POW-WOW CALLED ON PROPOSAL FOR SELF-GOVERNMENT

SALEM, March 6.—(AP)—Speakers from at least 75 Indian tribes in the northwest are expected here Thursday and Friday to attend a conference between United States Indian commission officials and the Indian council of the northwest, relative to the self-government proposal now being considered by congress.

Don McDowell, of Blanchard, Wash., president of the Northwest Federation of American Indians, heads the council of 150 members. Fourteen districts are under the jurisdiction of the council, including all northwest tribes, as far east as Montana and taking in northern California. Sessions will be held at the Salem Indian school at Chemawa.

Proposed legislation would give to Indians under federal tutelage the freedom to organize for local self government and economic enterprise and to provide training in administrative and economic affairs. Superintendent Ryan of the Chemawa school stated. The measure would also seek to conserve and develop Indian lands and to promote a more effective administration of Indian tribes and communities. A federal court of Indian affairs would be established.

EASTERN RIVERS LEAVE BANKS AS SUN MELTS ICE

Snow and ice, melted by two days of summer-like temperature, swelled eastern rivers to the danger point today. Some streams had left their banks and others were near flood stage.

In Connecticut, three children were dead and waters of rivers continued to rise. Some families in three towns had abandoned their homes and a high school was closed. Rain added to the danger.

The Queens section of New York city saw streets flooded when sewers became clogged with slush. Over in New Jersey ice jams in the Passaic river and its tributaries menaced sections of Bergen county.

Lowlands in upstate New York were inundated. The Albany-Binghamton highway was blocked with water and the flatlands of southern Syracuse were converted into shallow lakes.

Families in Waterford, where the Mohawk and Hudson rivers join, and a part of Binghamton between the Chenango and Susquehanna rivers, had packed their belongings and were ready to seek higher ground.

YOUNG BURGLARS APPEAR IN COURT

The two youths, charged with burglarizing a local residence Sunday night, were taken before Judge E. B. Day in juvenile court this morning by Chief of Police Clatus McCredie. The younger of the brothers, who is 16, was paroled to his parents, while the case of the 12-year-old boy has been taken under advisement by the court.

A number of letters concerning the older boy have been sent out, and no decision will be made in the case until replies have been received, reports from the judge's office said. Judge Day is considering sending the boy to his grandparents in Arizona.

WEST COAST STAGES DENIED PERMISSION

SALEM, March 6.—(AP)—The public utilities commissioner today denied the application of the West Coast Stages, Inc. for a permit to operate as a motor passenger carrier between Eugene and the California line.

The order, issued following a hearing February 23, stated the applicant "was not financially responsible," equipment listed "not safe for operation," and that the applicant is in arrears in fee payments to the state.
