

5 COAST BRIDGES IN CONSTRUCTION BY JUNE 7, PLAN

First Contract, for Alsea Span to Cost \$711,000 Will Be Let April 5—Total Cost Near \$5,102,000

PORTLAND, March 8.—(AP)—All five of the Oregon coast bridges will be under construction contracts by June 7 as the result of action taken by the state highway commission in special session here last night. Final preparation in the signing of these contracts for the construction of the \$5,102,000 contract with the federal government for the construction of the Alsea span was going ahead at Salem today and it was expected the documents would be en route to the national capital for the last signatures by tonight.

The first of the contracts, that for the construction of the bridge across Alsea bay at an estimated cost of \$711,000, will be let April 5 if the federal government by that time has attached final signatures to the contract. In the meantime several highway meetings will be held to provide further information, particularly relative to toll schedules, requested by the government.

30 Years to Pay. The three copies of the contract were signed by the commissioners after more than two hours' perusal of the 27-page document and after the commissioners were satisfied the terms of the contract were satisfactory. It is provided that other revenue than tolls could be provided by legislative act for repayment of the loan in the 30 years' time. The loan amounts to \$4,000,000 and the grant makes up the balance. Repayment of the loan would start in 1938 when the first payment of \$100,000 would fall due.

The second bridge award would be for the Cook Bay span, an estimated \$2,255,052 project, which would be opened April 26, the commissioners decided. On May 17 the Yaquina bay span will be let at an estimated cost of \$1,128,418, while the other two, those over the Umpqua river at \$537,700 and over the Siuslaw river at \$470,450, would be awarded June 7.

To Paint Fog Strip. Purchase of \$40,000 worth of lacquer paint for painting a middle strip down the main highways was heartily endorsed by the members of the commission. Commissioner E. B. Aldrich of Pendleton declared this expenditure was the best investment in safety the state could make. About 25 per cent of the 29,000 gallons of paint would be for repainting jobs while the bulk will be on highways not yet marked. Three state highway crews will start work on this job at once.

The commissioners ordered cancellation of all special permits for moving materials of over-length and over-weight on state highways March 31. A more strict regulation was ordered by Chairman Leslie M. Scott because of abuses. Where materials in this classification can be hauled by rail no highway permits will be granted, he announced.

Judges Too Lenient. The commissioners last night considered the matter of judicial officers failing to invoke penalties for violations of overweight trucks and trailers when violators are brought before them by state police. In most instances such cases are dismissed, they declared. Commissioner Carl G. Washburn of Eugene cited a case from Lake county in which a hay trailer, overloaded, tipped over and caused a wreck. The offender was not penalized by the judge presiding at the court, to which state police brought the farmer. It was indicated statutory penalties would be sought.

The next regular meeting of the highway commission will be held March 22 when PWA highway projects will be awarded. These projects will be announced within a few days.

34 CCC CAMPS OREGON'S QUOTA

PORTLAND, March 8.—(AP)—Oregon will have 34 CCC camps during the next six-month period, compared with 64 last summer, and 39 during the winter months, according to a special dispatch to the Journal today, mentioning that Congressman Pierce had been so advised by the forest service.

The Oregon decrease and a similar decrease in California, the article said, "is due almost entirely to plans for throwing large forces of CCC workers into Idaho and western Montana to eradicate wild currant bushes in a campaign to control the white pine blister rust."

Seven Oregon camps will be east of the Cascades; 27 will be in national forests, three on private lands, two in Crater lake park, one in a state park, and one in a state forest.

HALL TRANSFERRED TO PORTLAND AIR DUTIES

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WHISKEY BUYERS GET BREAK UNDER NEW LABOR RULE

WASHINGTON, March 8.—(AP)—The purchaser of American-made liquor now has the legal right to know exactly what he is getting.

Label regulations which became effective yesterday divide whiskey into four classes:

1. Straight whiskey; the product of the same distillery in the same distilling season.

2. Blended whiskey; a mixture of straight whiskeys or of ethyl alcohol and at least 20 per cent straight whiskey by volume.

3. Spirit whiskey; a mixture of neutral spirits (ethyl alcohol) and at least five but less than 20 per cent straight whiskey.

4. Imitation whiskey; any distilled spirit flavored and colored to imitate whiskey.

Labels must show the age of the youngest whiskey used in spirit and blended whiskey. The maximum percentage of neutral spirits must be stated.

Gin is either "distilled" or "compounded," but cannot be labeled double or triple distilled.

Foreign liquor label regulations go into effect April 7.

Police charge that Trot drugged several Frontenac residents last month and obtained money and valuables from the victims as he held them helpless for a week. He had been the object of a wide search by county officers.
