

### SCOUT LEADERSHIP TRAINING COURSE OPENING TUESDAY

The leadership training committee of the Crater Lake Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, consisting of M. N. Hogan and Col. W. H. Paine, announces a training course that will start next Tuesday evening at 7:30. The course consists of eight indoor sessions and two outdoor. The sessions will be held at the Roosevelt school gymnasium on March 20, 22 and 29, April 3, 5, 10 and 12. The session on April 16 will be a dinner meeting, at which time certificates will be awarded to the men completing the course. The outdoor sessions will be Saturday afternoon and evening and Sunday morning, April 7 and 8.

A. O. Soderberg, scout executive of the Crater Lake area council, who for the past 11 years has been connected with the Portland area council in the capacity of area executive, has had considerable experience in conducting training courses. Only the latest methods are used and the men taking the course will find it very interesting and instructive.

A large attendance is expected, which will include scoutmasters, troop committeemen and dads. Fathers of boys are especially invited to avail themselves of this splendid opportunity to familiarize themselves with the Boy Scout program. Several sessions will be devoted to character influencing and training.

The men attending will be divided into patrols according to troops or communities. Troop No. 3, sponsored by the Roosevelt P. T. A.; Troop No. 5, Rotary Club; Troop No. 8, Washington P. T. A.; and Troop No. 16, Active Club, will each have their own patrol dads. The scoutmasters will act as patrol leaders. Troop No. 7, which is a new troop sponsored by the American Legion, will also be represented by a patrol. Ashland will have two patrols; Beagle, Eagle Point, Gold Hill, Jacksonville and Phoenix will each have a patrol of men present.

No man taking the course assumes any obligation to become a scout leader and there are no costs. It is suggested that those taking the course own or borrow a Boy Scout Handbook. Men desiring to attend may register with one of the scoutmasters or phone scout headquarters.

Scoutmasters anxious to make themselves most effective, men who are curious to know more about the Boy Scout scheme, men who like boys and want to understand them better, men who wish to keep young in mind and body, men who wish to render service to the boyhood of the community are invited to attend.

### KLAMATH WOMEN BOOST SALES TAX

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore.—(Sp1)—By unanimous vote the executive committee of the Parent-Teachers association of Pelican and Mills schools of Klamath Falls, declared themselves for the emergency two year sales tax for school relief and property reduction. Similar action was taken by the American Legion Auxiliary and the Business and Professional Women's club.

In its resolutions the Legion Auxiliary declared that the boys and girls of Oregon will be denied educational opportunities unless definite aid is forthcoming in view of the high tax delinquency and insufficient revenues to continue school operations in many districts.

It calls attention to the fact that 900 school districts of Oregon are already without funds and warrants are at heavy discounts. Since the sales tax is for immediate school relief and the law requires a reduction on property taxes in equal amounts to net revenue it raises, the auxiliary endorses the law and pledges active support, the resolutions recite.

### CHINESE PIRATES LOOT NORWEGIAN STEAMSHIP

HONGKONG, March 16.—(AP)—The Norwegian SS Norviken reported today it had been looted by pirates early Tuesday off Turnabout Is-

land in Formosa strait, 60 miles southeast of Foochow. The Norviken left Shanghai for Hongkong, but put into Swatow to make its report.

K. Wiesendanger, senior ranger in the United States forest service, this month celebrated his 28th year in the service—18 of them as a ranger. And he's only 40 now. Wiesendanger started working for the government in Pacific northwest forests in 1916

as a ranger at 23. Prior to that he had been employed as a messenger for seven years.

To Hunt Fossils  
HAVRE, Mont.—(UP)—Exploration of Missouri River valley lands in the

area of Fort Peck dam for fossil remains probably will be undertaken this summer, according to Darwin Harbright, U. S. E. C. Harbright, who is working out of Havre in obtaining rights of way for the power line to the dam, said he believed the

American Museum of Natural History would conduct the fossil hunt.
