelt, first granddaughter of President Theodore Roosevelt to become a bride, was married today to William McMillan of Baltimore.

The bride, guests and the wedding reception itself were held up by the snow remaining from Sunday's blizzard. Though workmen have been digging out the roads for days, Miss Roosevelt was a half hour late for the ceremony in Christ Episcopal church.

POLICE 'PAY-OFF' WITNESS SAID TO BE WAITING HERE

George Riggins' Wife to Join Him in This City Word From San Francisco—Grand Jury Evaded

SAN FRANCISCO, March 3.—(AP)—George Riggins, former special policeman, sought in connection with police "payoff" charges made by Mrs. Kamukola Campbell, was reported by District Attorney Matthew Brady here tonight to have gone to Medford, Ore., en route to Dedsburg, Alberta, Canada.

Brady said he was informed by Riggins' wife that she planned to join her husband in Medford with two railroad tickets to Dedsburg sent to her by her father from that city. Riggins is one of the witnesses for whom subpoenas have been issued to appear before the grand jury Monday.

The district attorney also intimated he will seek to learn why a liquor license was issued by the California state board of equalization to Mrs. Campbell's club Kamukola over the protest of Police Captain Arthur D. Layne.

APPLE SHIPMENTS FROM SEATTLE SET NEW EXPORT MARK

SEATTLE, March 3.—(AP)—The Seattle port commission reported today that apple shipments in February were the largest for that month in the history of the port, and predicted that the second apple export of 1934, when more than 5,000,000 boxes were shipped, will be exceeded by the present season.

The February movement of apples over all docks totaled 1,247,752 boxes, compared with 778,250 boxes during the same month last year. For the present season up to March 1, Seattle shipped 4,338,980 boxes, compared with 3,843,797 boxes for the same period last season, an increase of 795,233 boxes.

GREEK EXPULSION NEAR TO INSULT

ATHENS, March 3.—(AP)—A new crisis in Greece's internal troubles when the foreign minister signed an order calling for the speedy expulsion of the former Chicago utilities operator.

Official quarters hinted recently that when a final move was decided upon after more than two months of offers and counter-offers, Insull might be given a summary command to quit Greece in 24 hours.

The aged Insull, who is wanted in the United States to face charges of embezzlement and grand larceny in connection with the collapse of the Insull enterprises, apparently continued to shed and it was considered unlikely that he would be expelled, before early next week.

FEDERAL COIN TO STATE PAST YEAR NEAR \$16,000,000

Recovery Projects Give Jobs and Coin to 110,000 With PWA Money to Come—Codes Also Add Benefits

PORTLAND, Ore., March 3.—(AP)—Oregon residents received approximately \$16,000,000 federal money the past year under President Roosevelt's recovery program.

A survey of federal relief agencies reveals that more than \$7,000,000 was spent on projects on projects involving expenditure of approximately \$600,000,000 federal funds.

Intangible benefits are considered more or less conjectural, even controversial.

Almost 110,000 persons have been re-employed in Oregon under NRA, CCC, PWA, CWA, AAA and HOLC, those agencies report. At the peak the civil works administration provided 27,107 jobs. From November 30, 1933, to February 22, 1934, CWA projects provided 6,433,300 man hours of labor and \$4,079,288.34 payroll.

Oregon CCC camp activities provided 22,408 men with work and \$3,235,431 pay. The United States forest service values the civilian conservation corps accomplishments in Oregon at \$4,574,275.

On the estimate of two persons hired for each of the 26,000 re-employment agreements signed the NRA was instrumental in returning an estimated 52,000 persons to work. At minimum code wages the annual payroll would be \$30,208,000 for those employed.

Some firms did not enlarge forces under the NRA while others added as many as 232 employees. Better than 98 per cent of the employers are operating under the more than 300 codes, it was estimated.

PWA projects have employed only 7390 persons. Thus far approximately \$48,000,000 has been allocated and much work will be forthcoming.

FRENCH MILLIONS FOR NEW DEFENSE

PARIS, March 3.—(AP)—New air, land and sea plans have been roughly outlined in parliamentary committee and will soon be incorporated in measures providing for the expenditure of about six billion francs (about \$300,000,000).

The funds for the new defenses will be raised by a loan, it was stated today.

Chancellor Adolf Hitler's rearmament program in Germany was regarded here as a fact, and whether or not Hitler's program is formally countenanced by France, the Doumergue cabinet will lose no time in modernizing and strengthening the armed forces.

Officials declared that the navy program would be completely within the limits of the Washington treaty, and that in no sense could it be considered as an end to the naval building holiday.

GUN SMART-ALECK BEGS AT FINISH

PORT SMITH, Ark., March 3.—(AP)—Ford Bradshaw, wild shooting smart aleck, who fancied himself the out-king of the notorious Cookson Hills, died today at the back door of a little Oklahoma town.

"Don't do it—don't do it," were his last words as he fell mortally wounded, after attempting to escape from half a dozen officers at Arkansas, Okla., just over the state line five miles southeast of here.

Bill Harper, operator of the roadhouse, called Port Smith officers after Bradshaw, for three hours, held customers and employees in a state of terror, boasting of his badness.

But it was Harper, also a deputy sheriff, who slew Bradshaw while he scuffled with Bob Harper, a brother of Bill.

Oregonians Demand Indian's Release

SALEM, March 3.—(AP)—Unconditional release of Alfred Tala, national secretary now in the county jail at Warrenton, Ind., was asked of Governor McNitt of Indiana in a resolution adopted at the first state convention of the United Farmers' League here this morning. Tala is in jail for leading 1200 farmers in a demonstration in protest of a farm mortgage foreclosure in that state.

PENDLETON, Ore., March 3.—(AP)—Pendleton's state-licensed liquor store opened here today. Thirty-six liquor permits were sold within the first two hours of business, and most of those who purchased them also bought liquor. Some of the purchases bought in case lots.

Takes Stand

CRIMINAL COURTS BUILDING, Chicago, March 3.—(AP)—Weak and exhausted after her collapse on the witness stand today, Dr. Alice Lind-say Wynekoop, on trial for the second time charged with the operating table murder of her daughter-in-law, Rheta, went to bed immediately after her cross examination at noon.

It was a harrowing session for the 63-year-old physician. At its conclusion she cried out hysterically as her wheel chair was pushed through the passageway back to the county jail.

The morning session was only a half hour old when the shaken-faced physician collapsed on the stand. As the woman's first feeble call attracted Judge Harry B. Miller's attention, the court ordered the jury removed.

At the conclusion of the court session, W. W. Smith, of the defense counsel, announced that the defense's case, as far as he knew, was completed.

Prosecutor Charles B. Daugherty said he would place five rebuttal witnesses on the stand Monday.

STAVISKY WIDOW'S JEWELS CLUE TO SWINDLER AIDES

PARIS, March 3.—(AP)—A paste-board box containing jewels worth ten million francs, which Serge Stavisky salvaged from his tottering Bayonne pawnshop, was sought today as a clue to powerful friends who may have abetted his \$40,000,000 swindle.

Mme. Ariette Simon Stavisky, widow of the pawnshop founder, meanwhile, maintained a strict silence regarding the jewels and all other details of her husband's far-flung operations, of which she professed ignorance.

Mme. Stavisky was in a cold prison cell following her arrest yesterday. Police said she had stubs for 1200 checks through which "Handsome Alex" Stavisky paid out about \$13,000,000, presumably to accomplices.

Some of the administration projects originally regarded as temporary are now slowly advancing into the permanent category. Outstanding among these is the national recovery administration, which has become an ever increasing subject of controversy both in congress and out.

NEW MORATORIUM VOTED IN KANSAS

TOPEKA, Kas., March 3.—(AP)—With a bill for a new mortgage moratorium having been enacted into law the purpose for which it was called into special session—the Kansas legislature concluded its work today.

Under the bill the owner of property on which a mortgage has been foreclosed, may apply to the district judge for an extension, not beyond March 1, 1935, by fixing a reasonable rental or income value which the property owner must pay to the mortgage holder. The payment is to be applied to taxes and on the mortgage indebtedness.

EGAN IN FINALS TEAM MATCH PLAY

DEL MONTE, Calif., March 3.—(AP)—H. Chandler Egan and Dr. Cliff Baker, representing Oregon, and Richard Chapman and Bill Kynoch, representing the Monterey Peninsula Country club, tomorrow will meet on the Pebble Beach links for the international team match championship of the Pacific coast.

Egan, veteran of many tournaments, and Baker, runnerup in last year's state championship, won their way to the finals when they defeated Frank Drum and Douglas Lewis, of the Huntington Country club, 2 and 1, here today.

ROOSEVELT'S FIRST YEAR ENDS TODAY AMID DISSENSION

President Undisturbed by Congress Commotion, Proceeds With Plans—GOP Assail; Europe Likes

WASHINGTON, March 3.—(AP)—Revolts and dissensions among administration forces on Capitol Hill, stirred by deeply rooted opinions on such issues as tariffs, veterans, airmail and banking, today marked the end of the first year of Franklin D. Roosevelt's presidency.

The signals pointed to rougher going for the Roosevelt program in congress in the future. An upturning against House Leaders McNary and Snell had voiced their displeasure at the presidential request for power to make tariff treaties with foreign nations. Democrats from industrial states were dubious. Speaker Rainey said the house would pass the measure but the Democrats would not be unanimous.

The airmail recommendations have yet to be sent to congress but on both sides of the capitol Republicans have assailed the cancellation of airmail contracts with a vigor that seems to spell a November campaign issue.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—(AP)—The first year of the new deal ends tomorrow with much of its program buried in controversy but with the nation in a bettered economic condition than upon that dismal day on which Franklin D. Roosevelt took office.

While the political opposition on Capitol Hill reiterates its charges of dictatorship and both industry and labor berate the national recovery administration, the president proceeds with his plans, undisturbed by the hillbally that surrounds him.

The individual items of the chief executive's program have, roughly, fallen into one of two categories: temporary measures designed to expedite business recovery, and projects of a permanent nature intended to bring about lasting changes in the fundamentals of the country's economic system.

In the first category are listed the public works and civil works administrations, federal purchases of agriculture surplus for relief purposes, the emergency conservation corps, federal refinancing of home and farm mortgages, reconstruction corporation loans to banks and railroads.

On the side of reconstruction are the farm act, the Tennessee valley authority, the devaluated dollar, the securities law intended to protect the public against financiers, the president's request for governmental control of the stock and commodity exchanges.
