The brilliant young Portland pianist, who created such a furore in musical circles through her appearance as piano soloist at the concert of the Junior Symphony orchestra, will be heard by a limited number of persons. Just 100 tickets will be available and the charge for admission will be just sufficient to finance her trip to this city.

Of her appearance in Portland, the Oregon Journal wrote editorially: "Over the keys of the grand piano the fingers of the blond little girl swept in light or stormy passages with a skill and touch that sent the audience into thrills of enjoyment and admiration. She was aided back so many times that it became an ovation that a professional artist would long remember and always cherish."

Miss Greenwood first appeared in public recital in May 1928, when she was eight years old, and has since been playing in recitals. She has won numerous and varied prizes in contests held under auspices of the Oregon federation of Music Clubs.
