SCHOLARSHIPS TO AID 2 PER CENT HI SCHOOL GRADS State Board of Education Agrees On Plan to Help High Ranking Students — Coaches' Pay to Be Raised

PORTLAND, March 6.—(P)—Scholarships at Oregon's institutions of higher learning for such students as are unable to attend college without financial assistance, will be made available to approximately two per cent of the graduates of Oregon high schools who rank in the upper third of their classes.

This was one of the points agreed upon here Monday at the regular March meeting of the state board of higher education.

The board voted, too, to increase the salaries of the football coaches at University of Oregon and Oregon State college, and a cooperative plan of adult education involving the state universities of Oregon, Washington and California, and the respective State Federations of Labor, was approved.

To Work With Schools. In furthering cooperation between the higher educational institutions and the high schools of the state, the board provided for a definite plan of high school education looking toward a permanent plan which would represent the entire system in offering educational counseling service. At first this will be on an emergency basis. Later, one or two men will be retained to carry on the work.

The allotment of \$2,400 with which to alter the art museum at the university as requested by Mrs. Gertrude Bass Warner, donor, was approved, and curricular changes and additions, mostly of a minor nature, were ratified.

Fees will remain the same as this year except for an adjustment at the medical school and an increase of \$2 a month in university dormitory charges necessary to meet the extra cost of services and supplies to students there.

Callison to Get \$6,000. Increases in the salaries of Coach Prince G. Callison of the university, and Alonzo L. Stiner at the college, will be met by student athletic funds. Callison will receive \$5,000 a year, effective February 1, and Stiner, coach of O. S. C. for only one year, will receive \$5,500 a year, effective July 1. They are to be retained on a year-to-year basis, as are other faculty members.

E. A. Stevens of Salem was appointed regular crew coach at Oregon State and will act on a half-time basis from April 1 to June 15. Stevens, former Cornell crew coach, has heretofore donated his services.

Exempt from Fees. The scholarships which the board has decided to grant financially distressed high school students with a high rank as scholars, will exempt them from paying the general fees for a year at any Oregon institution they choose. At the university and college this amounts to an exemption of \$18 a term. At the normal schools \$6 a term would be saved. Student and building fees would have to be paid as usual.

Vacancies on permanent and special board committees were filled by President Marka G. B. McLeod. Portland was placed on the finance and unified education construction committee. G. A. Brand of Roseburg, on the curricular committee; Finseth on the faculty welfare, rules and buildings and grounds committee; B. F. Irvine of Portland, on the student welfare committee; and Herman Oliver of John Day, on the administrative committee.
