

# Ski Carnival at Crater Lake Will Attract Huge Throng Sunday

## CARAVAN LEAVING 9:30 A. M. SUNDAY FOR SNOW FIESTA

### Ideal Jump Constructed at Government Camp—Star Performers to Thrill On-lookers—Races a Feature

With indications of fair weather and snow cleared highways assured, next Sunday will attract hundreds of Medford and valley residents to Government Camp where preparations have been completed for the second annual Crater Lake Winter Sports carnival, presenting a program featuring ski jumping and racing. A caravan will leave the chamber of commerce building at 9:30 Sunday morning for the park, arriving in ample time before the program begins.

A crew of 15 men has been at work the past week completing the construction of what is believed to be one of the best ski jumps on the Pacific coast.

**Ski Stars Coming**  
Jumpers, who have attracted national attention, will be in competition Sunday as one of the features of the program, and leaps in the neighborhood of 200 feet are expected. Snow will be in good condition for long distances and is still five feet deep. In other winter sports centers of the west, snow has disappeared weeks ago and has given way to spring flowers, making the Crater Lake tourney one of the most unusual staged in several years.

Alfred Ohrn, Ironwood, Mich., former holder of national championships, expects to equal his past records and establish a new record for southern Oregon. Ohrn is the only American-born jumper to have ever attained championship honors in this country. However, jumpers from other sections of the coast will cause him worry. John Elvrum, a holder of the amateur record, of the Cascade Ski club of Portland and Mt. Hood, will be on hand, as well as Hjalmar Hvam and other jumpers of the same club.

**Clubs Sent Entrants**  
The Bend Skyliners, the Mt. Shasta Snowmen and the Rogue Snowmen will all be represented in these events by jumpers whose names have appeared in the win columns numerous times. Handsome trophy cups will be awarded to the winners of the jumping events. Sigurd Ulland, Salt Lake City, one of the outstanding professionals of the country, is to make a number of exhibition jumps, also on the program for an unidentified woman jumper.

Fast finishes are expected in the class A and class B races, covering eight miles in the former and four in the latter. The racers will pass the spectators several times and will negotiate a down-hill slope just before the finish line is crossed. Pete Hedberg, winner of last year's ski classic from Fort Klamath to Crater Lake and return, is one of the leading entrants in the class A division but will find that he is not in the race alone.

**Service Clubs to Race**  
Possibly one of the most entertaining of the races will be the one-mile event for service club members of Bend, Medford and Klamath Falls for the possession of the "Caterpillar" cup, a wandering trophy. A number of local club members are planning to enter and are determined the cup is coming to Medford.

The slalom race will provide something new in snow sports. It consists of a down-hill race around obstacles at excessive speeds. Races have also been planned for grade school boys and high school girls.

Tickets, being sold at a minimum to defray expenses of the carnival, were placed on sale in Medford this week, but can also be purchased at the Annie Springs checking station in the park. However, the early purchase of tickets is urged to avoid confusion in the park. Local residents are also urged to join the caravan Sunday morning, as this will facilitate parking problems at Government Camp, where quite a large area has been cleared of snow.

Lunch stands will be set up near the carnival grounds and a loud-speaking system is being brought to the park through the courtesy of the Standard Oil company. Program events and results will be announced as quickly as they are scheduled. Rubbers or galoshes are advised for Sunday wear.

Over 30 ski jumpers in A, B and C classes and 25 racers in A and B classes will take part in the second annual Crater Lake winter sports carnival next Sunday at Government Camp, entry lists today revealed.

Complete lineup for the class A jumping, covering leaps from 150 to 200 feet, is as follows: John Elvrum, Hjalmar Hvam and two others from the Cascade club of Portland; Ray Ostad, Bend Skyliners; Alfred Ohrn, Alf Ostmo and Magnus Johnson, Crater Lake Ski club; John Ring, Ornt Ostad and Olaf Skjersaa, Spokane, Wash, and Robert Hvam, Mt. Shasta.

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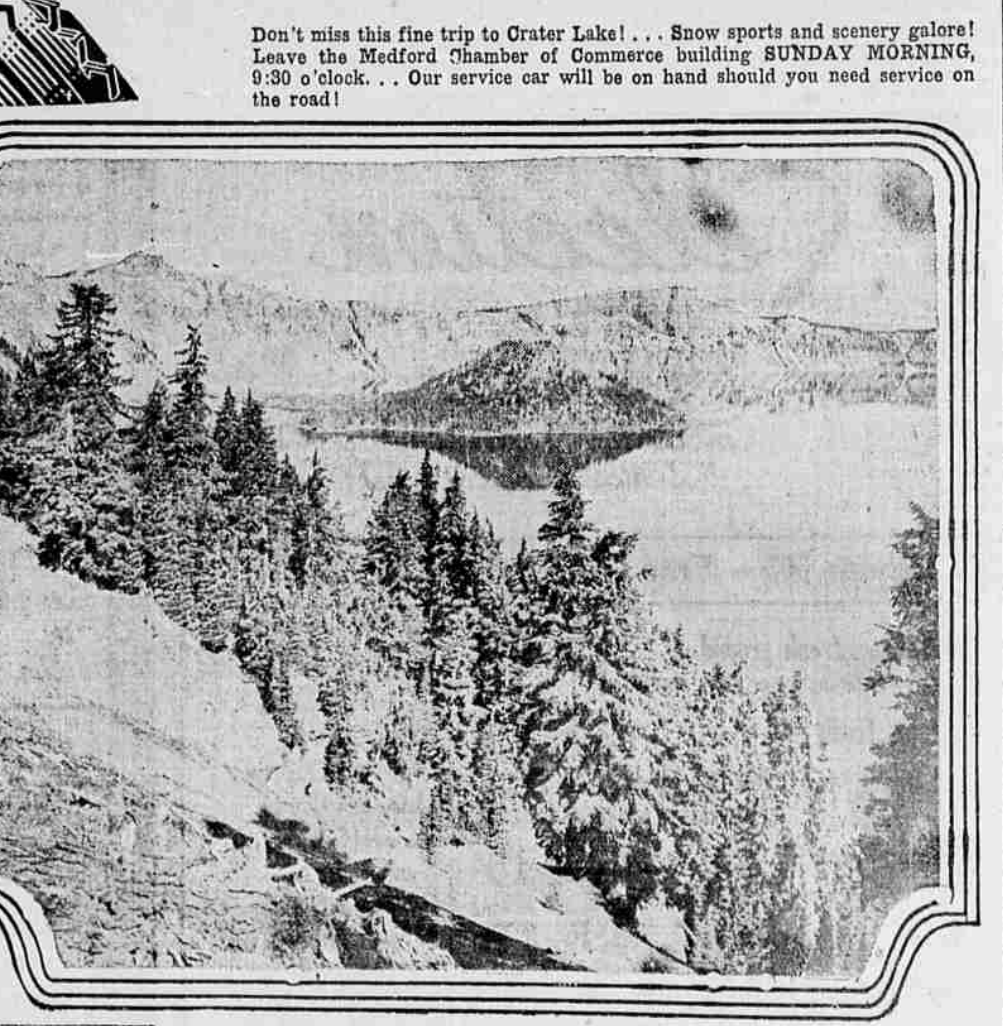
