

DOUBLE SLAYING LAID TO DOOR OF PORTLAND FELON

STEVENSON, Wash., March 10.—(AP)—The bullet riddled body of Frank Kinsey was found by officers today in a lonely ranch cabin two miles north of Prindle. The cabin had been looted of foodstuffs and a shot gun was missing. Sheriff Gordon and deputies found the body while searching the hill country for Fred Weaver, wanted for questioning in the fatal shooting on February 18 of William Zawistowski, 60, Cape Horn resident. Weaver had been reported batching with Frank Kinsey and his brother John, in a cabin near Cape Horn. John Kinsey was working in a logging camp near Big Rock and did not learn of his brother's death until this afternoon after a coroner's jury returned a verdict of murder by persons unknown. Three 32 caliber bullet wounds were found in Kinsey's body. Working on the theory that the killer grubstaked himself for a protracted refuge in the rough hill country, Sheriff Gordon organized an intensive manhunt. There was a possibility that bloodhounds would be brought here from the state penitentiary at Walls, Wash. to be used in searching for the slayer. Zawistowski apparently was slain by a chicken thief. He investigated a noise in his hen coop February 18 and was shot by the intruder.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 10.—(AP)—Fred Weaver, sought for questioning into two Skamania county, Wash., shootings, is known to Portland police as the "barefoot burglar" who thrice was convicted of house robberies here. He was discharged from the Oregon State penitentiary at Salem June 9, 1933.

STATE RUM STORE SETS SALE MARK

Yesterday, the second day of operation for the state liquor store in this city, was a big one with issuance of permits totaling 112, and the day's business reaching the sum of \$483.70. Earl Foy, manager of the store, announced last night. The total, he stated, was considerably greater than that realized in Eugene, a larger city, for the second day of business, and showed an important increase over the first day's business here. Friday, the day the store opened, there were 74 permits issued and business totaled \$270. The trade was steady yesterday, from the opening until the closing hours of the store. The total amount of money taken in in permits was \$108.50, three of them being foreign permits, for which the price is but 50 cents.

2 Postmistresses of State Under Probe

PORTLAND, Ore., March 10.—(AP)—Charges of making false returns to the postmaster general were faced in federal court here today by postmistresses of two eastern Oregon towns. Mary E. Griffin, postmistress at Rye Valley, Baker county, pleaded guilty to making false returns and was referred to the probation officer.

Ada M. Chowning, postmistress at Bates, Grant county, pleaded not guilty to a similar charge. Her case was set for March 19. Each was released on her own recognizance.

LOS ANGELES, March 10.—(AP)—Pierce Correll, 57, former cashier of the First National bank of Tujunga, Cal., and later postmaster there, died today at his home. He came to southern California 12 years ago from Baker, Ore. His widow, two sons and a daughter survive.

MOST WANTON OF KILLERS JEERED; TO PLEAD CRAZY

DEDHAM, Mass., March 10.—(AP)—In the courtroom that witnessed the inception of the Sacco-Vanzetti case, three young men branded by the prosecution as the most wanton killers in Massachusetts pleaded not guilty today to charges of robbery and murdering two policemen. With their arraignment, defense counsel disclosed they would plead insanity. In turn, Abraham Faber, Murton and Irving Millen, all from Boston, protested their innocence when brought before Judge Nelson P. Brown in a courtroom filled with persons who booed and jeered them on their trip from the county jail nearby.

CHICAGO, March 10.—(AP)—Isaac Costner, calmly defying his former gangster-pals to attempt vengeance, today admitted from the witness stand that he took part in a \$110,000 mail robbery and named two Touhy gangsters as his accomplices. Costner, testifying for the state in the trial of Basil "The Owl" Banhart for the \$70,000 John Factor kidnaping, said Banhart was in Charlotte, N. C., the night of the mail robbery last November, but did not name him as one of the actual robbers. For his part of the job, Costner said, he got \$25,000. He said the men who helped him were Charles "Ice Wagon" Connors and Ludwig Schmidt, both fugitives from justice in the kidnaping case.

ATHENS, March 10.—(AP)—John Metaxas, minister of the interior, emergency from a conference with Premier Tsaldaris tonight to announce Samuel Insaull Sr., Chicago fugitive, must definitely quit Greece before next Thursday night. Earlier Insaull agents applied to the German legation for a transit visa on his Greek laissez-passer. The legation promptly denied the application because the agents refused to specify where Insaull wished to go in transit through German territory.

DARK CLOUD OVER ORIENTAL LANDS

SHANGHAI, March 10.—(AP)—Loss of "face" that mysterious something looming large among far eastern people—caused a rift tonight among Japanese emissaries in China. Colonel Shibayama, military attaché of the Japanese legation, in his capacity as a diplomatic official, severely condemned the mysterious visit of a Japanese "agent" by the name of Araki to American mission properties in North China. Colonel Shibayama declared "the unwarranted meddling of the Japanese army in the affairs of the legation has caused needless alarm that the Japanese army is on the verge of again invading the north of China."

A Tragic Fiesta MEXICO, D. F., March 10.—(AP)—Dispatches from Michoacan today said 10 persons were killed in the village of Ziruanato when a group of 200 Indians shot up the inauguration of a new municipal president.
