(Plant in an open, sunny spot in rows or groups and water well once a week.) But to really enjoy gladioli he stressed the point that one must be color conscious and learn the names of his glad friends as he does his personal friends who come to his home.

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will begin drawing posters for the American Legion Auxiliary annual poppy contest, according to Mrs. Lee Garlock, poppy poster chairman of the local auxiliary unit. The posters will depict the Auxiliary's memorial poppy program in which poppies made by disabled veterans are worn to honor the war dead and aid the living victims of the war. Local state and national contests will be conducted. The Medford contest will be divided into three classes, one for the grade school pupils, one for the Junior high pupils, and one for the High school pupils. Local contests will close May 10, in order that the posters may be displayed before Poppy day, May 30. Winning posters in the local contest will be entered in the state contests, to be held during the state conventions, and the state winners will compete in the national contest to be held during the Auxiliary's national convention in Miami, Florida Oct. 23 to 29. Suitable prizes will be awarded all winners. The posters will be judged on the following scale: appeal, 40 points; the state artistic ability, 20 points; attention to detail, 20 points; neatness, 10 points; and originality, 10 points.

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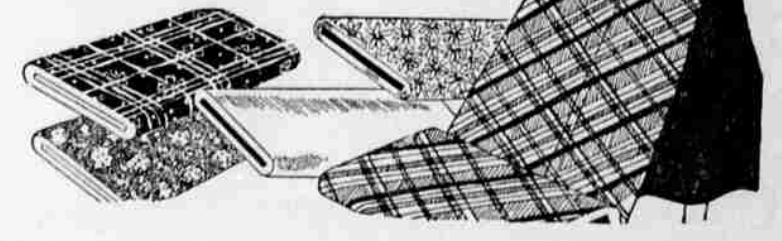
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
