

Rogue Valley Club Golfers Win 51-9 Over Visiting Eureka Team

RETURN MATCH IS PROMISED WITHIN MONTH BY LOCALS

Twenty Players From Sea Coast City Enjoy Crater Banquet And Competition On Course Sunday.

Although the Eureka, Calif. golf team lost their match with Medford 51 to 9 Sunday they departed late Sunday afternoon for home declaring they had thoroughly enjoyed their initial trip to the city and insisting that the Rogue Valley club squad return the visit at an early date.

Twenty Eureka made the excursion, arriving here Saturday evening in time for the banquet arranged in their honor by the Crater club at the Hotel Medford. Following the banquet the visitors inspected the new Pilsener brewery where open house was held in their honor until a late hour.

The team match was started early Sunday morning and lunch was served the players by the local tournament committee. Don Clark of the Rogue valley contingent, drew a Tartar in the competition when he faced Dr. C. C. Falk. Although the Eureka has been playing golf a comparatively short time, he "took" the Medford star for three points. Another interesting match was that between Jack Huuston, Medford pro, and Mel Beblis, pro of the Eureka course. Huuston carded a three-point win over the visitor.

Arrangements are being made by the tournament committee to send a large delegation to Eureka within the next month. The visitors from the sea coast declared they wanted as large a team as possible to visit their city in order that they might repay some of Medford's hospitality.

Medford has available Max Glinnsky, guard, and Tommy White, forward of the regular first string, and Harold Grove, forward, and Ettinger, center, of the second string. The Tiger Cubs are also available. Postponing the game until Friday will give Coach Darwin K. Burcher time to whip a team into shape, and earnest practice will be the rule the balance of the week. Grove and Ettinger are six footers. When "hot" they throw baskets with great regularity. The new squad is able to take care of itself and will stage a battle.

The suspended players are Wayne Harris, center, and one of the most consistent of the Tigers this year; Russell Brown, running guard, a point maker if "on", but erratic; Robert Smith, Stanley Kunzman, Bill Luman, Hoke Curtis, Don Stewart, all of the second string, and Robert Hillman, center of the first string, the past month.

SNOW CARNIVAL PLANS MAPPED AT PARK MEET

An interesting program for the Second Annual Crater Lake Winter Sports carnival was outlined yesterday at Government Camp by representatives of the Crater Lake Ski Club, the Snowmen and the Bend Skyliners sponsoring the carnival Feb. 18 at Crater Lake.

Championship ski jumping will feature the day and will be divided into two classes, A and B, with numerous contestants expected in both divisions. Attracting the same skiers who took part in these events, a class A eight-mile race will be featured among the afternoon events. It will utilize a two-mile track and bring the racers past the spectators several times. A four-mile event for class B contestants is also planned, as well as a mile event for ladies.

Races covering shorter distances will offer competition for grade school boys and girls. A program of novelty events is also being prepared, in addition to a Sialoon race, first time ever offered in southern Oregon. This event brings entrants down a steep slope on which numerous turns are necessary. A record of 84 miles per hour has been made on such courses in the past.

Olen Fabrick, president of the Rogue Snowmen, also representing the chamber of commerce in plans for the carnival, announced today an advance sale of tickets will be started in Medford this week, and advised local people planning on attending the carnival would be wise in arriving at Government Camp before 12:30 in the afternoon, as the program is scheduled to begin promptly at 1 o'clock and will present approximately three hours of entertainment.

Through the cooperation of the Crater Lake National park, ample parking space will be available, with preparations to provide the space already started. Toboggan slides will also be made for visitors to enjoy spring snow sports.

Mr. Fabrick met yesterday with Alfred Castel, president of the Crater Lake Ski club, Frank Prince, president of the Bend Skyliners, and park officials to definitely outline the carnival program.

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THREE DIE IN SMASHUP OF RACING AUTOMOBILES

IMPERIAL, Calif., March 5.—(AP)—Earnie Triplett, "blond terror" of the race tracks who "gave up racing" two months ago, returned to his favorite sport for a special event and was killed with two other familiar speedway figures in the pileup of four automobiles at the Imperial Midway fair Sunday.

George "Swede" Smith, 35-year old veteran of Portland, Ore., died as his racer crashed into Jimmy Wilkeson's stalled car on a turn of the mile track.

"Hap" Happery, Hollywood mechanic, ran across the track to extricate him from the wreckage and was smashed to death by Triplett's speeding machine.

Roaring into the turn abreast of his greatest rival, Al Gordon who took the Pacific coast racing title away from him last year, the "Blond Terror" served his machine violently in a futile attempt to avoid striking the mechanic. Triplett's car rocketed into the fence, ricocheted, grazed Gordon's racer and then hurtled into the air, catapulting the driver. Triplett died in a hospital about midnight.

Gordon's machine plowed into the fence near the grandstand which was packed with a crowd of 5000. Both he and Wilkeson came out of the wreck with minor injuries.

Officials halted the race, awarding places on position. First went to Gordon. Triplett was awarded second place—his last prize.

GUN CLUB ENTERS TELEGRAPH SHOOT
