

CHAUTAUQUA IS REVIVED AFTER RECEIVER NAMED

Will Celebrate 60th Anniversary With Big Season—Original Founded On Lake in New York State

CHAUTAUQUA LAKE, N. Y.—(UP)—When the institution applied for a friendly receivership last November, the impression became widespread that the famed educational center was to become an historic memory, chiefly associated in the popular mind with William Jennings Bryan. But since November, Chautauqua has been undergoing reorganization and it is now planning to celebrate its 60th anniversary with a big season for 1934 opening July 1 and closing August 26.

In the reorganization there is no place for the defunct Chautauqua that once dotted the land from coast to coast, and brought eloquentists, spellbinders, acrobats, Swiss bell-ringers to brighten the lives of rural communities along "the Chautauqua Circuit." All efforts hereafter will be centered upon the original Chautauqua, founded in 1874 on Chautauqua Lake, in western New York.

Tents Disappear. Originally it was a Methodist summer camp gathering place, primarily a tent colony. But the tents have long since disappeared and it is now a community of beautiful summer homes, centering around the big amphitheater that seats 6,000 persons. Its religious life has been broadened to include all sects. The present head of the religious work department is a Baptist, Dean Shaler Mathews of the University of Chicago.

It will maintain its ideal of combining a cultural atmosphere with a religious background, but with increased opportunities for sports, especially boating, swimming, tennis and golf. Savings Effected

In the reorganization, the receivers, Dr. Charles R. Haskin and Alburn E. Skinner, have effected large savings.

Under the direction of President Arthur E. Bestor, a summer program of cosmopolitan appeal is being planned. The Chautauqua Woman's Club, headed by Mrs. Percy V. Pennybacker, former president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, will attempt to duplicate the success of 1933.

The Bird and Tree Club is headed by Mrs. Thomas Alva Edison, who is a daughter of Lewis Miller, one of Chautauqua's founders. The Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle, the oldest book club in America today, offers literary discussion by leading authors and critics. Two orchestras will be heard during the season. The Little Symphony plays under the baton of Georges Barrere. At midseason comes the full Chautauqua Symphony, directed by Albert Stoessel. Ernest Hutcheson, pianist, plays and teaches at Chautauqua. John Erskine, author and musician, plays and speaks at Chautauqua. Horatio Connel, baritone, sings and teaches.

In Norton Hall, a full season of opera is given, with the Little Symphony in the pit.

CRATER HIGHWAY JOB WILL BE LET

SALEM, March 9.—(AP)—Grading of 5.2 miles of the Idaho-Oregon Nevada highway in Malheur county will be included in the project awards to be let by the state highway commission March 22. It was announced last night. The eight projects will approximate expenditure of \$500,000, and will also include about 20 miles of other road improvement and construction of two bridges and one underpassing.

Wage scales for labor in conformity with the federal scale was announced as 55 cents for common and 65 cents for much skilled labor, with the following exceptions: Carpenters 90 cents; electrical workers \$1.10; shovel runners \$1.20; concrete finishers, 90 cents; painters 90 cents; drivers operating three-ton trucks or over, 90 cents; concrete mixers, \$1.

Projects listed included: Jackson county—Agate-Little Butte creek section Crater lake highway, 3.54 miles roadbed widening and bituminous macadam surfacing.

HOLLYWOOD.—Academy members voting on the annual awards of merit this year will encounter more headaches than usual.

The awards year, ordinarily including those films exhibited in the Los Angeles district during a 12-month period, this time covers 17 months. The annual banquet, customarily given in the autumn, has been delayed and will be March 16. The delay is due partly to a constitutional change making the official year like the calendar's, partly to internal troubles which for a time threatened the existence of the academy.

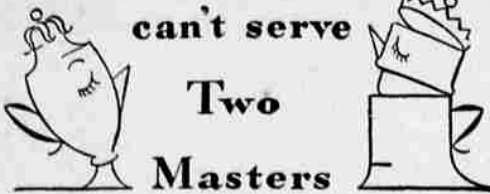
Those troubles, officials say, are now over. So the members have begun stretching their memories to decide where to cast their votes in a field of nearly 500 feature films.

A considerable group in Hollywood expects that the prize for the most outstanding production will go either to "Cavalcade" or to "Little Women." (But the judges will have to consider, too, such pictures as "Dinner at Eight," "Berkeley Square" and "State Fair.")

"Best performance by an actor" may be claimed by Charles Laughton for "Henry VIII," but it can be disputed by Leslie Howard ("Berkeley Square"), Spencer Tracy ("The Power and the Glory"), and John Barrymore ("A Bill of Divorcement").

MRS. COOLIDGES STEW RECIPE RAISES FUNDS TO HELP CHURCH WORK

NORTHAMPTON, MASS. (UP)—To

raise funds for the Edwards' Congregational Church Women's Union, Mrs. Calvin Coolidge, widow of the former President, permitted her favorite recipe for New Orleans stew, autographed, to be sold for 50 cents a copy. Here's the recipe:

"Ingredients are two tablespoons of butter, three onions, three green peppers, three ears of corn or one can of corn, three tomatoes or one can of tomatoes, and salt and pepper to taste. If fresh corn and tomatoes are used, add one cup of water."

"Slice the onions thin and fry in butter. Chop the peppers and add to the onions, frying gently for five minutes. Cut the corn off the cobs, scraping the milk from what remains on the cobs. Slice the tomatoes, after peeling them."

Put the fried onions and peppers into a double boiler. Add the corn and tomatoes, also the water if fresh vegetables are used. Cook there all together for one hour. Add salt and pepper."

"Serve with toast points or boiled rice."

KISSESS CHRISTMAS FOR CALIFORNIA TOWN

TULARE, CAL. (UP)—From now on, Christmas will be kissless in this California town.

The city council, after considerable debate, voted to enforce an old ordinance which declares mistletoe a nuisance and makes it a misdemeanor for any resident to permit it to grow.

Owners of property on which the parasitic plant is found are subject to prosecution unless they destroy it. The ordinance, passed in 1904, was not enforced for years.

DINNER SERVING TWO

The Menu
Old English Eggs
Buttered Spinach
Corn Muffins, Currant Jam
Vegetable Salad
Nut Cookies Coffee

Old English Eggs
(Serving Two)
2 tablespoons butter.
2 tablespoons flour.
1 cup milk.
2 hard cooked eggs, sliced.
1-3 cup grated cheese.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
1/4 teaspoon paprika.
1/4 teaspoon chopped pimiento.
1/4 teaspoon chopped onion.

1-3 cup crumbs.
1 tablespoon butter, melted.
Melt two tablespoons butter and add flour. Add milk, cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add eggs, seasonings and cheese. Mix well. Pour into buttered baking dish. Sprinkle with crumbs mixed with melted butter. Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven.

Corn Muffins (Six)
1/2 cup flour.
1-3 cup corn meal.
2 tablespoons baking powder.
1 tablespoon sugar.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 egg.

1-3 cup milk.
1 tablespoon fat, melted.
Mix ingredients, beat well. Half fill greased muffin pans, bake 15 minutes in moderate oven.

Vegetable Salad
2-3 cup dried cooked beans.
1/2 cup cooked peas.
1/2 cup diced celery.
1/2 cup diced onion.
1/2 cup chopped pickles.
1/2 cup salt.
3 tablespoons mayonnaise.
Chill ingredients. Combine, serve on crisp lettuce.

Nut Cookies (Two Dozen)
2-3 cup fat.
2 cups brown sugar.
2 eggs.
3 tablespoons cream.
1/2 teaspoon vanilla.
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.
1/2 teaspoon cloves.
1/2 cup broken nuts.

3 cups flour.
1 teaspoon soda.
Cream fat and sugar. Add remaining ingredients, mixing lightly. Drop portions from tip of spoon onto greased baking sheets. Flatten, well and bake 12 minutes in moderate oven.
