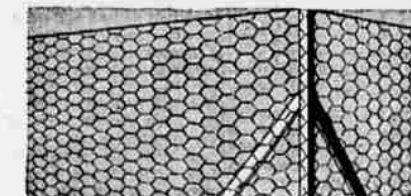

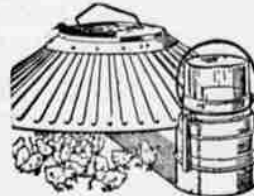

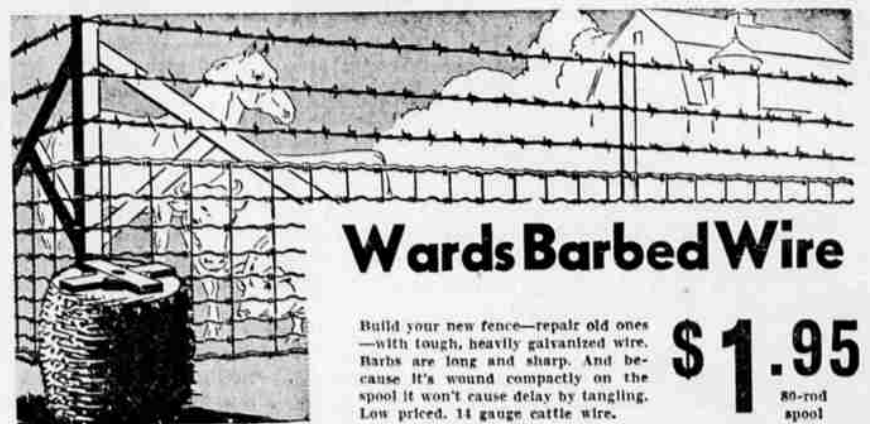

### OFFER STUDENTS PRIZES FOR BEST INSURANCE ESSAY

The Rogue Valley Underwriters Association is planning its annual essay contest in connection with the National Financial Independence week, March 19 to 24.

The contest last year was a huge success with all the students in the high schools and junior highs of the valley competing. Prizes are awarded to the first, second and third winners. Last year's winners were: Jane Solinsky, Medford Junior high, first; Anne Widner Butler, Buxton Falls, second; and Jay Moffatt, Prospect, third. According to this, it would seem that the girls know more about life insurance than the boys. This year more competition is looked for from the boys and the Senior high schools.

The subject suggested this year is "What is the Value of Life Insurance to the Community?" Prizes are \$7.50, first; \$5.00, second; and \$2.50, third. All junior and senior high school students whose parents are not life underwriters are eligible. The essay must not be more than 500 words, written on 8 1/2 by 11-inch paper. All essays to be delivered to the principal of the school not later than 1 p. m. March 21.

Essays are to be judged on the following basis: Knowledge, 60 per cent; clarity of expression, 15 per cent; reasoning, 20 per cent; neatness, good English, punctuation, spelling, etc., 5 per cent. Reference books: Any life insurance book available at the public libraries, magazines, newspapers, articles and brochures with friends. The subject this year gives large oppor-

abilities for the use of imagination and originality.

Judges for the contest are: Eugene Thorndike, First National bank, Medford; Ray Wright, president Rogue Valley Life Underwriters association, and C. R. Bowman, county school superintendent.

The winning essay will be published in the Mail Tribune and read over station KNMD.
